


Churchill North Primary School children visited the hostel to sing Christmas Carols. They came dressed for the occasion. The residents always look forward to the children coming to the hostel.

The rebuilding Churchill Town Centre is continuing to take shape.

Works Philip Parade, the eastern end of Georgina Place and Marina Drive now progressed, with undergrounding of power lines

and reconstruction of streets and footpaths. New street lighting and landscaping around the Churchill Community Hub are part completed or well under way.

Work still to be carried out in the Philip Parade reconstruction, includes landscaping along Philip Parade, and completion of the truck turning area in part of the "old" road alignment of Georgina Place to service the

Final asphalt surfacing of the reconstructed roads will take place 12 months after initial seals, to enable the roads to "settle" and avoid damage to road surfaces during the remaining

Works in Churchill Town Centre

The realignment of Georgina Place has been completed up to the northern car park. The next phase of construction will connect Georgina Place to the traffic lights in Monash Way. This will also involve Latrobe City Council working in partnership with the owners of the northern car park, to reconstruct the street and car parks in stages, aiming to minimise disruption to parking and access for the community.

The works through the northern car park are aimed at increasing pedestrian safety and amenity, improving traffic flows and parking, making bus transport more accessible, and enhancing landscapes.

Following works in the car park, the next project will involve construction of a plaza area around the Town Hall, with a footpath zigzagging up the hill to Marina Drive to allow disabled access. Because of the changes to levels in Marina Drive, the entry to the upper level of the Town Hall is planned to shift to the Georgina Place side, instead of the existing entry from Marina Drive.

Smaller town centre plazas are intended to be built both sides of the realigned Georgina Place, aiming to better connect the Hazelwood Village and West Place shopping centres. Also,

the Balfour Place road pavement is beginning to fail, and will be reconstructed in coming

Philip Parade to Monash Campus Master

CPG Consultants have been appointed to carry out master planning for the area between Philip Parade and Monash campus over the next six months. This area includes the Churchill Community Hub, Skate Park, Churchill Fire Brigade, Eel Hole Creek, Latrobe Leisure Churchill, Latrobe synthetic sports field and the entry to Monash campus.

The consultants will be contacting users of the facilities and other interested community members of Churchill in the very near future as a key part of the master planning process.

Chinese/Australian art on display at the Latrobe Regional Gallery

Zhongjian: Midway is an exhibition currently on show at the Latrobe Regional Gallery and includes work by several of China's and Australia's most notable contemporary artists. These are: Guan Wei, Liu Xiao Xian, Guo Jian, Jin Sha, Xifa Yang, Sally Smart, Kate Beynon, Lionel Bawden, Laurens Tan, Julie Bartholomew, Lü Peng, Shen Shaomin, Liu Qinghe and Zhang Qing.

Council's Arts Director, Julie Adams, is of the view that visitors will be enthralled by the incredible skill displayed by each artist, and the variety and innovative use of materials.

The exhibition features painting, sculpture, ceramics, installation and video projections. Five of the artists are Chinese nationals living and working in China, four are Chinese-born artists living and working in Australia, and five identify themselves as Australian artists whose work has been closely informed by Chinese

Latrobe City enjoys close ties with China, including our strong Sister City relationship with the City of Taizhou. Australia's proximity to, and relationship with, Asia has a major impact on our economy, politics and culture.

The strength of this influence can be seen in the keen interest in contemporary Chinese art and culture within the Australian art world. Led by a growing number of expatriate Chinese artists who investigate notions of traditions, globalisation and identity in their work, these artists have developed a creative and unique voice within the contemporary Australian art

The exhibition continues until 19th February next and entry is free.

Churchill Gardening Group

Hello Gardening Folk and

Happy New Year to you all.

Gardening at this time of the year (for me at least) is a time for enjoying the previous years' efforts, maintenance as always, and preparation for the next season, which brings us to bulbs, bulbs and more bulbs. There are so many to choose from, and different ways of growing them.

We can grow them in pots - in glass containers with no soil, and of course mass them in open beds in drifts, in small groups - or you can even plant under deciduous trees or under low growing ground covers, and they will just pop through when they are ready. So whichever way you choose, in the beginning a little planning and preparation is needed.

As usual nice friable well manured soil prepared early is desirable (but not essential).

If you try growing bulbs indoors in glass containers (clear glass is needed to allow light to penetrate), you

need a container with a neck the right size to hold the selected bulb just above the water in the container (don't allow the bulb itself to sit in the water) just the roots as they grow. Suitable bulbs for this method are hyacinths and hippeastrums.

Glass bulb growing containers are sometimes available at nurseries, and I have seen them at gift shops.

The vegie gardens should now be producing prolifically - with tomatoes, cucumbers, zucchini and beans being the staples.

You can still start new plantings of lettuce, radish, beetroot, beans etc.

Even though we have had periods of rain the garden (especially pot plants and baskets) dries out very quickly. A nice drink of weak Seasol would perk up ,all potted plants as would 'Worm Wee' if you have such a luxury.

