



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
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Farewell to West Place

The last annual Churchill community Christmas celebration to be held at West Place courtyard was on Saturday 1st December. The West Place Shopping Centre is to be substantially redeveloped, now that planning approval has been granted at the Victorian Civil and Administrative Tribunal (VCAT), and the courtyard will no longer exist.

Local band 'House Rules' played a selection of well-known covers of classic rock songs, interspersed with familiar Christmas carols. This was the first time the band had played at an 'outdoor' event, generally appearing at licensed indoor venues. They were a hit with both kids and adults alike and can be booked for community events by contacting Liz on 0402 136 757

Volunteers cooked sausages, handed out soft drink cans and icy poles and distributed wrapped confectionery to all-comers. Many thanks to those who helped out on the day. CDCA held a small fund-raising raffle, which was won by Dorothy Whelan. Proceeds go towards the community fund-raising efforts for the Churchill Hub

The West Place redevelopment means there will be some more changes in the Churchill CBD. Many will know that the Churchill Chinese restaurant, which was formerly on the south side of West Place, is now located at the

Hazelwood Village shopping complex, whilst Morrison Veterinary Services has moved to the Mid-Valley Veterinary Clinic.

It is my understanding that the Lifeline Opportunity Shop will be the next business to move - to the currently vacant shop near Hazelwood Health.

Early earth works and the start of construction for the West Place redevelopment are expected to begin very soon - signs of the work to come (piles of gravel and

fill) are already appearing. Construction will take place in stages.

The redeveloped shopping centre is to include a new supermarket and enhanced car-parking, bicycle and pedestrian facilities, along with a rerouting of Georgina Place to link it directly to Balfour Place.

Meantime, Ritchies IGA have commenced trading at what was the FoodWorks store at Hazelwood Village. Planning approval has been given for significant extensions to this supermarket.

Construction on the new Churchill Community Hub is still expected to commence early in 2008. Tender advertisements were placed in newspapers and on-line during November.



Latrobe City reports there has been a 'significant level of interest'.

The most recent cost estimate has been received which indicates a build cost of approximately \$3.8 million and an overall project cost of about \$4.2m. Tenders closed on December 12th and it is hoped that a very competitive tender that comes in below this estimate was received.

The next critical stage of the project will be the assessment of potential cost, based on tender prices, and short-listing of tenders for evaluation. At this stage, a report will be presented to Council in either late December or the first week of February.

The Working Group overseeing the development of the Hub project has been working on a Terms of Reference document for the proposed establishment of a Section 86 Committee of Council to manage the Hub in the future. This is a formal arrangement of governance, accountable to the Council, which allows for community representation and clearly sets out the powers, duties and functions of the Committee.

The Group is not scheduled to meet again until late February, by which time it is hoped that the construction tender will have been finalised and approved.

Likewise, CDCA will also be taking a break over the Christmas - New Year period. Our next meeting will be held in February, but in the meantime we can be contacted at P O Box 191, Churchill, or call the Secretary, Rob Whelan, on 5122 3602 or email wc-bs@net-tech.com.au

A new Community Kitchen will begin at the Churchill Neighbourhood House in February. A morning tea will be held on the 14th December at 10am at the Neighbourhood House for anyone interested in joining the Community Kitchen to discuss what it involves and how the kitchen will run.

Ms Rachel Dooley, Health Promotions Officer with Latrobe Community Health Service said, "Community Kitchens consist of groups of 6 - 8 people, who meet regularly at a designated venue to cook healthy budgeted meals."

"Community Kitchens are unique in their structure, they are not soup kitchens and they certainly offer participants much more than a cooking class", Ms Dooley

Community Kitchens are coordinated by a leader; however they are owned and driven by the participants who together decide when to meet and what to cook. Participants pay for the cost of their meal; they can then share the meals together or take extra serves home to share with their families (at an additional cost).

"The benefits of Community Kitchens include; increased access to food, improved nutrition and basic life skills such as cooking, shopping and budgeting

Community Kitchens are also recognised for improving social skills and for improving confidence and self esteem," Ms Dooley added.

Whistling Duck in Mathison Park



Walking in Mathison Park on the evening of 2nd December, I saw a very unusual duck swimming in the lake. I was

so surprised to see it there that it took me a moment or two to recognise it as one of the Whistling Ducks and it wasn't until I got home that I identified it as the Plumed Whistling Duck - Dendrocygna eytoni.

