Churchill Service Memorial

Some time ago CDCA commissioned a sculpture to be used as a Service Memorial to commemorate the fallen that have died in service of our community and country. Traditional memorials usually commemorate Armed Services personnel, but CDCA was of the opinion that a more inclusive view which included Emergency Services personnel, such as CFA, SES and Police, could be incorporated into the Churchill Memorial.

Boolarra artist, Paul Jesse, who is accomplished in Ferro-Cement sculpture techniques, was commissioned to create a memorial that would cause people to reflect on the meaning of 'service' and 'sacrifice'.

The following is a description of the Churchill Service Memorial

"My sculpture is different from most War Memorial sculptures because it uses as its basis the reasons why people go into service or to war. One side of the sculpture is colourful and optimistic; its theme is home, family, community and the future.

These themes are crafted by flow lines which are connected to the other side of the sculpture through the round hole and the Crosspiece.

These lines can be seen as a multi-layered connection between the sides. On the "dark" side of the sculpture, the lines begin with a spiral of coloured mosaics. This spiral is representative of our service people. Its beginning can be seen on one level as their soul. The spiralling mosaics of them flow to the other side of the sculpture where they create the landscape and figures.

These lines can also be seen as a range of connectors between the two sides, representing a flow of thoughts, love, fear, concern and dreams. They also represent physical communication such as letters and phone calls."

This 'Service Memorial' will be located in the Churchill Plaza (adjacent to the Town Hall), along with four flagpoles, seating and garden beds. A plinth will be constructed to mount the sculpture on.

The Churchill Service Memorial has deliberately been designed as a thought-provoking public art work. It will complement the Art and Culture Pathway which links Switchback Gallery at the University Campus to the Town Centre. When it is erected on site, we hope Churchill citizens will pause to view the Memorial, ponder its meaning, reflect on the service of others and

commemorate the fallen.

CDCA is pleased to announce that an artist has been engaged for a further public art project at the Monash Way pedestrian underpass. The aim of this project is to create a bright, friendly and inviting space at the underpass, which residents have previously described as dirty, dull, out-dated and unsafe.

CDCA is facilitating a community consultation session with the artist, Doyle, on Tuesday December 23, at 4pm in Studio 1 at the Churchill Town Hall (Philip Parade entrance). This will be an opportunity to meet the artist and discuss the project. Designs for a mural at the underpass will be prepared early in the new year and the project is expected to be completed by April 2015.

CDCA's final meeting for 2014 was held last month. Guest speaker, Ben Leigh, CEO of Latrobe Community Health Services, provided the background to the redevelopment proposed for the Churchill site, and presented the concept plans, including floor plans for the ground and upper levels and a representation of the building's Philip Parade facade.

The redevelopment, presuming it gains full funding, will be quite an imposing building, with two storeys and an extension to the southern side. The Latrobe Valley University Training and Dental Prosthetics Laboratory, to be built on the second level, will provide additional job opportunities in Churchill, along with further training opportunities for TAFE and University students.

The realignment of Georgina Place and reconstruction of the northern car park have finally taken shape.

As I have written in past columns, the works have taken longer than anticipated, largely as a result of the delays in resolution of legal issues around land exchanges, and the need to reconstruct streets and car parks in relatively small stages.

There has been disruption, and I thank all the landowners, traders and customers of the Centre for their cooperation and patience.

The aim of the plan and the works has been to substantially improve the safety, accessibility, amenity and attractiveness of the Town Centre.

The aim is for the Town Centre to be pedestrianfriendly with slow traffic, aiming to increase the numbers coming to the Centre and spending more

In the longer term, the vision is for a more dynamic Centre with plenty of activity for longer


Following the completion of works along West Place near the service station, there will be a period of little construction activity later in December (to avoid disruptions to Christmas trading), and early in January while the construction industry break

The final works will involve completion of a new car parking area along West Place, while some additional works will be carried out by the landowners within the car parks either side of Georgina Place.

Town Hall Plaza and Pathway

The use of Churchill Town Hall as a Polling Booth for the State election on November 29. provided an initial use of the reconstructed entry to the top level of the Town Hall.

The stairway from Marina Drive, wheelchair access along the western side of the Town Hall and the gathering area near the entry all worked



effectively on the day.

Works on the pathway and lower plaza area are progressing.

Three new public lights and four flagpoles are expected to be installed before Christmas.

An additional footpath along Georgina Place, landscaping and erection of Churchill District Community Association's "Service Memorial" will complete the works.

Balfour Place Reconstruction

The reconstruction of Balfour Place will take place after Georgina Place has been fully re-opened.