Happy gardening until next month.

"A Stitch in Time"

The third anniversary of the Boolarra fires is upon us. It is magnificent to see how the bush has come back, how the birds have come back, how the houses, families, gardens and spirit of Boolarra has come back stronger than ever expected.

After the fires, new shoots dotted the landscape and a little magic was brewing among a small group of creative souls. They gathered looking for a way to tell their story, to make sense of the flames and what was left behind: a devastated, blackened landscape and a shaken and baffled community.

The result is the brilliant Bushfire Quilt. It is a beautiful document of the destruction and loss, the hope and triumphs and the joy of seeing Boolarra come back to life.

What began as a quiet effort to find comfort in others and a stitch and chat has become a significant and cherished document in history.

On December 3rd, Russell Northe, the Member for Morwell, proudly unveiled the Bushfire Quilt in all its splendour, newly mounted in a beautiful handmade cabinet built

by cabinet maker, Joel Chapman of Yinnar.

The cabinet itself is a marvel with its own remarkable story worthy of commemoration. It was important to the community to protect the quilt in its pristine condition but also display it as a historical record for all to enjoy at the Boolarra Hall. Linda Minter, a coordinator of the project, arranged for funding from the Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal (FRRR) to have the quilt framed

Unfortunately the size of the quilt meant finding a company to take on the big job which was a challenge.

Offers were made but then withdrawn. The task was too great and the quilters were left high and dry.

As a result of the Bushfire Quilt project and the vast donations, Boolarra established a keen quilting group. They received unfinished quilts as part of the donations after the bushfires.

In no time the quilts were finished and three special quilts were given to three marvellous little Chapman girls in Yinnar. Kelly, 4, and twins Katelyn and Emily, 3, have a rare disease and require constant medication and trips to

America for treatment. Joel Chapman, the girls' father, heard of the framing dilemma and jumped at the opportunity to solve the problem of framing the large quilt.

A talented cabinet maker, Joel built a sturdy and elegant cabinet for the admired quilt. He insisted he did not want to be paid for his work but was persuaded to make use of the money received from the FRRR grant. The quilt is beautifully in housed Australian timbers with a relic of the fires at the foot of the cabinet; Linda husband Tony

salvaged a piece of burned wood from The Old Mill Site after the fires and took it to Joel who engraved "A Stitch in Time".

At the light lunch at the hall, hosted by Linda Minter, Russell Northe commended all those involved in the collaborative quilt, "It is incredible to see what can be achieved when people come together for each other. It is so important to see how people in the community can come together to make something so expressive after such a devastating event as the fires. Not only women but men as well because we all know how men express themselves differently, so to see men getting in there is great."

In its initial stages, artist Meg iney was instrumental in

beginning the project. Meg approached the Latrobe City Council offering her services after the fire as a fibre specialist. Paired with a very generous donation of fabric, scissors, rulers, books and sewing machines, from quilters all over and as far as Wantirna and Raymond Island, Boolarra was all set to piece together something breathtaking.

Denise Schiller who took part explained, "It wasn't about talent, but expression, about having a go, trying to depict how you are feeling."

Most of the group were beginner sewers so it was a learning process for everyone.

Lyn King's magic was the final touch; Lyn masterfully did the quilting of the quilt bringing everyone's story together to create "A Stitch in Time".

A Stitch in Time, Bushfire Recovery Quilting Project was supported with an Arts Recovery Quick Response Grant funded by the Victorian Government through Arts Victoria and administered by Regional Arts Victoria.

Gippsland arson prevention program information displays

Over six Saturdays commencing on 18th February to 31st March the GAPP partnership will be conducting information displays at major Latrobe and Baw Baw shopping centres.

Two 2 hour displays will be conducted each Saturday from 9 am to 11 am in the first town and will then relocate to the second town from 1 pm to 3 pm. Stakeholder representatives will answer the public's questions and distribute information on bushfire patrols, prevention and management, arsonist detection and reporting suspicious activity.

Emergency Vehicles will be present for the young and the young at heart to view up close.

For locations check your local newspapers closer to dates and look for displays at your local shopping centre.

The display will include representatives from:

Victoria Police – Identifying suspicious activity and behaviours and Arson Investigation information;

Country Fire Authority (CFA) – Bushfire Safety Advice for the property owner;

Department of Sustainability and Environment – Proactive planning and management of bushfire Hancock Victorian Plantations (HVP) - Major Industry partner - registered as CFA Forest Industry Brigades (FIR)

Neighbourhood Watch – Role of the individual in collecting information to assist police.

HOT SPOTS – Gippswland needs the Ppublic's help to report susspicious arson activity in the bush Gippsland Arson Prevention Program (GAPP).

In all December issues of the Division's Crime Watch Newsletters we drew the attention of our communities to Victoria Police's Operation Firesetter.

This operation is the State's Bushfire Arson Prevention Campaign and announced highly visible police patrols to prevent arson and apprehend arsonists during periods of high fire danger.

