> to the literature, this species is very susceptible to Cinnamon Fungus and other soil pathogens, so I'm probably lucky that the plant has survived at all. The literature also says that this species will tolerate plenty of sun, but prefers some shade and some moisture, which pretty much fits the bill in its current location, although it can be tough to get water to penetrate the soil on the gentle slope on which it is planted. According to my records, I successfully propagated this species from three cuttings in autumn 2000, but have no idea where these plants ended up.

Gluten Free Christmas Cake

Preheat your oven to 160 deg C fan forced.

Prepare a 20cm round cake tin with a spray of cooking oil and baking paper, lining the sides and base.

In a large bowl combine 600 gm of mixed dried fruit.

1 tsp of ground cinnamon, 1 tsp of vanilla extract, 1 tsp of nutmeg, the juice zest of 1 orange,

3 tbs of extra virgin olive

3 lightly beaten eggs. Now add 200gm of almond meal, stirring through with a wooden spoon.

Finally fold through 50 gm of chopped walnuts.

Spoon the batter into your prepared cake tin, allow the tin to sit for 15 minutes on your bench.

Bake for 1 hour and 30 minutes, check with a



skewer to see if it comes out clean, if not bake for a further 30 minutes (cover the top of the tin with a sheet of loose fitting baking paper to prevent over browning.)

Cool, then remove from the tin to a wire rack, when completely cooled store in an airtight container in the fridge for up to 1 month.

leading initiatives in recycling plastic tops.


These tops are shredded and made into a filament by Envision Hands.

Envision Hands is a not-for-profit community initiative that uses 3D printing to turn plastic waste into mechanical hands and arms for kids, with the products being sent around the world.

Approximately 250 lids are used to make a small hand, however the wastage ends up being approximately 500 lids by the time it has been made.

For an arm, approximately 500 lids are used with a wastage of approximately 1000 caps.

Hazelwood Rotary is proud to be a partner with Mid Valley based Donut King, which has collected tops over several months for this wonderful initiative.

They instantly were successful in Australia as they provided a new form of entertainment.

Every major town had its own radio station either independently or as a part of a network.

Quiz shows, serials for adults and children, talent quests and community-based music request shows were hugely popular.

The regions which were not covered by commercial radio were catered for in 1929 with the advent of the Federal government's ABC network.

The radio serials became part of the daily ritual in а the rural areas with country women tuning in to 'The Lawsons' and its follow-up 'Blue Hills' every weekday at 12:45.

The Snake Gully Cup rivalled the Melbourne Cup, broadcast on the same day in November and schoolchildren played out the adventures of Dick Barton, Special Agent. Quizmasters Bob Dyer and Jack Davy became our first non-sporting celebrities.

Radio only lost its appeal with the advent of television in 1956. Ask Grandma and Grandpa about radio and the annual show and the stories will flow.

Are you being targeted? Australians have already lost more money to online **SCAMWATCH**

shopping scams in 2019 than in the entire previous year, and Scamwatch is warning people to be cautious of online shopping scams in the lead up to the holiday season.

So far in 2019, reported losses from online shopping scams are over \$4 million, well in excess of the 2018 total figure of \$3.28 million.

"Scammers often try to take advantage of people doing their Christmas shopping." ACCC Deputy Chair Delia Rickard said.

"Reported losses have tripled over the last three years and it is concerning that losses from this year are already so high."

Watch out for these common online shopping scams

* Fake websites/stores: scammers will set up fake online stores, on websites or social media, which can look like genuine online retailers. Many of these offer luxury items at very low prices but

you may receive a fake item or nothing at all.

* Fake sellers: scammers may pose as genuine sellers on classifieds websites.

The scammer may claim they are travelling and an agent will deliver the goods once you have paid, but you won't receive the goods and will be unable to contact the seller.

"Some of the most commonly reported products that scammers are attempting to sell this year are shoes, smartphones and tickets to events, with losses from these items so far exceeding half a million dollars," Ms Rickard said.

"Warning signs for online shopping scams include low advertised extremely prices and requests to pay through direct bank transfer or cryptocurrency.

We encourage everyone

to do their research before making an online purchase and if purchasing expensive goods, not to make payment until they have inspected the product.'

Ms Rickard added that spreading scam warnings with loved ones over the holiday period can help protect vulnerable consumers.

"Many people enjoy the convenience of online shopping but it is important to remember that there can be risks involved.

If you do think you have been scammed, contact your bank as soon as possible," Ms Rickard said.