Submission of tenders for the reconstruction closed in November 2014, and a Council decision on the successful tenderer is expected in February

Construction is currently being planned to commence in about March 2015.

Christmas Cheer for Churchill



Churchill Newsagency is again helping to celebrate Christmas this year by having a fun couple of hours on Saturday December 20, between 10 and 12 noon. The children will have the opportunity to meet and chat with Santa and tell him what they would like for Christmas this year.

While they are waiting to see this jolly, white -bearded fellow they can have their face painted.

Holiday care for potted plants

Before leaving, water pot plants by immersing them in water enriched with seaweed or kelp extract. Soak in a deep bucket or laundry tub for 10 minutes.

Bury outdoor plants in pots (under 15cm in diameter) in a shaded part of the garden. Plunging them into garden soil will reduce their water use by

Silica gel (water crystals) can help potted plants stay hydrated longer. Use a stick to push a few holes into surface and insert some gel into the holes then fill holes with potting mix. Don't spread gel on the surface. This holds water on the top so moisture can't reach the plant roots. These gels expand when wet so use sparingly and soak thoroughly before you leave.

Plug the bath and line it with a plastic sheet. Put a few layers of newspaper on sheet and place plants on top. Put in 3 to 4 cms of water and make sure the tap is not dripping or you could come home to a flood.

If you are only going for a few days pierce a small hole in the lid of a plastic drink bottle, fill bottle with water and bury the neck down a few centimetres into the soil. The water will slowly trickle out.

If you don't have any shaded spots to put your plants (eg. apartment balcony) erect a tepee with 50% shadecloth around pots. Make sure it's secure enough not to blow over in the wind. This will reduce evaporation by 50% to 60%. This is a good solution for large containers that are difficult to move.

There are simple battery-operated 7- day watering timers you can add to your drippers or weeping hoses. These systems can run over pots and garden beds. There are also electronic programmable types.



Vale Bishop Jeremiah Coffey

Lumen Christi parishioners and long standing residents of Churchill, Yinnar and Boolarra were saddened at the recent passing of Emeritus Bishop and former parish Priest, Jeremiah Coffey.

Bishop Coffey passed away on November 19, at the age of 81 after suffering a stroke a week earlier.

He was well-known and much loved through Gippsland and especially among the Catholic community.

After being ordained in 1958 in Ireland, he came to Australia and the Diocese of Sale the following year. He served in many parishes through Gippsland including Yallourn, prior to coming to Churchill.

As the first Parish Priest to reside in Churchill, he was responsible for setting up a new parish in 1977 embracing Churchill, Boolarra and Yinnar and naming it Lumen Christi Parish which means "Light of Christ". He believed that this was appropriate as this area was the source of light and power for the rest of Victoria.

As a relatively young priest, Father Coffey faced many challenges in those days in building a new school and church, and establishing a new spirit of community among the many new families


who settled in the town. To assist in this process he Invited the Josephite Sisters, founded by Saint Mary McKillop, to establish a work force of four nuns in Churchill, teaching in the school and providing pastoral guidance and leadership among parishioners.

He spent 10 years building up the Lumen Christi Parish and became a well-known and hard-working member of the local community. HIs great perception of issues, his humble and friendly demeanour and his dry wit endeared him to many people, including those outside his own parish.

After ten years, Father Coffey left Churchill and took up the role of Rector at Corpus Christi Seminary, where he was responsible for the training of priests for Victorian dioceses. In 1989 he was appointed the seventh Bishop of Sale and served in that role until his retirement in 2008. Until his death he had been living In a nursing home at Bairnsdale.

Jeremiah Coffey made a very significant contribution to the Lumen Christi Parish and the community of Churchill, and his legacy will not be forgotten among his people.

May he rest in peace.



Talk to friends and neighbours about your plans, so that they have an idea of your movements and they may have similar ideas that you can all share. 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Defacing Churchill's artistic assets



Some attention-seeking, thoughtless people are defacing some of Churchill's unique artistic assets according to Project Manager of Churchill's Art and Culture Pathway, Mike Answerth.

"Through the development of the Art and Culture Pathway we have been able to create special art features in Churchill, which not only capture the history and life of the town but have the potential to attract visitors", he said.

"For more than a year these features have remained untouched and provided a unique example of community commitment to public art and the skills of those involved.

Unfortunately, recent acts of graffiti vandalism to the Shopping Centre mural in Philip Parade and the skate park portrait of bush fire victim, Nathan Charles, have marred the good work of artists and students who participated in the project".