It also investigates bushfire arson persons of interest

Operation Firesetter was instigated by Victoria Police at the commencement of the fire season and the work is now augmented by the Gippsland Arson Prevention Program (GAPP).

Currently conditions are drying out and we are heading into a period of high fire risk. Any act of arson has the potential to not only damage or destroy property and the environment but also threaten lives.

GAPP was formed as a result of the devastating 2009 Gippsland bushfires.

Emergency management agencies and industries from across Gippsland joined together to target and reduce the incidence of arson.

Joining Victoria Police and the CFA in partnership to combat arson are organisations and businesses including HVP Plantations, Loy Yang Power, Tru Energy, Gippsland Water, local government and agencies such as Latrobe City, Baw Baw and South Gippsland Shires, the Department of Sustainability and Environment (DSE) and Monash University's Sustainability Institute.

It is not just police who are currently patrolling areas which may be targeted by arsonists.

Employees from all partner agencies are on the lookout for suspicious behaviour in our bush.

This increases the number of fire patrol units on the ground. All patrol units have the capacity to immediately contact police and CFA should the need arise.

Together, these organisations aim to reduce the incidence and impact of bushfire arson across Gippsland. Protocols have been developed to ensure a coordinated approach to field patrols, engagement with the media and educating the community.

There is open communication and information sharing amongst all members of the partnership.

But it is not just the authorities and industry which have a role to play in preventing a repeat of the 2009 bushfires.

All members of the community have a part to play to ensure the community's collective safety during the fire season. Individuals must stand up and be counted.

Victoria Police's Operations Support Tasking and Coordination Inspector, Ron Gardner, from Eastern Region's Division 5 Morwell Police Headquarters said, "Deliberately lit fires cause devastation to both life and property.

The GAPP program is industries' and agencies' tangible effort to protect the community.

Now all we need is for the community as a whole to get on board."

Whether you live or work in, or simply travel through bushfire prone areas, be alert to the possibility you might see something or know someone who may be planning to deliberately or recklessly light a bushfire.

Arsonists often do not travel far from home. If an arsonist is a local then it stands to reason that some members of the local community may have suspicions about the arsonist.

It is the locals who see and hear things at a grass root level and where arson is concerned, locals need to be the eyes and ears of the community.

In recognising that people who commit bushfire arson often live and work in local communities, as a responsible member of the community you are encouraged to record descriptions of both persons and vehicles you believe are behaving in a suspicious manner in areas likely to be targeted by arsonists.

When commenting on HPV's involvement in the

displays, Greg Flynn, HVP Plantation's Fire Protection Manager, said, "Arson is a problem that affects the whole community so we all need to be involved in reducing its impact".





They lived in Morwell for 6 years. In 1974 they moved into the house Reg built for his family in Rae Crescent Churchill. His third daughter was born while there. The pattern of his life was set; a hard worker, a strong following of sport and service to the community.

Reg continued to work for the SEC at Hazelwood; he also took part time work as a barman at the LV pub together with working part time in plumbing for

In 1978 he left the SEC to start his own plumbing business which was very successful until he retired in Reg is a Charter member of the Churchill Lions

club and was one of the members responsible for getting the club going in 1977. He was club president in 1991-1992 then again in 2002-2003 and again in Reg has been one of the club's strongest and most

hardworking supporters, particularly being involved with Camp Quality, the Hart Walker Mobility Foundation and Licola Lions Village.

The years in between, he continued to work hard and serve his community. He built their second home just outside of Churchill in the mid 1980s.

During the recent bush fires of Churchill Jeeralang

and Boolarra, Reg volunteered at the University helping with food preparation. In his plumbing capacity he also supplied the temporary water supply for the tent city set up to house the CFA crews fighting the fires. He delivered lunches out to Yinnar and Boolarra area for those fighting the fires on the front

Licola Lions Village is another of Reg's passions. He volunteers his time doing the plumbing maintenance at the village and has come to know the staff and local town's people well.

Reg in the past has volunteered his plumbing expertise to the Churchill footy club when they were building new club rooms after the old rooms were burnt down. Likewise, with the building of the new

Rotary has, over the past few years, also assisted several Kurnai Year 11 students to attend the National Youth Science Forum held in Canberra each year











AIRLIE BANK HOMESTEAD A brief History by Keith Brownbill

Part 1
The Ogilvy Family

The Airlie Bank homestead in Morwell was built by David Ogilvy Jr., the eldest son of David Ogilvy Sr. and Elizabeth Aitchison Williamson. David Sr. was a solicitor who had arrived in Melbourne from Scotland in 1839 and following his marriage in 1841, lived in Viewbank Homestead in Heidelberg.

The family later moved to a home named Airlie Bank on the corner of Punt and Domain Roads, South Yarra. The building still stands and is currently used as the Police College.