The bird was swimming up and down quite close to the shore and I was able to get several photographs of it.

The Plumed Whistling Duck, also known as the Grass Whistling Duck is mostly a bird of Northern Australia. According to the Atlas of Australian Birds (1984), the species was unknown breeding south of 30°S (which is North of Sydney) before 1950. During floods



populations along the Murray, but even so, the Atlas (1977-81) shows records from North and Western Victoria, but none from Gippsland.

It was therefore very special to see this bird in the Park.

It is called a whistling duck and as it swam up and down it showed us why as every now and then it gave short clear whistling call (perhaps calling in vain for another of its kind).

We would like to take this opportunity to thank all our customers and donors for their support in 2007.



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

Reflection

2007 is quickly passing away. Christians of various denominations are now celebrating the Season of Advent, a period of four weeks in which we prepare spiritually for this joyous festival of Christmas. There are other preparations to make: Christmas cards to be sent, family get-together's to be arranged, special food to be prepared and presents to be bought.

Christmas also calls many to remember people who virtually have nothing. It touches their chords of compassion; they could not enjoy a hearty dinner troubled by thoughts of the have-nots. The spirit of the season releases the springs of generosity; the unclasping of handbags, the unfolding of wallets, the completion of credit card donations for this mission or that cause; the urge to send cheer where little exists.

Some people's compassion goes beyond their family in reaching out to include people in their local community who are alone, isolated or separated from their families in their Christmas celebrations. But such invitations need to be sensitive to their particular circumstances. For example, including a father or mother who is separated from their children in a present-giving moment with your own children can be a very negative experience for the guest you have invited. Think of ways of involving your guest so that they feel they are appreciated for who they are and what they may contribute to your Christmas day celebration.

I will now return to the very important question that preoccupies everyone at Christmas. Why do we give presents at Christmas? Some see it as a way of showing love for family members and friends. Others would relate the custom back to the wise men who presented gifts to the infant Jesus. If pressed further, we might say it is a way of passing on the love of God that was released into the world in and through Jesus

A well-thought-out gift reflects a double purpose. It reveals the capacity and affections of the person giving it and it suits the personality and needs of the recipient. Both purposes were fully realised in the first and greatest Christmas gift: the birth of Jesus in Bethlehem. In this gift, God revealed his own nature and he gave the world the gift it needed most.

Jesus was not a spectacular gift by the world's standards, either in first century Palestine or the present time. He came from a poor family, grew up in a despised neighbourhood, never married, and accumulated no property or other measures of wealth. Indeed, he was not the gift the leaders of Israel expected or wanted. Nevertheless, he gave hope to countless forgotten and oppressed people. Also, he revealed in his life and death the compassionate, saving love of God for all people.

Christians believe that the gift of Jesus is still present with us in 2007, meeting the needs God believes we need most. Firstly, he offers us the resources of faith, hope and love to

give purpose to our living. Second, when we falter and fail in our relationships, or give into temptation and fear, he forgives us and enables us to begin life again.

During this time of the year children live for the presents they will open on Christmas morning. In many ways, we are all like children -- not only on account of the excitement we experience as we open our presents, but because there are so many presents to be opened; today, tomorrow, next year. So often it is our looking forward to the present's life gives that keeps us going: the present of an unexpected friendship, the birth of a child, a visit from a friend from by-gone days, etc. In a sense, every day is a present to be opened, just as today was and tomorrow will be.

However, as we receive and open these presents, no matter how rich and wondrous they be, we discover that not one of them, or even all of them taken together, is the one of our deepest longings. But the good news of Christmas is that God has given us a gift, the gift of his son. If we accept him he will turn out to be the gift we have been waiting for. This gift will satisfy the emptiness in our lives, heal broken relationships and fill us with joy and peace. This gift is called "Immanuel," which means, God is with us.



Chaplaincy Contemplations

The people have chosen the Labor Party to lead the nation at this time. May the focus of this government be on celebrating diversity and encouraging equity and justice for all while leading the way in dealing with climate change. This is a moral issue for future generations with which we need to grapple and change the way we live.

Now, we are heading towards school holidays and Christmas. A wonderful time of year for some and a difficult time for others, with the focus on family, friends and the giving of gifts.

