# Relay For Life Celebrate - Remember - Fight Back



The tenth annual Latrobe Relay for Life event was held at Gaskin Park Number 1 oval on the weekend of October 27 and 28, raising the outstanding amount of over \$97,500 plus.

The aim of Relay for Life is to celebrate with the survivors and carers, remember those who have been lost and never stop fighting back for a cancer free world.

Thirty-one teams registered to participate, a culmination of a ctic period of fund-raising. Interviewing some of the teams as

they set up or walked along, revealed a dedication to the cause, with many having competed over the years.

A full program kept the participants involved in the eighteen hours of challenges. These included a netball clinic, Sun Smart relay, Scavenger Hunt, the Miss Relay where the boys dressed in women's clothing, the height of fashion, including high heels and paraded like girls around the track. This challenge itself raised \$1.250.75. Others included trivia, paper plane flying, egg

and spoon races, and watermelon eating.

The opening ceremony was held at 4pm with the Survivors and Carers walk followed by afternoon tea, supplied by the Moe and District Cancer Council Volunteer Unit, with help from Woolworths in Moe who donated two platters of fruit.

Children were able to have their faces painted in wonderful designs.

Flannelette Roses team have nine members with some children. They held a school disco, a garage sale and sold homemade jams. On the day they sold roses.

Monica and Kate Chisholm lost their husband and father, Peter, to skin cancer at the age of forty. Peter's love of flannelette shirts and roses was the reason for choosing their name. Monica's and Kate's friends wanted to support them in their desire to raise funds for a cure.

Last year was their first year. They raised over \$5,000 and this year they hoped to raise more. The participants agreed that the good spirit of working together was good for all, especially the children, to help them with understanding the issues involved.

Moe Mad Hatters has a team of eight plus. They have been raising funds for twenty-five years and have been at every Relay. They held a raffle with eight prizes and raised \$800-900, sold a tent and had a soup and sandwich lunch with some very generous attenders who added extra money. As part of the Moe and District Cancer Council Volunteer Unit they are dedicated to fund raise throughout the year.

Mis Prints has twenty members, employees and family from Gippsland Trade printers. The staff took a salary sacrifice, held a garage sale, did a mystic reading and had raffles and a competition to raise their funds. They did it because it is good fun and a good cause, and most importantly, it is a good memorial occasion because many of their team had been affected by cancer and had their stories to tell.

The Sixties Swinging Scouts team was made up of Scouts and they raised their funds by a door knock, personal donations and by Mitchell Whelan shaving his head. They have an annual involvement because of family members dying of cancer. They want to make a difference and so help this good cause.

The Flaming Turtles are a group of fifteen Kurnai Churchill Junior Campus students. They raised their money by mainly cash donations. The team leader had encouraged the group to participate as she wanted to give the young people a positive attitude towards, and a desire to help others.

Valley Angels has eleven team members with one special member called Sophie Scholes, who is about nine years old. Sophie's mum, Marnie, showed Sophie the article and she read about the Relay for Life in the Churchill and District News and thought this was something she wanted to do. One group had asked for people to join them, so Sophie rang Helen Spicer and joined the team. Sophie has made and sold bookmarks, pens, pencils and bracelets at the school Mother's Day stall



with support from her school. She has also asked family and friends to sponsor her, which worked out very profitably. She did this because quite a few of her family members have died or had cancer and she wants to contribute to raising money for research and she loves the challenges of the Relay.

Woolies/Advantage Wonkas have a big team of twenty-one. They ran a fun day at Churchill shopping centre, had collection tins at the registers in both shops, sold hot dogs and held a raffle. An email to Advantage head quarters netted a donation of \$400. Bailey McLure is a young member of this team and he raised the most amount for personal sponsorship. The families of the staff have also been very supportive. Everyone has been touched by cancer! The team would like to thank the community for their great support in donating at the work sites. They really want a cure for cancer.

Churchill Champions has a team of eight compared with twenty-seven in 2011, but they have still raised just over

\$3,000. Their funds came through Ritchie's Community Benefits, and two party plan events. The reason they get involved is to raise awareness and money and to be part of the Relay event. This brings everyone together to celebrate the efforts put in throughout the year, with the benefit of helping research for a cure for cancer.