David Ogilvy Sr. was the first president of the Law Institute of Victoria, and was on many public committees especially those connected with the Presbyterian Church. David Jr. who was born in 1842, and his younger brother James, were among the first students at Scotch College and are mentioned as playing in the very first Australian Rules football match against Melbourne Grammar. David was also regarded as a good cricketer.

After leaving school he worked on various properties around Victoria before settling in Morwell. At the Wesleyan Parsonage in Sale on September 5, 1879, he married Catherine Lillas (nee McNamara), born 1846. It is probable he had the Airlie Bank homestead built for his new wife and their three children, Katie, David and Thomas were all born there. Catherine died in 1892 aged 46 during a local 'flu epidemic, and her brother Patrick aged 42 died of the same cause three weeks later. Brother and sister are buried together in the Catholic section of the Hazelwood Cemetery.

David Ogilvy then married Patrick's widow, Emily McNamara (nee Turner) in 1893 at the Presbyterian church Maryvale. They had two children – Elizabeth (1894) and Emily Beatrice (1896), both born in the Airlie Bank homestead. Emily (Bea) is now 103 and still in good health. She doesn't know much about the Airlie Bank homestead in Morwell but believes it was rather a grand home with a lovely garden, and that they had peacocks on the lawn.

The Ogilvy family left Morwell shortly after Emily was born and took up a farm which they named Airlie Bank in Ogilvy's Lane, Poowong. David farmed there till 1917 when his sons David, and Thomas who was in the Light Horse, came back from the war. He then moved to Ararat to be near Emily's daughter Jessie, and died there in 1933.

Airlie Bank

The Airlie Bank homestead and farm occupy a special place in Morwell's history. The first owner of the farm and builder of the homestead was David Ogilvy Jnr., born in 1842 who took over the property in 1879 and farmed it for nearly 20 years before selling it to Robert Bridle in 1897. The five Ogilvy children were born in the homestead.

Robert Bridle was born in England in 1834 and emigrated to Port Fairy in Victoria's Western District. He brought his wife and seven of their ten children to Airlie Bank in 1897, and the Bridles developed the farm into a major local enterprise. The homestead was a magnet for musical evenings and a venue for wedding photos. An excellent garden surrounded the home and a fine orchard supplied townspeople with fruit. The expansion of the Morwell township, following development of the SECV electricity generation, hastened the Bridle family's decision in 1959 to sell the farm and sub-divide the property. The modern Bridle Estate now occupies much of the former farmland.

When the Misses Bridle left the homestead to live in Morwell township, they made a gift of the Airlie Bank homestead to the Shire of Morwell, and for many years it served as home for Shire Nursery employees. In recent years it had fallen into disrepair and had become a target for vandals.

Following strong representation from Airlie Bank neighbours and the Bridle family, the homestead and surrounds are to live again. Advance Morwell has received Government employment funding to restore the homestead and these funds have been supplemented by a grant from Latrobe Shire and moneys raised from a public appeal. The official opening was on April 16, 2000. Airlie Bank then began its new life as the home of Dad's War Stuff, the George Auchterlonie Light Horse memorabilia collection.

The Bridle Family

The Bridle family occupied the Airlie Bank property from 1897 till 1958 and played a vital role in Morwell's early history. The gift of the Airlie Bank homestead to the Shire of Morwell



cements a valuable link with early days and allows us to celebrate our heritage.

Origins of the name "Bridle"

The book "Remaines" by Camden, published in 1605 states: "One Captaine tooke newe name to himseffie and his company from the furniture of an horse. Among these gallants you might haveheard Monsieur Bridle, Monsieur Saddle, etc.. "

The first mention of the name noted to date is that of Walter Bridel, who was made a Freeman of the City of Leicester in 1196. It is believed that the Bridles could have come in the first place from France - perhaps with the Norman conquerors. The original pronunciation of the name was said to be "Bree-del" and this would be consistent with French origins.


The first mention of the name in Dorset observed to date, is contained in the Baptismal Register of the Parish Church at Winterbourne Steepleton, which records: "Ann, daughter of Thomas Bridle, baptised on the 10. December 1595".

It appears the Bridles were for the most part rural people, and as the conditions in rural England in the 1830s were difficult, it is not surprising that some members decided to emigrate. Although those who decided to go to New Zealand and those who came to Australia lived not more than 20 miles from each other in England, there is no evidence available of any relationship or contact between them. Our story's main concern is with those who came to Australia and in particular those who settled in Morwell and ran the Airhe Bank farm, but we do have

some information on the Bridles who emigrated to New Zealand.

Charles Bridle, born at Winterborne Abbas on December 8 1832, childless after the death of his wife Jane shortly after their marriage, decided to follow his younger brother who had previously left for New Zealand, and obtained a passage on the N2. S. Coy's Orari, arriving at the Port of Auckland on July 12, 1876. He lived most of his remaining years at Coalville, or Cabbage Bay as it was then called. He was greatly loved as a Christian gentleman, and was noted for his beautiful garden. He died at Coalville on December 14, 1915 at the age of 83 and is buried in the Coalville cemetery.