Christmas is about celebration. The Church season leading up to Christmas is called "Advent". Advent means "coming" and so the theme is that of Jesus coming into the world, known as the Incarnation. Jesus is here in our daily life for all eternity. The time after Christmas is known as Epiphany with the message that Jesus came as the saviour of all humanity. A gift of love and sacrifice for the whole world.

The giving of gifts recalls the three wise men coming with gifts to the new born Jesus and the Christmas tree comes from Germany brought to England via Prince Albert, consort to Queen Victoria and to Australia via that English tradition.

The Bible stories have Jesus born in a manger and the Angel telling the Shepherds of the Good News.

Luke 2:1-20

"In those days a decree went out from Emperor Augustus that all the world should be registered. This was the first registration and was taken while Quirinius was governor of Syria. All went to their own towns to be registered. Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David. He went to be registered with Mary, to whom he was engaged and who was expecting a child. While they were there, the time came for her to deliver her child. And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn.

In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid; for see - I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger. And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying,

"Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those

whom he favours!"


West Field Rivers and Roads Relocation program. Road closures and changes in early 2008



International Power Hazelwood (IPRH) is now well advanced in the West Field Rivers and Roads Relocation (RRR) construction program. The construction of a new 7.5 km section of Strzelecki Highway is nearing completion and work continues to construct a new 10 km open channel diversion of the Morwell River.

So in early 2008, IPRH will open the new Highway section and close a local road - Brodribb Rd (west section) - near the Hazelwood Mine. A new section of Yinnar Rd will also be built along the pondage foreshore. (April/May 08)

IPRH, together with Latrobe City Council and VicRoads, wish to remind local residents and all road users that you should be aware of the new and alternative routes that will result from these changes. (below)



The key works scheduled for early 2008 are:

- The opening of a new 7.5 km section of the Strzelecki Hwy from Thorpdale Rd to the existing Morwell interchange. It will mean the current section of Strzelelcki Hwy running from the Wetlands through the Driffield area will close.
- The reopening of Marretts Rd to take traffic west, to and from Moe / Melbourne direction
- The closure of Brodribb Road (west section between Yinnar Rd and old Strzelecki Hwy)
- The opening of a new section of Yinnar Rd along Hazelwood Pondage foreshore (April/May 08)

The most common causes of the fires include leaking or loosely fitted gas hoses and poorly maintained barbecues. There have also been a number of fires where the barbecues have been left unattended for a period of time.

What do you need to do to keep your barbecue working efficiently and safely?

- * Check the gas cylinder is not damaged and has been tested within the last ten years.
 - * Check gas hoses for damage & leaks.
- * Check connections are tight and not leaking before operation.
- * Clean fat and grease from the barbeque

Frozen Mango Daiquiri


- 1 ripe mango peeled and chopped 1/4 cup pineapple juice, 3 ice cubes

with the yogurt and honey. Mix until well combined. Refrigerate




Coffee Eggnog





Garry and Rhonda Dunn

Garry Dunn, an only child was born in 1944, in Kiama, New South Wales. His family moved to Mt. Burr, then Mt. Gambier in South Australia before finally moving to Morwell, Victoria when the Gas and Fuel Corporation opened. There Garry attended Tobruk St. Primary School for Grade 6, before going on to Morwell High School in 1956, for his secondary education.

From school, Garry went to the State Electricity Commission (SEC) and took up an apprenticeship in fitting and turning. With the completion of his apprenticeship Garry went to Melbourne and did a course with Australian National Line (ANL), a shipping company. A job at Volkswagon followed, with a shift to Clarke Equipment next.

Rhonda's parents Ron Sibbison and Gloria Carne (dec. 1983) were married in Camberwell at St. John's Anglican on the 30th September 1944.

Ron was a plumber by trade, with his own business. When the family moved to Morwell, Ron continued his own business, which he ran for some time before going to work for a number of plumbing businesses in the area, as well as working at the Australian Paper Mill (APM) and Yallourn Hospital as a maintenance plumber.

At the age of forty, Ron decided to go into school teaching. A two-year course at Footscray Technical College gave him the qualification to teach, which he did at Morwell Technical College as well as various technical schools in the Melbourne suburbs.