Witches in Stitches is a team of nine members who held BBQs at Woolworths and collected personal donations for their group effort. They have been involved for five years now and consider the event a fun way to raise money for a cause that touches everyone. [A further report from this team appears elsewhere in this issue. Their excellent tent decoration won them a prize.]

The Fly by Nighters is a team from the Latrobe Valley Aero Club, and consists of fourteen members. They raised their funds by holding a pizza and fish and chips nights, and a coffee and cake night at the Aero Club. Sandra, a female pilot member has grandchildren at Mirboo North Secondary College and they decided to get involved. With permission from their Vice Principal, they held an out-of-uniform and crazy hair day.

Janine Hayes is Event Organiser, and also team captain of this team. Theys want to thank her for all her work.

Everyone has been touched by cancer, so this team relays in memory of those lost and for research for a cure.

#### **Churchill Fire Brigade - Presentation Night Awards**



Members of the Churchill Brigade hosted invited guests and members from other local brigades at the Presentation Night on Saturday October 20, 2012, at the Churchill Hotel.

The guests included the Deputy Chief Officer Alen Slijepcevic, Shane Mynard Operations Officer, and Darrell White representing Latrobe City Council.

Captain Steve Barling welcomed everyone and thanked them for coming to share in the celebration of the night. He commented that the preceding twelve months had seen great things happen for the Churchill Brigade. The new shed was complete and fitted out for use, due largely to Graeme Renwick whom he thanked. New gear had been purchased for the station, and powerful personal torch equipment had also been bought to improve night fire fighting safety. The floor of the station had been treated, Fire Equipment Maintenance (FEM) had been productive, and a new pumper was to arrive in the near future.

Steve continued by saying that training sessions needed to continue to be a strong focus to ensure the members were ready for the fire season ahead. He urged the members

to take up the challenge and practise, practise, practise.

Graeme Renwick and his supporters were thanked for their effort with fire equipment maintenance, which brings in funds for the brigade. These funds help the brigade to increase its resources.

The membership attendance has declined over the year, but Steve is hopeful this will improve as the fire season approaches. 2012 has the potential for fires after the increased growth due to the wet year.

Steve thanked the officers of the brigade for their support especially in light of his extra work with the Group.

"Volunteering is a personal choice," said Steve. "Contributing brings rewards as you see the benefits you get out of it." Brigade members' families were also thanked for their support and tolerance.

Steve called upon the Deputy Chief Officer to say a few words. Alen started by saying that February 7, 2009, changed the way we see fire for ever with its death and destruction. Since then many changes have been made over the last three years and more will come. The changes will be positive. Alen also thanked the members and their

chilly day. Many of swimmers came from all over Victoria during the course of the weekend, which adds to the local economic benefit to our 1 o c a 1 community. Well done to



#### A little bit about Tough Mudder Sydney

Once again myself and a group of equally mad friends set off for Tough Mudder, this event being set at Glenworth Valley on the Central Coast north of Sydney.

Tough Mudder is a brutal 20km obstacle course that will challenge you mentally and physically. It was designed by British Special Forces to raise money for Legacy.

We set off on our adventure of excruciating pain and torture at 8am. We soon lost half of our team due to some of them having legs up to my elbows, so we just stayed at a steady pace.

Some of the 26 obstacles included. The Berlin Walls - 4 metre high walls to scale over. Easy enough to get to the top with teamwork but a little bit daunting the drop on the other side. Especially when you're short and your legs are a long way from the ground. Trench Warfare - crawling through mud filled underground tunnels. The Funky Monkey - monkey bars that go up on an angle over freezing cold water, some of the bars spin and are very hard to grip. The Arctic Enema a cold dunking under water that is full of ice that literally left me gasping for air. Walk the Plank - a 5 metre jump into a deep muddy pond. I could have sworn it looked and felt like 12 metres. The Mud Mile - that was a mixture

of waist deep mud and clay . Finally Electric Shock Therapy where I was actually blown off my feet and momentarily knocked unconscious. When I tried to get up I was knocked straight back off my feet again, so I decided the only way was to crawl out on my stomach, sustaining another two good belts along the way. That one hurt a great deal and I don't think I would like to do that again. Well, till next time anyway

The one thing I really admire about an event like TM is that you get strangers helping strangers all the

way through the event, and a lot of friendships are made even if they are only for the day.

