# Lumen Christi celebrates 40 years





Lumen Christi 40 Year Anniversary celebrated in style

More than 160 parishioners, former residents, school Principals, nuns, clergy and members of the Co-operating Churches congregation crammed into Lumen Christi Parish Centre on Sunday July 30, to celebrate the 40th anniversary of the establishment of the Lumen Christi Parish.

Visitors and former parishioners came from as far away as Ballarat, Phillip Island, Orbost and, Melbourne as well as throughout the Latrobe Valley to attend the celebration. Lumen Christi Parish was established on January 1, 1977 by Bishop Fox and the first Parish Priest was Father Jeremiah Coffey who later became Bishop of the Sale Diocese.

Prior to the commencement of the special Mass, celebrated by Parish Priest Father Siju Xavier and assisted by former Parish Deacon Terry Rooney, a brief history of highlights of the parish over the past four decades, was outlined to the assembled congregation.


Representatives of the three churches of the parish, Churchill, Boolarra and Yinnar took part in several important ministries during the celebration while important roles were also performed by former nuns Sisters Madeline and Audrey, and former School Principals Michael Dyson, Denise McKenna and Joanne Brewer, with current Principal David Cooper.

A large choir of men and women parishioners was assembled specifically for the occasion and, led by Paul Devlin, provided magnificent music and singing throughout the Mass. A special commemorative bookmark and brochure were produced for the occasion and distributed to those present.

Following the Mass, the crowd moved

to the School Eco Centre where a delightful shared lunch was enjoyed by the large gathering. Father Siju took the opportunity to formally welcome everyone, particularly, Reverend Brenda Burney and members of the Co-operating Churches, and to thank those who had assisted in the organising of the event and provision of the wonderful meal.

After lunch the crowd was entertained by music from young parishioners Emma and Joseph Darling and Tessa Kuijpers, and singing from Peter Pooley and David Lees to cap off a great day of celebration.

Churchill district resident Sheina Renton has been involved as a member of Churchill Community Garden since the first community consultation in 2014. Since then she has worked long and hard on the plans for the garden, and the seeking of permission to implement those plans from Churchill Neighbourhood Centre (which auspices the garden group), the Churchill Hub and the Latrobe City Council (which owns the land on which the garden is located).

Once development of the garden was underway in 2015, it was Sheina who instigated, researched and coordinated decisions as to construction methods, soil treatment, composting methods, the worm farms, what vegetables should be planted where, and when; she set up and attended just about every working bee; time after time Sheina also organised the garden group's presence at markets, fairs, exhibitions and festivals. Early in 2015 she accepted the role of President.

In 2016 Sheina also worked to gain for the garden a grant from the Latrobe City Council. This is in the process of being used to buy the new large worm farm, the "Worm Habitat Grande", as well as



#### Members help with Coolarro Fire

The huge fire at the Coolaroo recycling plant in Melbourne produced huge clouds of smoke and fumes which were very unpleasant

this fire under control needed some of our local brigade's knowledge gained from the experience from fighting the mine fire. Two compressed air foam system appliances (CAFS) were driven to the scene and with the production of the thick foam, the fire was more easily extinguished. Local volunteer members worked in shifts over a three day period, assisting the MFB fire brigades prior to the arrival of bigger units from interstate.

These CAFS vehicles were tested in the mine fire with appliances sent over from Tasmania, Canberra and Queensland to smother the burning coal. Following



the success of the use of that procedure, two CFA tankers were retrofitted to become CAFS vehicles and were located at Traralgon South and Churchill Fire Stations, where training in their use undertaken. These was vehicles are the only two located in Victoria. They are located here due to the power stations and mines. These appliances are now used widely across the state and locally, being operated by our local volunteers.

Α memorial garden honouring Morwell's servicemen and women will be established in the grounds of the new Morwell Central Primary School.

Federal Member for Gippsland Darren Chester today announced Morwell RSL Subbranch would receive \$2,400 from the Federal Government to build the garden.