Closing the digital divide

Opportunities to improve digital connectivity in Gippsland have been highlighted in a new plan developed by the Gippsland Regional Partnership and funded by the Victorian Government. Member for Eastern Victoria Harriet Shing, has welcomed the launch of the Gippsland Digital Plan, supported by a share in \$1 million through the Government's Connecting Regional Communities Program.

The plan is one of nine across the state being completed through the Government's Regional Partnerships, after each region identified digital connectivity as a priority issue.

A series of events will take place across Sale and Morwell to mark the Gippsland plan's launch, with the Committee for Gippsland welcoming experts from Australia's largest telecommunications organisations to discuss opportunities for the Gippsland region as part of showcasing the Digital Plan.

The Gippsland Digital Plan has identified current gaps in the region's digital landscape, while outlining priority actions for how these gaps can be addressed.

It brings together information on the region's digital infrastructure and services to establish the region's current and emerging gaps, needs and priorities when it comes to connectivity. Priorities identified in the space include addressing mobile blackspots, providing better services for remote and vulnerable communities, promoting stronger NBN and future technologies, facilitating digital literacy training and enhancing connectivity for tourism across the region.

The Government is rolling out free Wi-Fi across the Latrobe Valley and will deliver an enhanced high-

speed broadband network covering the Morwell CBD, Tech School and Innovation Precinct and Gippsland Logistic Precincts.

The Government also recently celebrated the installation of the 150th new mobile tower as part of the Mobile Black Spot Program.

Member for Eastern Victoria Harriet Shing said "Gippsland's residents, businesses and communities have identified reliable digital connectivity as a key priority – and this comprehensive Gippsland Digital Plan will deliver better technology services to the region.

We're determined to bridge the digital divide in regional Victoria by engaging with local communities, identifying and delivering priorities like free

Wi-Fi across the Valley, and establishing a plan of action to improve mobile and broadband reliability."

Kornsa. Margrit, the mother, is very distressed as her husband is away and she fears for the safety of her two daughters, Lauga and Steina. She is assured that the soldiers will remain to guard the family's safety. When Agnes arrives she is in irons, her hair and clothing are filthy and she has clearly been mistreated.

Whilst still very wary Margrit and shows compassion removes the chains, cleans her and gives her fresh clothing. Lauge is very resentful of Agnes' presence but Steina tries to befriend her.

As part of the justice system a priest is assigned to each prisoner in an attempt to get them to repent. Agnes asks for Toti, an Assistant Priest who she remembers showed her a kindness in the past. Toti struggles with his duties at first but over time he forms a relationship with her and it seems he may be falling in love with her.

In the crowded conditions of the family home everyone can hear the conversations between Toti and Agnes and they begin to understand her past

She was born out of wedlock and abandoned by her mother as a small child, then the foster mother who taught her the sagas and educated her died when she was still young, so she spent the rest of her life in servitude.

Toti becomes ill and is unable to visit Agnes, who feels abandoned by him. One night she is unable to sleep and tells the full story of what happened on the night of the murders to Margrit.

The landscape of Iceland is bleak and this permeates the whole story – the cold, the harsh living conditions and the difficulty of travel and communication. Most of our Book Group thoroughly enjoyed this book because, whilst very sad, it is beautifully written and the story is compelling. The reader becomes heavily invested in the fate of Agnes, and as the story comes to an end we were all hoping for justice to prevail.

If there was a fire on the outskirts of Churchill are you prepared?

Preparing your property is not just for those who live in the rural area outside Churchill, it is for everyone who lives in a town as well. It is essential for those on the outskirts, such as Acacia Way, Birch Drive, Manning Drive, Canterbury Way, Ikara Way, Glendonald Road and the Haverbrack Road areas to be prepared. You are prime candidates for fire impact given the right wind conditions. If a fire was to start in the bush/grassland opposite your place it could quickly spread to your property through embers and the wind carrying the flames across a road space.

Are your lawns mowed to a length of 100 mm or less?

Are your gutters cleaned or are they full of weeds dried and brown, ready for an ember to catch them on fire.

Are your air vents under the house covered or open for embers to be sucked in and start a fire under your house?

Have you cleared away bushes and trees from up close to your house?

Do you have a water storage idea such as filling your wheelie bins with water? To keep water in your weather for a day or two after

guttering to help suppress embers, a tennis ball can be placed in the top of the downpipe.

Have you worked out if you will stay to defend or evacuate? Where you will go? Have you let the people where you are going know that is your plan?