The terrain was some of the most amazing I have ever seen in Australia with breathtaking views of hills, valleys and rivers. Would I do it again? YES. Its got to be one of the best ways to see our beautiful country.

"Legacy is a charity providing services to Australian families suffering financially and socially after the incapacitation or death of a spouse or parent, during or after their defence force service".

#### **Anzac Centenary**

Monash University has launched a new project designed to capture community memories of World War One (WWI).

As Australia approaches the Centenary of the Great War, Monash Vice-Chancellor and President, Professor Ed Byrne, said Monash was the most appropriate university to lead research in the field.

"We are not just a centre of scholarly excellence, we are also the University that bears the name of our country's most distinguished soldier, General Sir John Monash," Professor Byrne said.

"The University is developing 100 stories, symbolic of the 100 years since the outbreak of WWI."

The stories are to be drawn across the length and breadth of Australia, mindful that every community, large and small, was affected by the conflict and will highlight the ongoing cost of war to the community as a whole

"The centenary is less than two years away. We need to find new ways of remembering that speak to the culturally diverse society that we live in today," Professor Byrne said.

"It is important to remember not just the men and women who gave their lives, but also those who returned to Australia, the gassed, the crippled, those irreparably damaged by war."

The project will also highlight the contribution of

women and indigenous Australians, two groups often marginalised by conventional military history.

Monash released the first 20 of the 100 stories today, sending them to every secondary school in Victoria and offering them to major government agencies, such as the National Museum, the National Archives and the Department of Veterans' Affairs.

"This is an instance of the University placing scholarship at the service of the community and very much in keeping with the Monash tradition," Professor Byrne said.

Monash University has invited Returned Services Groups and the wider community to nominate further case studies for the 100 stories program.

The research team is being led by Professor Bruce Scates, from Monash University's National Centre for Australian Studies. Professor Scates is a leading authority on war and remembrance and the chair of an expert panel appointed by the Anzac Centenary Advisory Board.

At our Saturday Breakfast on October 27, we were treated to a 'whirlwind' tour of 'Sustainability - A World View', by Malcolm Grant, the course coordinator of the Sustainability Diploma at GippsTAFE.

Sustainability, Malcolm told us, means to achieve a form of existence, which can be maintained indefinitely.

He encouraged us to consider the capacity of human systems to provide for the full range of human concerns, long term. The long-term survival of our species depends on it!

We were encouraged to think of the 'stuff' we need, and the 'stuff' we don't need.

The concept of first, second and third world, needs to be redefined. We are now all one world and we need to think at that level only.

At the conclusion of a most thought provoking and erudite presentation, those who had managed to stay the course with Malcolm's whirlwind presentation, felt we should have been given quite a few credits to our Diploma course in Sustainability which Malcolm teaches!!!

When we have recovered from this session, we may be brave enough to tackle the next instalment!

#### **Chaplain's Reflections**

There is much in the Hebrew and Christian Scriptures that troubles me deeply. Some passages or stories disturb and challenge my ideas and understanding of God and of our relationship with God. For me, the story of Job is a bit like that.

If I take it literally, it makes me uncomfortable and raises some very thorny questions about the nature of God. But if taken as it was written; as a wisdom story, it has much to tell us.

The book of Job was probably written about 200BCE by a Jewish scholar to a community of people undergoing suffering.

They were Jobs' godly sufferers. In his story, the author of the book of Job broke out of the tight, logical mould of the traditional orthodox theology of his day that said 'good' people will never suffer. Instead of offering logical arguments, the author tells a story rich in meaning and from which we can still learn so much today.

Job the righteous man, suffers the loss of his children and worldly possessions, is blighted by horrendous physical discomfort and lectured by his closest friends.

