## Marilyn's Story

MARILYN Skinner was bom in Wonthaggi sixty years ago. After attending school there for a short time, the family moved to Melbourne, where Marilyn grew up in the suburb of Strathmore, attending primary and secondary school there. Her Mother was in business. After leaving school Marilyn studied to be a stenographer, later finding employment in that profession.

In 1967 Marilyn married. Believing that she couldn't have children of her own, she and her husband adopted their first son Michael. Michael has grown into a wonderful man. Then to their surprise and pleasure, Marilyn became pregnant and gave birth to their second son David. David's love of horses led him to be a jockey and to breaking and training race horses in his own successful business first in Queensland, and now in Moe. He and his wife have two beautiful children.

Marilyn has been painting pictures since she was thirty. Art classes at night, were attended by Marilyn and her Mother, a baby-sitter being organized to mind the children. Through those classes she learnt about mixing colors, tones and composition. In those days oils were her medium. She attended lots of workshops and gained lots of knowledge.

A shift to live in the Latrobe Valley, allowed Marilyn to find an art teacher. This was Bob Pelchen, a noted water colour artist. So Marilyn began painting in water colors and successfully too. She was able to sell many of her paintings.

One afternoon, Marilyn had an aneurysm. A massive brain hemorrhage left her a hemiplygic. Her left side is paralyzed, but she has full use in her right side, and her brain was unaffected. As a result of this occur-
ence, Marilyn spent twelve month in the Grand Ridge Lodge Nursing Home in Mirboo North. This was followed by three months of rehabilitation. Then came a year in the

Strezlecki House Hostel in Mirboo North. Marilyn then made a huge decision that she didn't want to go on living with old people, so she now has a small unit of her own, and carers who help her to stay there. Part of the unit is her artist's studio, where she spends time painting each day.

In fact Marilyn is so keen, she has organized an exhibition of her work at The Bullock Dray Cafe and Gallery in Mirboo North on the 29 th and 30th November.

Her hopes are that it will be fine weather as the exhibition will be held out of doors, from 9:30 a.m. 4:30 p.m. each day. Marilyn says there are two incentives to come, one to see her work and the other to taste the scrumptious food sold at the cafe. The cappuccino is the best you have ever tasted she claims.

To get around town, where she is well known, Marilyn has an electric scooter. It is toffee apple red. Marilyn explains that is so people can see her coming and keep out of her way, especially on her left side as the sight in the left eye is impaired due to a lot of bleeding behind the eye during her brain haemorage. At home she is able to "walk in a fashion."

Life has lots of fun she says
despite what has happened to her.

## loves ME

If the Lord is within, you wont be without"
During her time in the Nursing Home and through her rehabilitation, members of the St. Mary's Anglican congregation were a help and comfort to her. Marilyn says one lady who has become a friend would come and read to the residents weekly. They had lots of giggles, and they would guess what would happen next in the story, and then have to wait for next week to hear the next chapter.
Marilyn wanted to see what made these people shine, so when she was able, she began to attend the Church. She has become a Christian, last year being baptized and confirmed by Bishop Arthur Jones. Now she feels protected by the arms of the Holy Spirit.
Through all these trials, Marilyn has had the support of her wonderful husband. Marilyn has tried to put herself in his position. It must have been very scary for him she thinks. I'm sure I wouldn't have handled it as well if it had been the other way round she confesses.
Marilyn eye problem is helped by the Royal Victorian Institute For the Blind. The R.V.I.B. wanted to select a painting by one of their vision impaired folks for their use. Marilyn was very thrilled when one of her paintings from an exhibition at the Brewery in Mirboo North, was selected and purchased by the Royal Victorian Institute For the Blind. This painting is being raffled to raise valuable funds for the R.V.I.B. It has also been selected to be the picture on the large print 2004 calendar. These calendars are available from the R.VIB. office at 110 Hotham St., Traralgon.

## The ©NighGourhood Renewal Project

 Glendonald Residents tell their stories... digitally!!In September, three Glendonald residents participated in a three day digital story telling project at the newly opened Australian Centre for the Moving Image (ACMI) located in Federation Square in the heart of Melbourne.
The idea of the project was for residents to be able to tell the stories of their lives, homes and neighbourhood using computers to record photo, spoken word \& music to create the effect of a mini film of two to five minutes length. These can be played on video or by a media player on a computer.
Quantum Support Services organised the trip which included residents from other
Neighbourhood Renewal areas in Latrobe Valley. The project was funded by Neighbourhood Renewal, Department of Human Services, Gippsland Region.
Glendonald residents told stories about the 'rebirth' of the Churchill \& District News and the hard work of it's volunteers, how a house can be renovated, added to and turned into a home to feel proud of, about how 'the Don' has become a true home and the country of the youngest son of a family who have moved here, and the story
of Churchills stop-start development since the 1960's and the future potential of our town. Participants in the ACMI digital story project with family \& friends met together in Morwell in late October to look at the final product of each other's labours, amidst much laughter and fun. The ACMI project trip presented a unique opportunity to record stories about our neighbourhood whilst the first generation of residents is here to tell it. A premiere is planned for late November, early December after which the stores will be publicly available.

We met at Parker's Corner, Rawson, and from there, followed the Thompson Valley Road 11 km . to the Mount Erica car park turnoff.

This road is fairly rough and was worse after the recent rains. From the car park we started our trek through the mud up to Mushroom Rocks.
This track is part of the Alpine Walking Track. Mushroom Rocks is an interesting formation of huge rounded granite boulders; some looking like giant mushrooms. Nearby is a Scout Hut, where we peeped through the windows, as it was locked up.
From there we "bush-bashed" through to snow, clambering over huge fallen trees, the result of high winds the week before, to another hiker's hut.

After lunch, which we ate sitting under a huge bour-
der, we hiked back to the car park.
Our second walk was the Beech gully Nature Walk, a very easy circular walk.
It leaves from the car park and provides an interesting introduction to the plants and wildlife of the Mountain Ash forests, and the Native Beech (found only in this area), as well as Lyrebirds, echidnas, and the endangered Leadbeater's Possum.

Another highlight of our day was a short walk along the Mountain Monarch's Track.

It follows a former tramway, and walkers are offered a real treat viewing the huge trees, which must have escaped the timber-getters of the early days