Have you prepared a set of clothes to include a wide brimmed hat, sturdy shoes or boots, woollen or cotton long sleeved jumper and long pants, a scarf to protect your face, gloves and goggles to wear should the fire front be near your place?

Remember, radiant heat can kill. Cover up and protect vour body.

These are all ways you can prepare in case of fire on our town's outskirts.

Remember you may not be able to rely on the fire brigade to be at your place in an emergency every time. **Fire Restrictions**

Fire restrictions came into force in Latrobe City on Monday December 16.

Please, prepare your properties now. Once fire restrictions commence, you will not be allowed to burn off or have any fires in the open air.

LCHS workers walked their way around the world five times.

More than 950 people collectively walked five laps around the world in four weeks as part of the annual Latrobe 10,000 Steps Challenge.

For the fourth consecutive year, Latrobe Community Health Service challenged workplaces across the Latrobe Valley to start stepping at least 10,000 steps a day.

In 2019 they did just that, with a record 112 teams across 23 workplaces taking part.

Ten thousand steps is the recommended minimum step count for a healthy, active person.

Regular physical activity – like going for a 30-minute brisk walk – can help you maintain or achieve a healthy body weight, reduce stress and help you sleep better.

In the long run, regular physical activity can help to reduce the risk of developing preventable diseases like type 2 diabetes, heart disease and Latrobe 10,000 Steps Challenge winners. stroke. none "We run this challenge IAF/

every year to get more people moving and hopefully start healthier habits that can stick with them for life," Rob Preston, Health Promotion Officer at Latrobe Community Health Service, said.

"Not only does physical activity make people healthier in body and mind, but active people are usually more motivated and productive at work.

Walking is just one of many ways to exercise throughout your day."

This year's participants took more than 276 million steps during the four-week challenge, and averaged 10,300 steps a day.

This is the equivalent of walking from Melbourne to Perth and back every day throughout the entire challenge.

The highest stepping team was from Latrobe City Council, captained by Ronda Bruerton and aptly named 'It's all fun and games until everyone realised that none of this was fun' - or IAFAGUERTNOTWF for short.

"After finishing second in our 2018 challenge, Ronda's team came to the start line highly motivated.

They led the challenge from day one all the way to the finish line, and completed just over five million steps," Mr Preston said.

The Runners-up award went to Latrobe Community Health Service's marketing and communications team, who beat a fast-finishing team from the Department of Human Services in Morwell.

The Latrobe 10,000 Steps Challenge will run again in 2020. In the meantime, workplaces can run their own challenge for free at www.10000steps.org.au


Thank you to Latrobe City Council for the grant we have received to help put in a further pathway in the park. This extra help from Council is most appreciated.

A nostalgic piece of history

Ford Prefect ute By Leo Billington

'Hemmings Motor News' strives to enhance the experience of the collector-car enthusiast by publishing high-quality, authoritative specialty articles. The publication was founded by Ernest Hemmings in Quincy, Illinois, in 1954. The first issue consisted of four pages, and 500 copies were sold at 50 cents per copy.

Today, Hemmings has 219,000 more than subscribers, paying US\$31.95 annually. In June 2011, 'Hemmings Motor News' published a lead article about the Ford Prefect Ute.

"These cute little trucks were manufactured exclusively in Australia and derived from the 1938-'49 Ford Prefect E93A four-door saloons. The coupe utility was built from 1949-'53. Designed as a working Prefect, the unique coupe utility or ute body style was crafted from the same four-door, five-passenger saloon chassis and shared the same 94-inch wheelbase. At the time, Fords sold in Australia were shipped unassembled, and then constructed at Ford's Geelong assembly plant, to

save import tariff charges for



assembled vehicles.

Many farmers wanted to haul light loads inexpensively without having to pay a fullsize pickup's price tag. The ute is more business coupe than pickup, with a 51/2-foot utility box and rumble seat-

looking tailgate built off the rear deck and into the rear The coachwork fenders. rear body was designed in Australia.

There will be many around Churchill, Yinnar and Hazelwood who will remember these cute little trucks

In his book, 'A History of the Ford Motor Company in Australia', Geoff Easdown wrote that the ute's (Ford ute that is) life story began in 1932 with a letter from a farmer's wife, who was tired of arriving at church each week smelly, dirty and sometimes wet from rain, having travelled to church in the farm truck. Ford Australia's automotive designer at the time, Lewis Bandt picked up the letter. In 1934, utes began rolling off Ford's Geelong assembly line.

cute little trucks - Ford Prefect - were competing with Holden's FX 48-215 ute, the first car 'made in Australia, for Australia'. Prime Minister Ben Chifley, launched production of the car on November 29, 1948, describing the FX as a 'beauty'.