Mr Answerth said that the defacing of the image of Nathan Charles was particularly disappointing, given the fact that the young users of the skate park had requested a tribute to the young BMX champion who had greatly enjoyed using the park, but tragically lost his life in the bushfires on Black Saturday. His family, who regularly visit the park, were particularly upset by the graffiti on Nathan's image.

Graffiti on private and public property is an offence and Churchill police are investigating these matters. Anyone with information relating to these incidents should contact the Churchill Police Station.



Commemorative Postmark for Churchill

2015 is Churchill's 50th Jubilee. In January 1965 the British World War II Prime Minister died. The Postmaster General's Department issued a five pence postage stamp in May 1965 to commemorate Sir Winston Churchill.

Bruce McMaster, President of the Morwell Historical Society has announced that Australia Post will use a commemorative postmark at the Churchill Post Office during 2015. Letters and packages at Churchill will be postmarked with an image featuring the British Prime Minister.

Mr McMaster stated that "the Hazelwood Joint Planning Committee 1963 identified land for the proposed town of Hazelwood. Before the first house had been constructed, Sir Winston Churchill passed away and the Minister for Housing, Lindsay Thompson was determined that the new town be named Churchill to commemorate the British Prime Minister. The naming of the town resulted in considerable controversy as many of the local residents were adamant the planned town should be named Hazelwood".

Mr McMaster added "the proclamation to name the

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
town Churchill was signed by Reg Lord, Secretary of the Shire of Morwell on March 15, 1965.

The President of the Morwell Historical Society stated "the Society was pleased with Australia Post commemorating Churchill's 50th Jubilee with a special postmark as it commemorated an historical event for the town and will promote throughout the wider community, the 50th anniversary of Churchill.

Guiding in Churchill

By Zelma Mildenhall - Kangaroo Presently, Churchill and District has six active Guide units. Three Brownie Units for girls 7 -10 years old, two Guide units for girls 10 - 14 years old and one Ranger Guide unit for girls 14-18 years old. There are a total of 90 girls

The first Guide in the area was Lorraine Glazebrook (nee Porter). She was a Lone Guide, a special branch of Guiding open to girls who are unable to attend regular Unit meetings: their guide activities are usually posted to them and answered the same way. Her enthusiasm and interest in guiding activities intrigued the other girls at Hazelwood North Primary School.

Interest grew and in 1957 the 1st Hazelwood Guide Company was formed with nine girls and Mrs Bessie Porter, Lorraine's mother, as Captain with Miss Joan Moody as Lieutenant.

The younger girls wanted to join in the fun of Guiding, so Mrs Lurline Mildenhall and Mrs Betty McInnes were approached and persuaded to become Brownie Leaders. The 1st Hazelwood Brownies started with 10 girls

Guiding, like all youth movements, cannot function without the support of parents previously known as the Local Association. Our Support Group was formed in 1958. The first office bearers were Mrs Rita Woolacott -President, Mrs Jessie Clarke – Vice President, Mrs Mavis Maxwell – Treasurer and Mrs Mary Cranwell – Badge Secretary.

After Churchill township was established it was necessary to form new Units to accommodate the influx of girls. 1st Churchill Brownies was formed in 1968 with Mrs Cynthia Caldwell as Brown Owl. The 1st Churchill Guide Unit was formed a year later in 1969 with Miss Roslyn (Lyn) Grassie as its Captain. The town continued to grow and in 1975 saw the start of the 2nd Churchill Brownie Unit, with Mrs Babs Walker and Mrs Joy Freeman as its leaders.

In April 1978, the Ranger Guide Unit was formed with six girls and Miss Val Webster as Leader, Mrs Ann Van Rhine and Miss Wendy Haustorfer were to be the next Leaders. After Wendy and Ann left Mrs Judy Lambert became Leader and is still there today. They meet at Churchill, Morwell and Traralgon as there are few Ranger Guides in the Region.

The Ranger Guides have carpeted and decorated one room of their own at the Guide Hall as their den.

First Hazelwood Brownie Pack

The first enrolment took place in the Hazelwood South hall which was decorated with shrubs and flowers making it a fairy glade. All of the district joined in the fun, even Santa arrived with a gift for each child.

District Commissioner, Mrs H P Pearson and Assistant District Commissioner, Mrs W Graham, officiated at the enrolment ceremony.

The Sixes were called Fairies, Sprites, Elves and Leprechauns. Now we have Mullokas, Lalagullis, Junjarins and Tintookies Aboriginal names that belong to the Australian bush fairies.

The Promise, the eight point programme, the uniform and badges have all changed, but Brownies remain enthusiastic, energetic and full of fun. They respond to encouragement and a challenge, and they still ask questions!