"It is terrific to see the Morwell RSL working with the school community to remember and honour the sacrifice of those who served in the armed forces," Mr Chester said.

"The garden is a great way to teach our children about wartime history and will become a focus for the school community on special days of commemoration, particularly on ANZAC Day

and Remembrance Day.' Morwell RSL Sub-branch President Bruce Jeffrey said the new garden would include a small pine tree propagated from the Lone Pine planted in front of the Australian War

Memorial "There will also be a bronze plaque mounted on a granite plinth honouring the men and women who served in all wars, conflicts and peacekeeping operations," Mr Jeffrey said.

"We've created a few memorials like this at our local schools and it has helped the RSL to build partnerships and awareness among the younger generation. We're hoping this garden will be finished in time for a commemorative service on Remembrance Day in November."



The Government is one step closer to bringing the best of football back to the Latrobe Valley.

Member for Eastern Victoria Harriet Shing, joined Latrobe City Council recently to announce the purchase of the 12,000-seat Latrobe City Sports and Entertainment Stadium.

Latrobe City Sports and Entertainment Stadium – the home ground for local teams such as the Falcons 2000 Football Club – was chosen because it's the most significant multi-use facility and the only football stadium of its size and stature in the region.

The complex can now be upgraded with new synthetic pitches and lighting for night matches, giving it the power to attract the big football games and events.

It will provide a home for the Gippsland Football Club's boys and girls teams, and the elite-level grounds will be available for other sports that play on a rectangular pitch.

A regional Soccer Centre of Excellence will also be established at the site to provide a pathway for our young local athletes from the grassroots to elite level.

It's a big win for the entire Latrobe Valley community, which will be able to use the facility all-year-round, day or night.

Australian basketball champion, four-time Olympian and leading sports administrator Larry Sengstock has been appointed to oversee the upgrade of the Latrobe City Sports and Entertainment Stadium. Mr Sengstock will also manage other projects as part of the sporting package, including:

\$46 million to construct the Gippsland Regional Aquatic and Leisure Centre \$17 million to redevelop

\$17 million to redevelop the Gippsland Regional Indoor Sports and Entertainment Complex in Traralgon

\$4 million to upgrade Morwell Recreation Reserve \$3 million to upgrade the Ted Summerton Reserve in Moe

Mr Sengstock was formerly Chief Executive of Basketball Australia and head of Sport and Operations for the Melbourne 2006 Commonwealth Games. He started work at Latrobe City Council on August 7, 2017.

The Government has allocated \$4.2 million to purchase and upgrade the stadium, as part of the \$85 million Latrobe Valley Sports and Community Initiative.

Latrobe City is delivering the infrastructure component with support from the Latrobe Valley Authority.

Tyler Carach is a youngster on a mission to give a donut to as many police officers in America as possible.

Since beginning his quest in Florida, he has already given away over 7,000.

Tyler has adopted the pseudonym "Donut Boy" and he is currently on a six week road trip across America distributing donuts in American police departments.

He originally got the idea for the gesture in August 2016 when he saw several officers in a store. Since he knows

Bearing а donutemblazoned cape that reads "I DONUT Need A Reason To Thank A Cop", Tyler has mostly paid for the pastries by doing chores around his house, or collecting and selling scrap metal with his grandfather.

# Plants in my Garden

By Mike Beamish Species: Correa 'Boolarra Bitzer' Family: Rutaceae

Derivation:

Correa: Named after Jose Francisco Correa de Serra (1751-1823), permanent secretary, Royal Academy of Sciences, Lisbon, Portugal. Common Name:

None. The hybrid name shown above is one that I have just made up, as is my right as the owner of the plant. If I felt that it was worthwhile, I could officially register this name with the Australian Cultivar Registration Authority (ACRA).

Distribution: This is a seedling that germinated in my garden two years ago, is presumably of mixed parentage and so does not have a natural distribution.