Ford ute bodies continued in Australia with the 100E series Prefects in the mid-1950s and then the Mainline cars in the late 1950s before Ford started producing the Falcon and Falcon utes in 1960

Maryvale Motors Pty Over 15 years later, these Ltd, long ago located in Commercial Road, Morwell

was the local Ford dealer back then. Naturally, they advertised regularly in the 'Morwell Advertiser', always keen to market the cute truck. For example, in October 1952:

"1950 Ford Prefect Utility. This is an extra good vehicle and can be purchased at a reasonable figure."

On March 26, 1953, Maryvale Motors advertised a 1951 model, suggesting a test drive first:

"1951 Ford Prefect Utility, new condition. We suggest a trial."

Even Morwell the Sewerage Authority used the cute truck. One was advertised for sale in October 1954:

"FOR SALE BY TENDER 1 FORD PREFECT UTILITY TRUCK. Tenders addressed to the Chairman. Morwell Sewerage Authority, will be received up to 12 noon on Friday, October 22, 1954, for the purchase of one Ford Prefect Utility Truck late 1951 model.


This vehicle is in good running order, and may be inspected at the Authority's Depot Hazelwood Road, Morwell, between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. daily." There were also private

sales:

"Ford Prefect Utility, late 1951 model, only done 5,000 miles, just as new". 'Morwell Advertiser' March 26, 1953.

The accompanying photograph shows a cute truck sleeping, awaiting its fate at a local clearing sale several years ago. I wonder where it rests nowadays.



We postponed our Maple Massacre at Budgeree Bush Reserve in November so that we didn't slide down the hill in the rain. We'll re-schedule it in autumn when the little seedling trees will be easier to see. We don't think that there are now any adult maple trees left in the reserve that are big enough to spread seeds. If

Yinnar / Yinnar South Landcare Group there were, autumn would be a bad time because we'd have to cut off all the winged seed pods and take them away. We do get asked quite a bit about whether maple trees are all invasive. What we say is that the Sycamore Maple (Acer pseudo-plantanus) is an invasive weed of wet forests. We know that it has also

Residents Leave Hazelwood House

Benetas has advised that residents of Hazelwood House will be transferred to Dalkeith House in Traralgon on December 10 and that the complete relocation will take only a few days.

Apparently all residents have agreed to transfer to the Traralgon site and Benetas states that they are providing additional support and pastoral care for a month or so as part of their transition plan to ensure a "seamless transfer" for residents.

Once the Churchill facility is empty the site will be secured and the building alarmed.

Each survey takes ten minutes

reached the end of their exhaustive list of possible occupants. We can only hope that they get a positive result. Meantime, Churchill has

lost its aged care facility and CDCA is still waiting for a response to our Petition to Federal Parliament which is required from the responsible Minister within a 90 day period (which expires in December).

Some members of our community are interested in exploring the idea of providing a community run aged care facility at Hazelwood House. Benetas seemed a little incredulous at this idea, although they did not say they would not cooperate.

It would take significant work to become an 'approved' aged care provider, be granted funding for beds, employ staff and to source the money that would be required to upgrade the facility.

In the first instance, a Building Survey Report is needed to ascertain the state of the building and what would need to be done to upgrade to required standards (and allow for an estimation of costs). Even this first step is proving to be difficult.

CDCA has recently been busy working on the 'Shop Local' campaign, in partnership with local traders, the Neighbourhood Centre and the Churchill & District News.







Get bushfire prepared with another water source

Gippsland Water is reminding the community not to rely solely on town water supply systems during an emergency this bushfire season.

"Our system is designed to meet everyday drinking water needs," managing director Sarah Cumming said. "While we have several back-up measures in place, supplies can be threatened if the system is placed under extreme load." Ms Cumming said during a bushfire event a number of factors can put strain on a town's water supply. "If every resident in a street is filling buckets or running hoses at the same

water pressure.

CFA tankers may also need to tap into our supply to fight a fire, which can reduce the pressure of the water to the point that supply to customers may be interrupted. That's why we're urging our customers to include another source

of water in their fire plan. If residents are planning to stay and defend their property the CFA recommends having at least 10,000 litres of water available as a separate water source at minimum.

While we urge customers to be prepared, we encourage all community members to

follow the advice of the CFA, which is that it is safest to leave early," Ms Cumming concluded.





These conversations are age-appropriate but may stir some feelings within your child.


