

Churchill Neighbourhood Centre On The Move!

CHURCHILL Neighbourhood Centre is being out people's preferred options. forced to consider relocating to make way for the Education Precinct.

The Education Precinct is moving ahead rapidly. They would like to run a sport and recreation program from the Leisure Centre where the Neighbourhood Centre currently operates, from the beginning 2005.

"There are challenging times ahead for the Churchill Neighbourhood Centre" said Christine Penpraze, Centre Co-ordinator.

Currently there are three options available to the centre. The first is a move to the Churchill Town Hall. This would include a refurbishment to enable it to meet the needs of a Neighbourhood Centre.

The second option is a purpose built facility on land between the CFA and the Skate Park in Phillip Parade. Both these options are dependent on funding.

The other option is that the Neighbourhood Centre remains where it is.




Lake Hyland hosted the competition and was stocked by the Department of Sustainability on Thursday to make sure there were plenty of fish for our junior anglers



President Rod Slocum and Secretary John Lee, were delighted with the turnout and are looking forward to



Gippsland Trades & Labour Council:

In The Valley

The recently reformed Gippsland Trades and Labour Council have called for a Stop work and rally on Wednesday 19 at Victory Park, Traralgon.

Secretary John Parker said, "The rally has being called in conjunction with other rallies throughout the State in opposition to the Governments latest budget measures that threaten Australia's Universal Health Care System, placing pressure on bulk billing rates that have dropped from 80.6% in 1996 to 68.5% currently. These figures are much worse in rural areas with East Gippsland reportedly been the worst area in the state."

"While the proposed higher education package will result in an increase in HECS fees by 30% that will force many students to forgo the opportunity to go on to higher education.

The current attack on Higher Education has targeted the National

Tertiary Education Industry Union cation, health and industrial relaover collective bargaining agreement", he continued

"The Union movement is also outraged by the Governments constant attack of the building unions, where they spent \$66 million dollars of tax payer's money on a royal commission in which \$11 million dollars was taken from the legal aid budget", he said

The rally, Mr Parker said, "Should not be seen as a bid to have the Labour Party elected at the next federal election, rather it is our opposition Governments policies.

The Gippsland Trades and Labour Council is made up from a broad range of political views. We have Greens, Labour and Independents, representatives on council. We also have a number of issues that we wish to, and are taking up currently with the Bracks State Government in regards to edutions".

"So we have called on all in the community to put in an effort to take part at 10am on Wednesday 19 at Victory Park, Traralgon, because only when the community speaks with a loud and united voice will the politicians hear what we are saying", he Mr Parker concluded.