Although stretched to breaking point, Job refuses to curse or turn away from God.

The story ends with God speaking to Job from the whirlwind and telling him to 'gird up your loins like a man,' (to get prepared to get going- a call to action). In the whirlwind was no gentle Creator's breath but a dynamic, awesome force. Elisha needed the still small voice but Job needed the whirlwind.

What do we need to hear God?

In Job's response, we discover one of the key themes of the story: it was only after Job's suffering that he could 'see' God. This is not a physical seeing but an inner, spiritual one. Through Job's hardships and trials his inner sight and understanding opened to a understanding of God's nature, love and presence. None of the material rewards with which God blessed him compared to his new, intimate knowing of God.



It is good to know, that no matter what life throws at us, God is there and calls us on to bigger and better lives grounded in God's



We have two adult children - Sarah and her partner John live in Mt. Waverley; Matthew, his partner Eli-sha and our grandson Logan live in


I spent an enjoyable and rewarding 23 years teaching in various preschools in the Latrobe Valley before I felt God's call to ordained ministry.

to be recognised for the contribution they make to our region.





#### **Churchill Gardening Group**

Hi all, here it is almost Christmas again.

It seems like only yesterday that we took down our C h r i s t m a s decorations and now it's time to put them up again almost!!

Now is the perfect time to plant your tomatoes, if newly bought maybe let them harden off in a sheltered spot for a couple of days, then give them a soak in Seasol and water, then plant.

Drive in stakes
for the tall varieties. Basil and
marigolds make good
companions for tomatoes.

All vegies can now be planted, seeds or seedlings need rich soil with added compost mulch (chopped lucerne is excellent) water and watch them GROW. Keep the slugs and snails at bay.

Small plantings of all vegies every week or so, works well, that way you don't have a feast or famine but an ongoing supply. Strawberries are now fruiting, keep up the liquid feeding, place straw or other mulch around the plants, pine needles are very good for this, and once again watch out for those snails.

Bearded irises are coming into their own right now, there are many wonderful colours, just to mention a few - there are bi colours, bi tones, speckles and stripes.

They suit our hot summers



as they like to have their rhizomes exposed to the sun and don't require much water.

I planted a number of foxgloves in the hope that they would all flower around the same time but no such luck - some are out and some still to do so.

My poppies are giving a great show in my garden both the flanders and oriental poppies.

My clematis are also blooming beautifully.

I planted 2 plants in each hole and as they grow and entwine with each other it appears that each plant is multi coloured when flowering.

When planting clematis they like their heads in the sun and their roots shaded, so I have placed a rock strategically over the root area.

That's all for this month. Happy gardening and don't forget the sun block.







#### Friends of Morwell National Park

Hello everyone and welcome to this month's newsletter.

This month we will report about the recent Koala count and other October activities. The group also had the opportunity to check out the new toilet at Kerry Road.

Last month in the October activity, the work group started clearing fallen trees from Billys' Creek Track. They did not get far since they encountered a massive tree blocking the track, which was too large for them to remove. Parks staff have cleared this tree over the last month and access to this part of the park has been restored.

Recently the Grand Strzelecki Track has won a national award. The walk track won the 2012 Parks and Leisure Australia Award of Excellence, Inclusive and Connected Communities Award.

This award supports volunteer groups who put their heart and soul into initiating a project like this, and taking part in the ongoing commitment of setting up and maintaining the tracks.

The whole Grand Strzelecki Track consists of 110 kilometers of walking tracks and 70 creek crossings with many of these being on our National Park.

The Grand Strzelecki Track was closed because of winter floods in Billy's Creek. The track is now open with the track's volunteer group having put a few days of work into improving the track. Sleepers have been added to steep areas and access along the track has been improved.

Next month Parks Victoria will again hold their Friends and Volunteers BBQ Dinner in Traralgon at Bert Thompson Reserve (behind Red Rooster in Argyle Street, Traralgon) on Sunday November 18, 2012, (same day as our next activity) starting at 5.30pm.