Gloria was a stay-at-home Mum while the children were small. Bill was the first born in 1945. (dec. 1961). Then Rhonda arrived in 1948, followed by Jennifer in 1949. All three children were born in Camberwell. Then came to move in the early fifties to live in Keegan Street, Morwell. They moved into a house built by Ron, just in time for Bill to start Primary school at Commercial Road Primary School.

Gloria went to work at Yallourn Hospital in the kitchen. There she learnt much about food (especially vegetable) preparation and presentation, which she passed on to her children. She would take pride in dishing up a meal, which looked appetizing and attractive to the eye.

Gloria worked until Bill died in 1961. Ron had school holidays, and they had plans for a trip to Queensland, so she resigned.

Rhonda went to school at Commercial Road Primary School. She can remember the school Number- 2136- which is still on a plaque on the old red brick building. School for Rhonda was fine. She describes herself as average at her studies. She was one of a class of forty or more. Her teachers, she thinks, taught well considering the large class numbers. One of her favorite teachers was Mr. Honey.

From Commercial Road Primary School Rhonda went to Morwell High School. There she was an average student, but was part of huge classes of 45 plus. Rhonda believes the teachers there also did a good job despite the large numbers of students per grade. Rhonda chose to do a commercial course, which entailed learning typing, shorthand and CPP- Commercial Principles and Practice. One highlight came when she topped the grade in Arithmetic. Rhonda stayed on at school until she obtained her Leaving Certificate.

Home Pride Bakeries

It was while she was still at school that she met Garry at an RSL dance in Morwell. Garry was working at his apprenticeship. Then Garry went to Melbourne. When she finished school, Rhonda worked in Home Pride Bakeries in Catherine Street, Morwell, and when she was put off, spent two weeks working at the Total Service Station, before she also went to Melbourne. The friendship between Garry and Rhonda grew and they were engaged shortly after. Rhonda says they were always very close.

Rhonda went to stay with her grandparents in Camberwell, in their old family home. In Melbourne she obtained a job at St. Paul's Cathedral, in the Office of Christian Education. There she enjoyed being a Jill-of-all-trades doing jobs like typing, filing, letter writing and photocopying on the old Gestetner- a messy machine which required the wearing of an overall when the ink was to be renewed. She caught a tram to work.

Ron, Rhonda's Dad, received a promotion to Swan Hill Technical College, so the whole family, including Rhonda, moved to Swan Hill. There Rhonda obtained a job in the Pathology Department of Swan Hill Hospital. "It was just the best job," enthuses Rhonda. "I was receptionist, typist, everything! There was great variety."

A few months later, Rhonda eagerly returned to Melbourne,

where she and Garry were married on the 23rd of April 1966 at St. John's in Camberwell in a lovely ceremony. Her grandmother organized the wedding in three and a half weeks, as well as making a beautiful dress, with a fascinator hat and veil. Rhonda remembers it well with gratitude and pride, saying her grandmother was just wonderful.



At this time Garry had just become employed with Clarke Equipment, and couldn't take time for a honeymoon. Instead, the happy couple took a weekend break. They started married life in a flat in Camberwell, and then moved back to a portion of the family's Camberwell home, occupying one of the two apartments, into which the house was divided.

Steven was born later that year at St. George's Hospital Kew.

After the job at Clarke Equipment ended, the small family moved back to this area, to Yallourn. Garry had applied to the SEC for a job and a house. The application was successful. Then they put their names down for a house in Churchill. Again they were successful, and moved into White Parade in February 1967. It was an extremely hot day (100 degrees F). Rhonda thinks it was a record high, and still could be.

This was the house they made their home for twenty-eight years. Angela was born in 1969 at Morwell Hospital. She and Steven attended Churchill Primary School. Steven went on to Morwell Tech. and Angela went to Morwell High School, Angela following in her parent's footsteps.

Garry continued at the SEC, first at Yallourn, then Hazelwood, and Loy Yang, as a fitter and turner, but later as the Work Co-Ordinator. He took the package in 1992.

Garry had many varied interests throughout his life. Before he was married, he was into Go-Kart racing. Then he tried Hill Climbing. He also restored a 1925 Harley Davidson motorcycle to new and radio-controlled model aeroplanes were built and flown.