Description: A shrub to 1.5m x 1m with ovate to elliptic leaves to 30mm long and 15mm wide, glossy, dark green on top and paler underneath with a sparse covering of short, rusty, stellate hairs. When crushed, the leaves have a pleasant fruity aroma. Flowers appear over winter and are tubular to 35mm long, very pale pink at the base and becoming pale green towards the tip. The tip is split into five lobes, which are recurved outwards, exposing the exserted stamens and the style. The flowers also have a covering of short, stellate hairs and their colour deepens to a pinky-brown as they age.

Opinion: This plant is growing next to my front door steps on the northern side of the house, where it sits in fairly heavy shade for most of the day, only getting direct sunlight in the early mornings. It is growing in the same position as a Correa that died about five years ago and is presumably a seedling from that previous plant. The previous Correa came from a commercial nursery and was labelled Correa reflexa, but I don't believe it was a 'reflexa', I think it was Correa backhouseana var. orbicularis from Kangaroo Island, possibly a hybrid with Correa decumbens, similar to the named hybrid 'Dancing Lipsticks'. I base my theory on the visual characteristics of the flowers and leaves, even though

I don't have a specimen of this plant any longer. However, there is a cutting from my original plant growing in my mother's garden in Morwell, so I include a photo of it for your consideration.

Now, obviously these two plants are not identical so I'm guessing that another of my Correas has contributed to the genetic makeup of my current plant. The most likely culprit is my Correa glabra, which I think is the Coliban River form from Central

Victoria and is growing about 10 metres away at the end of the driveway on the northern nature strip. This plant was covered in an article back in March 2011, so here is the photo from that article, for comparison.

Since Correas are just about the most promiscuous of native plants (right up there with Grevilleas, Eucalypts and Orchids) and readily cross with each other both in the wild and in gardens, it is very difficult to know their exact heritage. The other options for parental rights would be any of the Correas that are or were once in my garden, and these include a number of Correa reflexa, C. pulchella, C. baeuerlenii or C. 'Eucla Gold'. Since the current plant is paler than its mother. I doubt that any of the red or orange-flowered Correas are the father, as you would think offspring would then be more colourful. C. baeuerlenii has the chefs cap-shaped calyx, of which there is no sign on the seedling. That leaves either the C. glabra or the C. 'Eucla Gold' as the only other possible paleflowered sires. What do you think? Am I on the money?

The other consideration with Correa hybrids is whether they are worth keeping. Generally speaking, the plant should have special characteristics if it is to be deemed worthy. Flower colour



and/or profusion is usually considered most important and my plant probably fails the test in this regard, as it is subtly rather than brightly coloured and so far has been pretty sparse in flowering. Other criteria include size and shape of the plant, leaf colour and characteristics, attractiveness to birds and other critters, scent, fruit, etc. My plant is a bit leggy, but I'll give it a tip prune after it has finished flowering, so we'll see if it bushes up. Otherwise, I doubt that 'Boolarra Bitzer' will be the next big sensation in the native nursery industry, but I believe in giving most plants a chance, so it will remain in the garden for the time being. Hopefully it will surprise me down the track.

Exploration of these complex matters occurs through the use of humble commonplace materials and everyday actions by the artist, friends and his family; in sometimes absurd and innocent public performances.

Denis Beaubois' practice is idea driven rather than tied to a specific medium or material.

His past work has addressed various themes including that of migration and displacement, surveillance, and economics.

Denis Beaubois' projects have been presented internationally at The TATE Modern (London), San Francisco Museum of Modern Art (San Francisco), Museum of Contemporary Art (Cleveland), Museum of Contemporary Art (Sydney), Zero One Biennale (San Jose), Museum of Contemporary Art (Taipei), SCAPE Biennale of Art (New Zealand), Rencontres Internationale (Paris, Berlin), Koldo Mitxelena (San Sebastian) and Transmediale (Berlin).