Charles's younger brother Joseph was born at Winterbome Abbas on July 28, 1839, worked in the district as a farm labourer and later as a brickmaker. He decided in 1875 to emigrate to New Zealand with his wife Jane and their children Bessie aged 7 and Alfie who was 5. The family boarded the British Empire at Gravesend and following an uneventful voyage arrived at the Port of Auckland on October 17. Joseph immediately found work with a Mr.Jeffcoat and in later years their home became a focal point for the district of Coalville, serving as a boarding house, grocery, butchery, bakery, gum and fungus store. A farm was run in addition to the above activities. Joseph died in 1921 aged 83, and his wife Jane 88, followed him in 1929. Both are buried in the Coalville cemetery. Many descendants of the Bridle family continue to live in New Zealand.

The Morwell Branch of the Bridle Family

The Bridles who became early residents of Morwell came from the small village of Chickerell. (Interestingly, another of our pioneering families, the Paynes, also came from this village; the two families came independently of one another and unknown to each other.)

Robert Bridle I st 1750-1815 m. 1771 Joan Hus'sey 1750-1823: Robert Bridle 2nd 1774-1850 m. 1798 (details not recorded): Robert Bridle 3rd 1800-1863 m. 1828 Esther Hunt 1808-1862: Robert Bridle 4th 1834-1906 m. 1863 Sarah Jane Fish 1844-1923

Robert Bridle 4th served in the Royal Navy during the Crimean War, 1854-56, and at the war's end emigrated to Port Fairy in Victoria. He began farming in that general area and moved about quite a bit before eventually farming a property of his own at Alvie near Colac. The names of towns such as Beeac, Alvie, Southern Cross, Koroit, Killarney, Tower Hill and Illowa, are familiar to members of the present Bridle generation in Gippsland.

Robert and Sarah had ten children, all born in Australia: Robert (1864-1945), Mary (1866-1959), William (1868-1872), John (1871-1955), Charles (1874-1875), Henry (1877-1939), Emma (1879-1969), Laura (1881-1953), James (1884-1962), and Hesther Essie (1888-1967). In 1897 Robert brought his family to Morwell, bought the farm known as Airlie Bank from the previous owner, David Ogilvy, and took up residence in the homestead on Waterhole Creek. Seven of the original children came across - Robert, John, Henry, Emma, Laura, James and Essie. (Mary had married and remained in the Western District and remained there on a farm, William had died in a fire, and Charles had succumbed to diphtheria).

It is not known exactly why Robert decided to come right across the state to Morwell, but it seems the reason was to take advantage of a more reliable climate. In those days farmers cropped a lot and Gippsland had a better reputation than the Western District for that type of farming.

The family brought their belongings to Morwell on a four wheeled wagon drawn by four draught horses; a spring cart tied behind the wagon brought up the rear. The journey from Alvie took three months and the family members slept under the fully laden wagons - there was no room on top. Miss Emna may have travelled with the men and the wagons. As the railway line from Melbourne had reached Morwell in 1877 other members of the family could have travelled at least part of the way on the train.

When the Bridles arrived in Morwell, despite the work that had already been done by the Ogilvys, they were faced with the task of clearing the still heavily timbered property. As it was obvious the farm would have difficulty supporting all family members, soon after their arrival in Morwell sons Robert and John moved to Yarragon and began farming there. This left Robert and his wife Sarah together with five children, sons Harry and James, and daughters Emma, Laura and Essie to run Airlie Bank. James, the only one of these five children to marry, married Ida Elliott in 1933, The newly-married couple moved to a house named Chickerell which they had had built at a spot which is now at the corner of Cherry and Gillie Crescents in Bridle Estate, but James maintained his active work on the farm.

Robert Bridle 4th died in 1906 but his wife Sarah lived on till 1923. Both grandparents died before Bob and Margaret were born, so they know little of them. After the death of their grandmother in 1923 the farm passed in four equal shares to sons James and Harry, and to daughters Emma and Laura. All family members shared in operating the farm with James (Jim) and Harry responsible for most of the outside work, and the women running the house.

Harry Bridle was killed in an accident on the highway in 1939. He left his share to Emma, and when Laura died in 1953, Emma received her share also.

Bob and Margaret's mother, Ida Elliott, came from Melbourne about 1930 to help a married sister who was very sick and who had young children. After her marriage to Jim in 1933 she worked on the farm, raised the family, taught Sunday school and for recreation played bowls.

The Bridles, including the maiden aunts, were great church people, attending services twice on Sundays in the former Anglican church (recently restored) now in the grounds of Commercial Road School. Bob and Margaret also went to Sunday school. Jim sang in the choir and Ida often played the organ when the regular organist, Mrs Cardwell, was not present.