Garry became very involved with the Churchill Lions Club, being a Chartered member in 1977. Rhonda joined as a Lions Lady. Rhonda was President for one year, and Garry was President for a year also. He also was the Lion Tamer, the person who collects the fines. Garry derived great enjoyment from making places look neat and tidy, so he was energetic about mowing the lawns around the BBQ area, etc in Churchill. He also enjoyed the port bottling and community BBQ's!

He was a keen Camp Quality Caper participant, and delivered wood to Senior Citizens. He was very involved and very community minded.

They both were members of the Lapidary Club from the late 80s.



River in the CarportIn 1995, Rhonda and Garry, purchased a property in the

Haverbrack Estate with a three-year-old house, and moved from White Parade. Although they had made many wonderful friendships in those years, Rhonda says she has had no regrets from their move. But it was tinged with much uncertainty as Garry, the week before the move, had been diagnosed with bowel cancer. They moved on Cup Day, and it was pouring rain. A river was running through their carport, the creek next door was running a banker, water was lapping at the double doors at the back of the house, and there was a lake at the front of the house! "What have we done?" Rhonda asked Garry, as everyone who had come to help, left.

It was not a case of what have we done, but what have we to

It was not a case of what have we done, but what have we to do, and now! So the next week before Garry was due to go to hospital for an operation, and not knowing what the outcome might be, he worked like a Trojan to put in drains to fix the problem and stop it occurring again. The operation was a success, and after twelve months of Chemo, he came through it all with flying colours!

Before that time, and following that scare, the couple enjoyed extensive travels around Australia, and to Norfolk Island. In the early days it was on a motorbike with sidecar.

The pair then had nine and a half years of enjoyment developing the property, and loving it. Rhonda loves it still. In 2003 Garry resigned from Lions to join Gippsland Model Engineering Society. He was keen to build a miniature model train engine. This he worked on up until his death.

During the time the children were growing up and at Primary school, Rhonda became a pro-active Mum. There was no kindergarten, so she was one of the many Mums on the committee who helped with fund-raising ventures for Watson Park Kinder. There were the Carnivals held in the reserve in White Parade. These proved so successful that the money was raised more quickly than expected, in a brief eighteen-month period. The Council then had to rapidly find the equivalent amount to match the amount raised. The committee was also responsible for designing the building, with guidelines given by the Council. It had to be a building which could be used for other purposes should it no longer be needed as a kindergarten in the future!

The Day the Shops Opened

Rhonda well remembers the day the shops opened, being one of the first customers to go into the supermarket. It was great when the shops opened recalls Rhonda, as it took the pressure off having to go shopping when Garry got home from work, or have Garry stop at the shops on his way home, to pick up things. Rhonda didn't drive then, and bus services were few.

Rhonda says people then, had to be organized, and think ahead. But there were the times when you got to know your neighbours better if you had to go and ask for a cup of sugar or something similar, when stores ran out.

The Health Centre was located in Roy Court and was open on Wednesday afternoons for babies to be weighed etc. It was a place to congregate.

Morning Coffees at 14 McDonald Way were a special way of meeting and making friends. Mrs. Brick is fondly remembered for her care and concern.

Rhonda also joined the Churchill Hockey Club as an original member. Rhonda enthusiastically remembers those days with pleasure. She hadn't played hockey since school days. She was the youngest player at 22 years of age.

An area on the north side of Switchback Road where Churchill North now stands was leveled out, as there was no ground. Husbands mowed the grounds before a game. There was a real family atmosphere and co-operation. Dads looked after the children while the Mums played. Rhonda played for ten years and became a Life Member.

She also helped at school with the canteen, and Mothers' Club raising money with casserole luncheons. A Hobbies Day at the school saw Rhonda and a friend share their interest in stamp collecting. This involvement did not continue on a regular basis, when the children went to High School.

But that did not stop Rhonda becoming involved with other organizations. One was the Council for the Ageing. Another, child minding at the Neighbourhood House led to further, when Nan Butcher invited Rhonda to become a member of the Gardening Group at the Neighbourhood House (NHH). She did the cooking classes at the Neighbourhood House, exchanging recipes with Nan. She accepted membership of the NHH committee.

The Gardening Club started, with 8-10 people. Eventually it broke away from the NHH, and has continued successfully ever since. It now has up to 35 people who attend. Rhonda says the members of this group were very supportive through Garry's illness, and since his death.