In 2013 he exhibited at Ryan Renshaw Gallery (Brisbane) and Artspace (Sydney), whilst recently he has shown works at the New Media Gallery in New Westminister and Art Souterrain in Montreal.

He has received numerous awards for his works most notably winning the 1998 Bonn Videonale (Germany), and receiving the Judges special prize for the Internationaler Medien Kunst Preis 2001, ZKM (Germany).

Denis Beaubois has also trained and worked as a performer and was a core member of performance ensemble Gravity Feed for 12 years.

He was also a member of the Post Arrivalists and has performed with Japanese company Gekidan Kaitaisha in the Drifting View X, in Tokyo.



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

#### July Activity Report

At this activity we had Beryl, Ken, Graeme, Wayne, Rose, Mike, Tamara and Darren. Matt and John were also there for the meeting in the car park (they needed to leave after the meeting). We had apologies from Cathy, Peter and Wendy McD. With us for the activity was Melina Bath the State Parliament member (MLC) for Eastern Victoria. She was invited along by Shane because she has an interest in natural spaces and wildlife. She was very interested in what the group does and in seeing some sugar gliders.

The days' task was to complete the winter survey of the approximately 84 nesting boxes located along Billys Creek. It was a very cold day where beanies and gloves were necessary. While it was cold, at least it was dry.

The group started from the car park and began with the nesting boxes nearest Junction Road.

Using the pole mounted camera, each box was located and then the camera was placed through the hole to video and collect still images of what was inside each of the boxes.

The roles of everybody changed throughout the day with different people locating the nesting boxes (found recorded on sectional park maps), while a few other people managed the camera, animal identification and record keeping.



All nesting boxes showed signs of use with scratching around the holes and leaf litter in most boxes. The sugar gliders, who are the most common users of the boxes, live in small family groups and frequently change boxes. Multiple gliders will huddle together in a box especially during the cold of winter.

We stopped for lunch at the Braniffs Road Bridge across Billys Creek. After lunch a smaller group (Rose, Mel and Beryl had left) surveyed the remaining newer boxes up the Butt Butt track and along the Braniff Road track.

Over the day we located at least 27 sugar gliders in the nesting boxes. There may be more found when the photos and videos are looked at on a bigger screen. All gliders

found were huddled deeply into the leaves and grouped tightly together, so what we observed from above, may not include those further from the camera or under other animals.

This was the lowest recorded number of animals found in the boxes. The winter totals have always been lower than the numbers of animals located in summer. Last year in the winter survey, we located 47 sugar gliders. August Activity

We were asked if we were on the "Do Not Call" register.

Each year it needs to be renewed. Ring, 1300 792 958 to have some nuisance calls blocked.

Be prepared that the scammer will say "we are not selling you anything"... but they are.

Have ever had you the phone ring and once answered, there is a five second pause, then the message "Good-bye" is heard.

This call is from a call centre. Hang up.

Computer scammers can now gain access to genuine sales sites, and then add their own link, by writing "click here to purchase"... but don't do it.

By clicking on a link... it's a scam and you won't receive your goods.

Remember if you are asked for money to make money...it's a scam.

Some scammers will advertise items for sale and once paid for in advance, the goods are not delivered.

Know that the Australian Tax office and Centrelink will not ask for money or passwords over the phone, nor verbally threaten you.

Have you been encouraged to click on a computer site that has a hilarious film clip, or still pictures...some of these sites have computer viruses attached.

There are now scams attached to genuine advertisements for property or car sales.

However the information you type in is scammed off to a scam site where unknown to the genuine advertiser the money you electronically transfer, goes to the scammer.

There is a known scam where the same car is advertised with different number plates, and different values!

Always take time to

check various sites for the actual value of the vehicle. Remember, if it is too good to be true...then it's highly likely, it's a scam.

There are scams concerning Microsoft and Telstra... your phone is going to be cut off unless you pay... Australia Post also had a scam..."there's a delivery problem... pay... to receive your parcel".