Together with his brother Harry, also a bandsman, Jim Bridle played cornet in the Morwell Band for many years and was a great committee person - a church warden and on the committees of both the scouts and the band. A keen amateur photographer, Jim took many photos of wedding groups. The Bridle homestead verandah on the east side provided an excellent setting, and no doubt many local families still have some of Jim's old photos. He was older than Ida, in his fifties when Margaret was born, and in later life was a sick man. He suffered strokes and died many years before Ida who was 92 when she died in 1994.

The Airlie Bank Homestead

In 1897 the Bridles took over Airlie Bank - the homestead, outbuildings and farm. A large brick cheesehouse and cellar then stood between the house and Waterhole Creek. The homestead and outbuildings consisted of a brick house, a detached timber kitchen, a bathroom and pantry on the south side, and a detached four-bedroom timber building on the north side. There is dispute whether there was ever a door on the west side of the main building facing the creek. Structurally there is no sign of a door ever having been there but

Margaret (Bridle) Donovan remembers one of her aunts saying that one did exist. Bob believes the front door was around the east side leading through the little narrow room where Margaret and Bob's Uncle Harry lived.

The major water supply was provided by a brick-lined concrete-rendered underground tank situated half under the verandah - most likely the tank was placed there before the verandah was added, as verandahs were often not part of the original houses built in the late 1800s. In addition to the underground tank, there was another tank at ground level and two small ones above the kitchen roof line. The water was raised by a hand pump situated near the kitchen. Jim Bridle kept the underground tank clean -he used to get into it with a bucket to remove all mud and other debris, and his brother at ground level would pull the bucket up and empty it. On one memorable occasion the bucket contained a snake as well as the tank sludge. The spoutings were also kept clean and as the house had a good catchment there was seldom a shortage of water. The top of the tank was covered with railway sleepers and Margaret remembers failing half-way into it - one leg slipping between the sleepers. She lost some skin but, too scared to tell anyone about it, had to suffer in silence.

When Robert Bridle took over the farm he used the brick cheesehouse and cellar as a grain and chaff store. Both these buildings were destroyed in the 1944 fires, and the cellar filled with rubble, but the bricks were later salvaged and used to complete a home in Newborough. Old photos show a timber building separate from the main building and which is not there today. Bob Bridle is not sure whether the Ogilvy family or the Bridles made this addition but he thinks it was the Bridles because his grandparents and their five children would have needed the extra space. Used for some time as a storehouse and for apiary work, the building was eventually no longer needed and fell into disrepair.

When Jim and Ida were having their new home, Chickerell built, they used the timber wall lining and flooring from this building. The style of their home was very popular in that era




and several of the homes at the eastern end of Commercial Road Morwell today are very similar in design. When Jim and Ida moved into the Morwell township their house became home to Mr. and Mrs Parry. Mrs Parry, a gardening consultant, often visited Airlie Bank homestead and garden, and today is leading the garden restoration.

The external walls of the main homestead are cement rendered to weather proof the handmade bricks. That was commonplace in those days. The ceiling in the living room has been lowered and some people believe that this has replaced a moulded metal ceiling, but Bob and Margaret are sure there was no earlier metal ceiling. Beautiful big kerosene lamp chandeliers used to hang on adjustable chains from the ceiling in two rooms. These chandeliers were lowered in the evenings so that the lamps could be lit, and were then raised again. The windows were shaded by beautiful green wooden slatted venetian blinds in a style which is coming back into fashion. There was also an antique green cast-iron bath. The water for it was heated in kerosene tins on the top of the stove. Also on the stove was a water tank with a tap; this ensured a continuous source of hot water. In the kitchen was a very big cast-iron wood stove in which the aunts did all the cooking including baking the bread each week.

At one stage the side of the main homestead building facing The Boulevard had an open verandah but this was replaced by an enclosed porch in recent years. The detached kitchen had a large brick chimney but when the building was handed over to the Shire of Morwell after the last of the Bridles moved out, the chimney was demolished and the wood-fired range removed. The kitchen was then used as a garage and large doors put in the south side for the cars.

The Bridle home used to be a magnet for visitors and many were the musical evenings held there. Jim had made a special chair so that little Aunt Essie could play the organ which was in the dining room.

Churchill Fire Brigade Captain Honoured with the National Emergency Medal



Most CFA members who were on the ground on February 7 2009 say it is a day they will never forget. Senior Volunteer Steven Barling is no different.

In 2009 he was Captain of Churchill Brigade and the first incident controller of the blaze which ravaged the area and claimed 11 lives. Like thousands of other CFA members he spent countless hours fighting the fire and weeks mopping up and this Australia Day he was recognised for his 25 years of dedication to the community.

On Friday 27 January he was presented with the inaugural National Emergency Medal by Prime Minister Julia Gillard at an event in Flowerdale.

Humbled by the award, Mr Barling said he was honoured but could not do his job without his colleagues around him.

"I'm pretty excited. It's nice to be recognised but there is a lot of other people who did things just as I did. It's not just about me, but about everyone else who was involved," he said.

In the weeks following Black Saturday, Mr Barling worked solidly to ensure the area would be safe again.