Rhonda has also continued to be involved in both the Lapidary Club and Gippsland Model Engineering Society and enjoys her involvement in both clubs, and the company of their members

Steven is married to Heather, the girl next door. They have three children, Rebecca 16, Nicole 14 and Graham 12. They now live in Morwell and the children have all attended Commercial Road like their Gran.

Angela is married to Michael Bolding of Boldings Road and lives in Yinnar. Michael is the youngest son of Graeme and Betty. They also have three children, Dylan 13, Curtis 10 and Maddison



Steven has played a lot of sport during his life with membership of soccer, Little Aths, and pushbike riding. He joined Scouts and went through to Venturers, becoming a Queen's Scout.

Steven works at Loy Yang. He too, has become a member of the Gippsland Model Engineers, and is in the process of completing his father's model train.

Angela also has been involved with sport playing basketball, badminton, indoor cricket and doing ballet and Little Aths too. Angela joined the Guides as a Brownie, progressing through Guides to Venturers. At present she is very involved with her community at Yinnar, and with the children's school activities.

60th Birthday Celebration

In December 2004, Garry celebrated his 60th birthday. Sadly in February of the following year, he was diagnosed with mesothelioma, and died on 29th July, 2005.

Rhonda expressed gratitude for Dr. Buras' suggestion that they become familiar with Palliative Care services, before Garry needed them. Rhonda is very grateful for the services provided by the caring nurses of this wonderful organization. Through Palliative Care, Garry got his wish of being at home and having everything done to his wishes. He passed away peacefully, for which Rhonda is very glad, as she had a dread that Garry would suffer pain.

Garry was a quiet achiever who got on with things without making a fuss about it. This poem by Mrs. Parry of the Gardening Club sums up what many think is a true record of Garry's personality.

Garry leaves behind a proud wife in Rhonda, his two children Steven and Angela, and their families. He saw them grow up and marry and have children of their own. He saw Rhonda gain in confidence from the quiet girl he married to the woman who contributed actively to her community's growth, and is now responsible, in part, for the running of the Gardening Club. Rhonda is continuing her community work by taking an active role in organizations such as Gippsland Asbestos Related Diseases Support Inc. (GARDS) and Comfort Cushions for Cancer Support.

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



Cuckoos in Mathison Park

A Fishing Spider in the Park by Ken Harris




During our October working bee in Mathison Park we were planting trees, shrubs and sedges around the southern side of Lake Hyland. While picking up some rubbish left on the shore, one worker found a large spider in a yoghurt container (with water in it), right on the edge of the lake. I immediately identified it as a Wolf Spider, but I was wrong. It is actually one of the Water Spiders or Fishing Spiders, and was identified for me as Dolomedes instabilis. These are very interesting spiders that spend most of their time in water. Fine hairs on their legs trap air and enable them to float and walk on the surface of the water. They can also dive and they carry air down against their book-lungs, enabling them to stay submerged for some time. They feed mainly on aquatic insects and have even been recorded as eating tadpoles and small fish.

Another name for these spiders is Nursery Spiders. The female spider weaves an egg sac. When the young are about to hatch, she constructs a shelter in the vegetation just above the water and she takes good care of her young throughout their early days.

They apparently can be aggressive and can inflict a painful bite, but there is no evidence of the bite being poisonous to us

Cuckoos in the Park by Ken Harris

There are 5 species of cuckoo that are known from this area and of these 3 have been recorded (and photographed) in Mathison Park. All these cuckoos share the habit of laying their eggs in the nests of other birds and leaving the host species to rear their young.



The first one I encountered is far from the commonest in the area. Last summer a Horsefield Bronze-cuck-oo was frequently seen (and heard) in the centre of the park. They were always close to the marshy area at the end of the lake and I believe they probably targeted the small birds common in that area, the Superb Fairy-wren, The Reed Warbler and the Golden-headed Cisticola. The much commoner Shining Bronze-cuckoo is often heard in the area, but so far I have been unable to detect one in the Park. Perhaps the commonest cuckoo is the Fantailed Cuckoo, with a distinctive descending trill. It is a handsome bird with an apricot chest and blue-grey back. I have seen one a few times in the Park, and perhaps heard them more often.

The last cuckoo in the Park is the largest, the Pallid Cuckoo. It is not very common in the area, but this spring has been heard calling frequently and recently gave me a surprising chance to take its photograph. Its call is ascending series of hoarse whistle and is very distinctive.