Remember, banks do not ask for your details including passwords, over the phone.

If you purchase a product from a TV ad, "just pay...\$19.95 postage and handling"...but...if you want to return the item, the cost of return postage will be far greater as these companies pay bulk postage rates. Many people decide it's cheaper to pay for the item, than pay to return it.


Consumer Affairs reminds us to take time to make decisions. Check other computer sites to see if what you are being offered is not a scam.

Remember you have 10 days cooling off period, to decide whether the purchase is suitable.


Travelling conmen. typically from England and Ireland, go from house to house, offering cheap cash sales for a job around your home.

They don't provide a quote, or their business card with full name with contact details and ABN number.

Nor do they offer a receipt. Either the job is

"This massive facility is creating local jobs, supporting local businesses and putting a smile in the Valley," said Minister Pulford.



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

To act as an impartial body with membership drawn from the community and relevant interest groups in Churchill and district.



# Cooking with Noelene



by Noelene Marchwicki **Cheesy Polenta Chips** Spray a 20 x 30 cm slice

tray and set aside. Bring 1 litre of vegetable stock to the boil.

Pour in 220gm of polenta and stir until thickened.

Remove from heat and mix in 100 gm of finely grated Parmesan cheese, a desertspoon (dsp) of butter or margarine and 1 teaspoon(tsp) of Italian herbs.

Pour the mixture into the prepared pan, smooth over the top and cover with cling wrap.

Place the tray in refrigerator till the completely cool and set (allow for at least 3 hours).

This part of the preparation can be done the day before.

When completely set, turn out the polenta and slice into thick chips.

You can freeze the prepared and sliced polenta in an airtight container, separating the layers with baking paper to avoid them sticking

together. To cook ....place the chips

on an oven tray that has been sprayed with oil.

Place in a preheated hot oven 200 deg C, and roast until golden and crisp (25-30 minutes).

I turn my polenta chips once through the cooking process.

#### **Tomato Eggplant Cakes**

Mix 1 tablespoon (tbs) of freshly chopped basil, 1 dsp of ground oregano and add 1 tbs of minced garlic with 1 tsp of chilli paste (optional) with 2 cups of tomato paste.

Wash and trim ends of 2 eggplants, slice very thinly (1/2 cm)Coat the eggplant slices with the tomato mixture on

both sides. Measure out 2/3 of a cup of polenta (corn meal) and press onto the eggplant slices, both sides

Line an oven tray with baking paper and place slices side by side on tray and bake in a preheated oven on 160 deg C for 45 minutes, turning after 30 minutes.

These are fabulously delicious .....! **Pavlova Roll** 

You have to give it a go! Heat your oven to 200 deg C.

Beat 4 egg whites (room temp) to stiff peaks.

In a separate bowl mix together 1 teaspoon (tsp) of cornflour, 1 tsp of white wine vinegar and 1/2 tsp of vanilla extract.

With the electric beaters running add 1 tbs of 150gm castor sugar at a time, adding the cornflour mix half way through, until the mixture is glossy and stiff.

Line your Swiss roll pan (30 x 20 cm) with spray and baking paper.

Spread the meringue mixture evenly over the pan, smooth over and even to the edges.

Bake for 8 minutes, until fluffy and lightly golden.

Remove from oven and it is at this stage you may need a stiff drink as the meringue deflates.

Breathe it's ok.

Dust with sifted icing sugar.

Lay a clean tea towel over



The first pavlova (pav) roll I ever tasted was made by Margaret Hutchinson and it was just delightful.

I remember it was similar to a traditional pavolova but also different as it was soft, pale and puffy .

The pav roll is filled with thickened cream and can be flavoured with a variety of flavours or fresh berries or fruit.

You have to have a strong heart when the soft billowing meringue quickly deflates as it cools, but that's part of the construction.