"[The February 7 fire] was the biggest thing I've ever been involved in. I had control of the fire for one and a half hours before it was passed on to the Incident Control Centre. It's a day that I will certainly never forget and one I hope I never have to experience again."

During his 25 years as a CFA volunteer Mr Barling spent 15 years as captain and is now a Group Officer looking after the Morwell, Hazelwood North, Churchill, Driffield, Yinnar, Yinnar South and Boolarra brigades.

After so many years as a volunteer, Mr Barling said it is important that he enjoys what he does and is doing something that benefits the community.

The National Emergency Medal was established by The Queen to recognise the unique contribution and significant commitment of those people who have provided service in response to a nationally-significant emergency. This includes the February 2009 bushfires, the floods that happened in Queensland during December 2010 and January 2011 and Cyclone Yasi.

31st with 17ml.

To make sure the statistics are complete, kindly neighbours 'mind the rain gauge' while Bruce and Jan are away.

If the rainfall falls 100ml below average it has grave consequences for our farming community.

Bruce will continue to contribute monthly rainfall figures for our interest.

Help Catch Bushfire Arsonists!

By Margaret Guthrie 'Operation Firesetter' is a state-wide campaign to prevent bushfire arson. About 50% of bushfires are



believed to be deliberately or recklessly lit. Members of the community are asked to be alert for suspicious behaviour on days of high fire danger and in bushfire-prone areas. Call Triple Zero (000) if you see something suspicious.

Leading Snr Constable Brett Godden attended the January meeting of CDCA and handed out pamphlets and posters to be distributed in Churchill. He told us more about 'Operation Firesetter', which includes increased patrols in bushfire-prone areas by Victoria Police, DSE rangers and staff from other partner organisations e.g. HVP Plantations, Loy Yang Power, TruEnergy, Council, etc.

The community is asked "Seen Something? Know Something? Say Something." to help prevent bushfires and catch arsonists.

If you are suspicious of a person or a vehicle, write down the following details – for vehicles: registration, make, model, colour, any damage or noticeable features; - for individuals: age, height, hair colour, build, facial hair, clothing, ethnic appearance.

If you observe any suspicious behaviour, call Triple Zero (000) immediately. If you suspect someone of bushfire arson, call Crime Stoppers confidentially on 1800 333 000

Churchill Police Officer-In-Charge, Sgt Phil den Houting, also attended our January meeting. Sgt den Houting has been filling in since Sgt Mel Hamshere was transferred out last December, and he reported on both successful and on-going criminal investigations in the local area.

Unfortunately, too many thefts and vehicle breakins are committed when residents leave doors and windows unlocked or leave valuables on display. The message is: Don't make yourself a target for 'opportunistic' crime!

Sgt den Houting has been assisting CDCA members to establish a Churchill Town Safety Group to monitor and report safety issues and liaise with the responsible authorities to address these concerns.

Several matters have already been successfully addressed, such as the replacement of the barbed wire fence along the Phillip Pde footpath and the increased reporting and speedier repair of faulty street lighting.

Much of CDCA's activity is driven by the issues that members raise and the information that is provided to us from agencies and stakeholders.

We also like to hear about the local issues that concern the community at large and so our next General Meeting – to be held in March – will be an Open Forum for residents to discuss 'Churchill matters' and inform the CDCA Committee.

This 'Open Forum' General Meeting will be held at 7pm on Wednesday 28th March. More information will be provided in the March edition of the Churchill and District News.



Tips for Hot Summer Living

Heat stress occurs when the body becomes dehydrated and is unable to cool itself enough to maintain a healthy temperature. If left untreated, this can lead to heat stroke, which is a life-threatening medical emergency.

Prevention is the best way to avoid heat stroke.

Heat stroke occurs when the core body temperature rises above 40.5C and the body's internal systems start to shut down.

Normally, sweating helps to maintain a healthy body temperature by increasing heat loss through

When a person becomes dehydrated, they do not sweat as much, their blood becomes concentrated and organ functioning is impaired.

People attending large events (concerts, dance parties or sporting events), working in hot and poorly ventilated or confined areas, or engaging in vigorous physical activity in hot weather are at increased risk of dehydration and heat stroke.

Exposure to radiant heat from bushfires can cause rapid dehydration and heat-related illness. Bushfires usually occur on days of high temperature which adds

Warning signs of heat stroke vary but may include:

- * Very high body temperature
- * Red, hot, dry skin (no sweating)
- * Dry swollen tongue
- * Rapid pulse
- * Throbbing headache
- * Dizziness, confusion, nausea
- * Collapse
- * Eventual unconsciousness.

Suggestions for preventing heat stroke include:

- * Drink plenty of water or other cool, non-alcoholic fluids. (Check with your doctor if you are on limited fluids or fluid pills.) Avoid drinking extremely cold liquids as they can cause stomach cramps.
- * Avoid heavy exertion. Reduce physical activity and avoid vigorous exercise in hot weather. If activity is unavoidable, try to schedule activity for the cooler part of the day and rest often. Whenever possible, stay indoors or in the shade.
- * Stay cool and keep air circulating around you. Use air conditioning if possible. If you don't have air conditioning, consider visiting an air-conditioned shopping centre or public library.
 - * Eat regular, light meals.