The BBQ dinner is to celebrate the significant contributions made by Friends Groups and volunteers in park management during 2012. Soft drinks and food will be provided. BYO drinks, plastic plates, cutlery and chairs.

#### October Activity Reports

Sunday October 21

In October there were two activities both on October 21. In the morning there was the Orchid Walk and in the afternoon there was the Koala Count.

#### Orchid Walk

For this activity we had Wendy, John, Margaret, Mike, Cathy, Brenda, Graeme, Ashlee, Craig and Darren in attendance. For Brenda, Graeme and Ashlee it was their first activity. Graeme met the group last month while they were track clearing and he alerted Ken to an early flowering Butterfly Orchid. Ken's photograph of this orchid was in the last newsletter. Brenda was along looking especially for orchids. Ashlee is a volunteer at

the local wildlife refuge.

The day started off very overcast and rain was a possibility. Fortunately it only rained a little during our walk. The group decided to walk to Foster's Gully since it should have had the most orchids for us to see at this time of year. During the walk the following orchids were seen: Common Bird Orchid, Mountain Greenhood, Wax Lip Orchid, Sun Orchid and Butterfly Orchids which looked ready to flower in the next month.

It was good to walk with some experts who could quickly identify what was found. Most orchids found were just at the leaf stage, few were in flower. With it being overcast and wet, the conditions were not the best for finding

flowers. It was surprising that many small plants that you would just walk past were orchids, pre or post flowering.

#### **Koala Count**

For the Koala count a large group (26 people) was ready for seeking the elusive koalas. It was especially good since the weather was not great and rain was very possible. We were joined by a few family groups and a few locals. The event was well advertised with interviews on ABC Radio, WIN TV coverage and newspaper articles. Along for the journey was also a cameraman from WIN television taking footage for WIN news.

All of the walkers were organized into three groups. Each group had at least five walkers. The first group to depart was led by Peter, Cathy and Mike and they travelled over the Stringybark Ridge Walk. They were the most successful by locating 6 koalas. Ken's group with Craig, travelled by car to Jumbuk Road and walked back along the Jumbuk Road fire track to the Kerry Road car park. They had the more difficult terrain to travel and spotted two koalas. The last group was led by Beryl and Darren and they walked the Foster's Gully track. This group spotted two koalas making a total of 10 koalas located during the count.

The WIN cameraman followed the group that travelled the Foster's Gully Track. The footage he shot was shown during the following week. The total of 10 koalas was slightly higher than the

numbers located during the counts for the last three years.

Over the day, people who were at both activities, had spent the morning looking at the ground seeking small orchids and the afternoon looking into the treetops for koalas hiding from the cold.

Sadly all groups did get a little wet. The rain did not hold off and since the Stringybark Ridge group had the longest walk, they got the wettest.

#### **November Activity**

Sunday November 18

The group will meet at 10.00am at the Junction Road car park to complete the

Butterfly Orchid Survey and some odd jobs.

Ken, along with a recorder and few photographers, will conduct the Butterfly Orchid Survey. Across five plots the survey will be conducted and hopefully we will see some improvement in the Butterfly Orchid population after this wet year. Another goal during the Butterfly Orchid Survey is get some good photos of these orchids. This is the challenge for the keen photographers.

The remainder of the group will work on some odd jobs that need to be completed. These will be determined on the morning.

You will need to bring your lunch and clothing suitable for the weather conditions on the day.

#### **Breastscreening Participation**

#### Russell Northe calls for boost in breastscreening participation

Member for Morwell Russell Northe, said the annual electorate report card for the Morwell Electorate from BreastScreen Victoria encouraging participation rates from women aged between 50-69.

"It is encouraging that 60% of women in the Morwell electorate are having a regular mammogram every two years, however a higher participation rate among women aged 50-69 years is necessary to achieve substantial reductions in mortality from breast cancer across the Victorian community,"

"The current state wide participation rate is 55% with the target rate set at 70 So it's pleasing that participation rates in the Morwell electorate are above the state average.