It is a little messy to make. It is essential you have a good quality Swiss roll tray.

top and quickly invert and remove the baking paper. Set aside to cool.

Whip 300 ml of cream until thickened.

Spread the thickened cream over the cooled meringue, top the cream with lemon curd OR mixed berries OR sliced fresh strawberries sprinkled with a little sifted icing sugar.

Use the tea towel to help roll the meringue forward, the seam ending with underneath.

Slice any excess fruit to decorate the ends of the roll, use a spatula to carefully place on a platter, slice to serve.

Keep covered in refrigerator.



#### **Primary Industries**

Australia's development has always relied on our primary industries - what we can harvest and what we can dig out of the ground. As a consequence, we have produced a large number of stamps depicting these and people industries associated with them.

The first issue was in 1934 to celebrate the development of merino sheep by John Macarthur. The issue comprised of three values, a 2d red, a 3d blue and a 9d purple showing a merino sheep on Macarthur's property at Camden, N.S.W. The 2d value had two printings, one with darkly shaded hills and one with light shading. The design was later used on the 5d purple definitive of 1937 – 56. The next issue was another definitive, the 1/3d Hereford bull.

In 1948, a 2 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> d stamp was issued to honour William Farrer who was instrumental in developing strains of rustfree wheat. Rust was a fungal disease

which was blighting wheat crops across Australia and threatened to wipe out Australia's wheat crop altogether.

Farrer used seeds from other countries to develop new varieties which resisted the fungus.

He also developed a number of strains which could grow in areas of low rainfall,

which allowed the area under wheat to expand and for farmers to survive through drought vears.

In 1951, a 3 ½ d stamp was issued to commemorate the discovery of gold in N.S.W. It depicted John Hargreaves.

In 1953, two strips of three stamps were issued celebrating food production. The green 3d strip and the red 3 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> d strip featured beef cattle,

butter production and wheat harvesting. Later that year a  $3 \frac{1}{2}$  d stamp was issued for Young Farmers Clubs. In 1958 a 4d stamp commemorating the 75th Anniversary of Broken Hill and the mining of silver, lead and zinc there.

In 1961, a 5/- stamp was issued for the Northern Territory Cattle Industry. Two different papers were used for this definitive issue, white and cream. In 1969 a set of four Primary Industry stamps were issued showing sugar, timber, wheat and wool. In 1970 a 5c stamp was issued for the 11th International Grasslands Congress held in Australia for

the first time. National The Development issue of 1970 depicted cotton growing, bauxite mining and the production of oil and natural Animal Science was part of a1971 set and in 1972 a set of four primary industry stamps were issued showing fruit, rice, fish and beef cattle. A further National Development issue in 1973 featured Iron Ore mining.

In 1981 a set of four stamps featured the Gold Rush Era, in 1986 a stamp showed mustering and a strip of five stamps featuring shearing, honouring the song 'Click go the Shears.' In 1989 a set of four stamps showed four common breeds of Australian sheep.

Since then, there have been a number of other issues depicting primary industries in Australia, the latest as recently as 2015.

# Fresh approach to seasonal work in Gippsland

A trial is now underway to encourage unemployed people to take up seasonal horticultural work to get experience and improve their skills.

Government's The Seasonal Work Incentives Trial offers a range of incentives for unemployed people to undertake seasonal horticultural work to help them gain experience and improve their skills.

The Member for Gippsland Darren Chester. said the Seasonal Work Incentive Trial would support job seekers and businesses keen to give workers a start.

"This is a win-win for local workers and growers in the horticultural industry, which is often in need of short-term labour during peak times," Mr Chester said.

"Horticultural work offers excellent practical opportunities for people keen to build their skills and gain work experience. Gippsland has unlimited potential as a vegetable and fresh salad growing hub for Australia and the broader Asian region. I am excited by the opportunities this trial can provide for both our growers and people seeking work."

Minister for Employment Michaelia Cash, said the Seasonal Work Incentives Trial offered financial incentives to support unemployed people to take up work opportunities for up to six weeks.