- * Wear lightweight clothing.
- * Take a cool shower, bath or sponge bath.

If you are organising a large event or sports activity, managing workers in a hot environment or engaged in fire fighting:

- * Develop and follow a heat stroke prevention plan.
- * Don't rely on fans to cool people unless there is adequate ventilation.
- * Know the signs and symptoms of heat stroke and know how to respond.
- * If drinks are confiscated from patrons at the entrances to large events (for security reasons), ensure there is plenty of free water available and easily

Heat stroke is a medical emergency. Every minute's delay in cooling the person increases the likelihood of permanent injury or death.

Apply first aid and seek medical assistance immediately if you, or someone you are with, shows any sign of heat exhaustion or heat stroke.

If someone you are with develops heat stroke:

- * Call triple zero (000) for an ambulance.
- * While waiting for emergency medical help, get the person to a cool shady area and lie them down.
- * Remove clothing and wet their skin with water or wrap in wet cloths, fanning continuously.
 - * Do not give the person fluids to drink.
- * Position an unconscious person on their side and clear their airway.
- * Monitor the body temperature and continue cooling efforts until the body temperature drops below
- * Wait for the ambulance to urgently transport the person to hospital, where more intensive cooling and support can be given.
- * If medical attention is delayed, seek further instructions from ambulance or hospital emergency

Things to remember:

- * Heat stroke is a life-threatening emergency that can be avoided by following simple prevention measures.
- * Older people, young children, pregnant or breastfeeding women, and people with heart disease, high blood pressure or lung disease are most at risk.
- * During hot weather, drink plenty of fluids, stay indoors or in the shade, and avoid vigorous exercise.
- * Seek urgent medical assistance if you or a family member shows any signs of heat stroke.

Churchill Cricket Club Celebrates 40 Years



Churchill Cricket Club founders Herb Kennedy and Col Wells were on hand to celebrate the 40th Anniversary of the club they formed in 1972. The two keen cricketers were interested in developing a cricket club within the fledgling town of Churchill and called a meeting to gauge interest. The club was formed and they were entered into the lower grades of the Central Gippsland Cricket Association (CGCA). The going was tough early on which was only to be expected and some heavy defeats ensued in the first season. There was enough optimism to persist with the venture and with the addition of some key players such as John Webb and Fred Debono, the club quickly found itself not only competitive but successful, taking out the C Grade title in 1975/76. A team was soon entered in the A grade competition of the CGCA and in the 1978/79 season, the club tasted its first success at the top level.

During the offseason in 1983 it was decided by the club to move to the neighbouring Traralgon and District Cricket Association (T&DCA). This move was made for a number of reasons, not the least of which was to compete on an all turf wicket A Grade competition. Park has been the home of the Churchill Cricket Club, now known as The Cobras, ever since.

international contest between the Gippsland Under 21 team and the Barmy Army Colts XI during England's most recent Ashes tour.

The club also highlighted the talents of those who have played at the highest level by naming four Teams of the Decade. Teams of the 1970's, 1980's, 1990's and 2000's were named to acknowledge the best cricketers the club has produced at A Grade level over 40 years. Continuing in this theme, the club was thrilled to announce the first inductees to the Club Legends Wall. Seven players gained admission to this wall of champions based on a criteria that includes having played at least 100 A Grade games for Churchill. Six of the seven were on hand to receive their plaques and to unveil their portraits on the southern wall of the club's social pavilion.

Club Secretary Wayne Reynolds was deeply honoured to receive a Life Membership from the club following ten years of service in the role.

The Churchill Cricket Club enjoyed honouring their past but attention has now turned once again to the present as each of the three senior teams and the Under 13 side all vie for a place in this year's finals series.

Healthy Body, Health Mind

The Planned Activity Group (PAG) assists older people and people with a disability to remain living independently within their community.

An inactive lifestyle due to age, depression, obesity, arthritis, stroke or respiratory disease, is a major risk factor for older people and people with a disability. Active people have better dietary intake, improved functional capacity to perform activities of daily living and reduced risk for falls.

Increased social and physical activity can also improve recovery and slow disease progression for coronary heart disease, hypertension, diabetes, and osteoarthritis. PAG assists older people and people with a disability by providing activities that focuses on emotional

wellbeing, partnered with good nutrition and physical activity.

PAG offers individual and flexible programs that consist of both centre and community based activities. In 2012, PAG are implementing exciting new programs, including ten pin bowling competitions, coffee critiques and a current affair debating groups.

There are many challenges associated with ageing. This can be made more difficult when individuals do not have essential tools to achieve healthy active ageing, such as knowledge of exercise and nutrition, peer support, and the ability to cope with psychological and physical health changes.