Women over 50 years of age have a higher risk factor of breast cancer with 75 per cent of women diagnosed with cancer over the age of 50. Treatment is likely to be most successful with early detection, which is why I am a strong supporter of the work undertaken by BreastScreen Victoria," Mr Northe said.

"The early detection of breast cancer

is crucial as is the need for quality treatment and facilities. We are lucky to have in our midst the Gippsland Cancer Care Centre and Gippsland Rotary Centenary House. These services, along with local quality accommodation, are crucial in supporting individuals and families as they tackle cancer."

There are 66 breast screening centres available across Victoria including some mobile sites.

From a local perspective a screening centre is located in Traralgon at the Latrobe Regional Hospital, Consulting Suites 1 and 2, Princes Highway, Traralgon West.



We talk about what we want to be when we grow up, I want to be a fire fighter, Lilly says she wants to be a police woman. The bus judders to a halt and we step out into the smouldering heat. At school I walk into our classroom and Mrs Fox, my teacher, is sitting at her desk checking this week's homework, she's nice, we get along well.

After the last bell of the day I get back on the bus and ride home. I walk into the kitchen but. dad is not there. Things start to run through my mind like "he's left me" or "someone's kidnapped him" Then I see something on the table. It's a note, it says, "I have gone to your teacher's house to talk about your grades, be back soon." I sit down and look at the temperature gauge on the fridge and it says 41 degrees. That's the hottest we've had all summer, then I remembered that the cows would need extra water. So I went out to the shed and I turned the tap on and then turned on the radio. A very serious man was speaking.


He said, "Everyone in NSW, Bathurst area, needs to evacuate immediately because of an out of control bush fire." I was speechless; all I could think about was dad.


Glendonald Park Preschool and Churchill Hub Preschool have both been visited by some furry friends

As part of the program they all meet, cook and have breakfast and lunch together. This allows for a one to one talk over the meals and during the activities.


There is an expectation that the participants will keep their allotted room clean and tidy. The benefits of the program can be seen in the way the boys willingly involve themselves with the tasks

Early results suggest that A Grade


will be competitive despite losing some key players.

## Youth Support Programs

Latrobe Community Health Service (LCHS) Drug Treatment Service (DTS) has three programs which offer support and assistance for young people.

The Youth Withdrawal program assists Aboriginal and Non-Aboriginal young people with supervised reduction and/or withdrawal from substances in a safe and comfortable environment either in the young persons home or through a residential rehabilitation service, said DTS Manager Ann Hamden.

"We conduct a series of individual consultations over a short period, followed by on-going counselling and support to help complete the withdrawal.

Pre and post withdrawal support, referrals and education is provided to the young person and help can also be provided for families" said Ms Hamden.

The Youth Alcohol and Drug Outreach Service provides assessment and support to young people with alcohol and drug problems in their own environment. The service also supports other agencies that work with young people, through information, education and training.

"The program targets young people where use of alcohol and illicit drugs causes significant physical, psychological and social harm" said Ms Hamden.

Both programs provide services in Latrobe, Baw Baw and Wellington areas and are targeted toward young people between the ages of 12 and 21

The Innovative Health Service for Homeless Youth Program provides services for homeless youth and youth at risk of homelessness in the Latrobe Valley for young people aged between 12 - 21.

Young people referred or presenting with health issues are provided with education about medical and support service systems, advocacy and referral

into housing, education and Centerlink.

"Our staff also deliver educational sessions at schools and community events where information is provided through fun activities about drug and alcohol prevention, as well as harm minimisation strategies and sexual health. "We aim to reduce the incidents of young people experimenting with alcohol and drugs through this early intervention model of health" said Ms Hamden.

"A counsellor will develop a treatment plan with you based on your individual needs. There is also a Registered Nurse available to provide assessment and programs for clients who may be withdrawing from alcohol or drugs" said Ms Hamden.

"The Fast Forward clinics have allowed us to reduce the delays between initial contact and treatment from several weeks to a few days and in many cases, the same day. "This means we can improve outcomes for clients and their families and reduce any anxiety experienced during a long wait for treatment.

It also helps to engage people at the time they are motivated to make the change, rather than risk losing them through long waits.