"The Government understands that the best form of welfare is a job," Minister Cash said.

"The Seasonal Work Incentives Trial is targeted to assist 7,600 unemployed people to undertake seasonal horticultural work, such as fruit picking, to get work experience and build their skills."

The \$27.5 million twoyear trial began at the start of July and is capped at 7,600 participants.

The trial's incentives are available to eligible Newstart and Youth Allowance (Other) recipients who have been receiving those payments continuously for at least three months and are participating jobactive, Transition in Work or to Disability Employment Services.

The incentives include: · participants being able

to earn up to \$5,000 each year from qualifying seasonal horticultural work without it being assessed under the social security income test;

 eligibility for a Seasonal Work Living Away and Travel Allowance of up to \$300 each year, if they undertake qualifying seasonal horticultural work more than 120 kilometres from their home: and


· employment service providers will receive a Provider Seasonal Work Incentive Payment of \$100 per week for up to six weeks a year for each eligible person that they place with eligible farmers.



cemented the students footings into the ground.


The students in the 'Handson-Learning Program' have also been working on gardens throughout the school grounds; cleaning them up, rebuilding container walls and replanting.

well as significant as improvement both in their playing skills and personal growth. They finished as runners up to Cowes Primary. One of our students,


Luke Cheffers competed in the State Cross Country at Bundoora finishing a very respectable 40th in a field of 92 competitors from all over the state.

One of our rebound walls has had a makeover with our Art teacher, Mr Twomey completing murals on both sides.


Yinnar has always been very well supported by its

Have a say on how our country kids are educated Gippslanders with a stake in the education of local students now have a chance to be part of a landmark review

of education in regional, rural and remote areas. Member The for

Gippsland Darren Chester, today encouraged local teachers, parents, students, employers and others with an interest in education to be part of the review initiated by the Government.

The review, launched earlier this year, has reached an important milestone with the release of a discussion paper and launch of an online platform for public submissions.

The discussion paper, prepared by the reviewer Emeritus Professor John Halsey, identifies the key issues and challenges faced by rural students and poses areas of focus to stimulate ideas about possible solutions.

"I urge members of our education community. families and employers to consider the discussion paper and take the opportunity to share their ideas and experiences about how we can best support local students to succeed in school and beyond," Mr Chester said. "We want more regional

students to complete their schooling and go on to further study, training and employment.

As many students begin to look towards the end of their final year of secondary school, there's still an enormous amount of uncertainty for their families about whether they can afford to send their child away from home to attend the university of their choice.

For many families in Gippsland, this is one of the most significant and pressing issues they face.

This independent review is giving the community a chance to provide its feedback on what's working and what's

not." Deputy Prime Minister Barnaby Joyce said the Halsey Review was part of the Government's efforts to ensure regional, rural and remote students achieve success at school.

"Students living outside our major cities face unique challenges compared to their city cousins which can cause significant disparities between their education outcomes," Minister Joyce said.

"And the difference starts early. We know regional, rural and remote students are more likely to have developmental vulnerabilities when they start school, such as lower language and cognitive skills. Their NAPLAN results are generally lower and they go on to be under-represented in higher education."

Minister for Education Training and Simon Birmingham, said the public submissions would highlight issues to be further explored by the review through face-toface consultations from July to October.

"Having now delivered a true model of needs-based funding for Australian

schools - which results in an average annual rate of per student funding growth for students in regional and remote areas of 4.9 per cent compared with 4.1 per cent for all students - we are determined to ensure schools are armed with the best information to put this record funding to the most effective use possible," Minister Birmingham said.

"The inquiry is particularly keen to

hear from members of the education community, families, employers, government agencies and the philanthropic sector about how best we can support regional, rural and remote students to succeed in school and beyond."

The final report and recommendations of the

independent review will be provided to Government by the end of this year. Submissions close on August 29, 2017 at 5pm.