Pack Holiday is still a special time for the Pack. Schools go camping and have overnight stays, but the anticipation, preparation and planning for Pack Holiday is marvellous.

We held special celebrations for our twenty-first and twenty-fifth birthdays. Mrs Lurline Mildenhall cut our cake at the twentyfirst birthday party.

The Pack first met on Saturday mornings

as girls came from farms. Now we hold our meetings after school each Tuesday.

Mrs Shirley Simpson (Wallaby) and Mrs Zelma Mildenhall (Kangaroo) became leaders of the Pack in 1976 - although Shirley had been helping for some months previously. This team worked together until Shirley retired to Lakes Entrance in March this year.

Saturday October 27 – Strzelecki Division Brownie Revels were held at Maryvale Campus of Kurnai College in Morwell from 10a.m. to 3.00p.m.

Theme – Bookworms

Brownies and Kangaroo joined other brownies, leaders, pack guides and helpers in a variety of activities. We tried our hand at calligraphy, made owls and bookmarks from coloured card, played croquet, enjoyed singing, play-acting, "book" games and puzzles.

Boronia Division Commissioner opened the Revels, and Heath, Morwell District leader, closed the day.

Tuesday, October 30 - We completed our preparations for Pack Holiday to be held at Burnet Park, Glengarry West on November 9, 10 and 11. Our theme is Spots and Stripes.

Tuesday November 6 – We tried to tie reef knots. We worked in pairs with each person only allowed to use one hand. Very few pairs were able to complete a knot! We then played a variety of games - Snakes and Ladders, Targets and String games. Everything is ready for Pack Holiday.

A Brief History

Guides

The Guides go camping at Burnet Park, they camp in tents and cook over open fires. The Guides compete with Scouts in such events as the Cohen Shield and Stradbroke competitions where they have competed successfully and won many events.

They have a camp called "Eve Graham" at Moe in November, where, working in patrols of four to six girls they erect their own tents, cook on open fires and have fun for three days. They go to Melbourne for Guide events

with other Guides throughout Victoria.

Many Guides take part in Strzelecki

Showtime each year.

Brownies

Brownies go on pack holidays, but do not camp out under canvas as Guides do. They usually have a theme and dress up. They play games, do craft and go on walks.

They go to Burnet Park for their pack holidays. Brownies make many useful things for Mothers Day and Fathers Day and have a lot of fun.

Ranger Guides

Ranger Guides go hiking, camping, take part in Showtime and go on Venturer hiking competitions such as The Armstrong and Hoadley Hike. The girls help with the Red Cross Blood Bank, Carols by Candlelight, child minding and the elderly or disabled in their homes. They also help out at the "Eve Graham" camp and water activities days on the Hazelwood Pondage.

Ranger Guides put a lot of work into achieving their Queen's Guide Award. They take part in many activities such as canoeing, bushwalking, first aid, debating, ideals and many more.

First Ranger Guide Camp

The first Ranger Guide Camp took place in the USA in 1961 and Rangers attending

there each brought a few ashes home from the campfire. These were then taken to Ranger gatherings and sprinkled in new campfires. This has become a tradition for Rangers. Only girls present can carry ashes home. Since this tradition began, campfire ashes have travelled from USA, Switzerland, Taiwan, Holland, Belgium, England, Japan, Hong Kong, Okinawa, Korea, Philippines, Perth W.A. in 1979 and in Churchill Victoria 1981.

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Churchill Community Garden

The community garden has been busy with a number of activities and projects over the past few months. Two key events have been the group's first gardening workshop and a plant stall at Cooperating the Churches' garage sale.

The workshop was about composting and worm farms and attracted 15 people from the community. It was conducted by Nola, the Regional Education Officer for Gippsland Waste and Resource Recovery Group, who gave a highly informative, interactive class about how to turn organic waste into a garden resource. We learnt that anything which has been growing can be composted except for meat and related materials, where higher temperatures are needed to destroy dangerous microorganisms. We learnt that a well managed compost heap will not smell. A balance of carbon and nitrogen materials mixed

and watered regularly will allow the materials to decompose effectively. Ants will invade a compost system that is too dry. Vinegar flies and smelliness will be found in one that has a poor mix of carbon and nitrogen waste.

The church garage stall was a great success. The community garden sold vegetable seedlings, talked with visitors and ran a seed planting activity for children. A new banner, painted by a community garden member, was proudly displayed and a few new Friends of Churchill Community Garden were added to our gardening family.

The group is excited about winning a grant and





is in the process of obtaining approval for our first few garden-building projects. We hope that our first projects will be a raised vegetable garden bed, shade/sensory garden, paths, compost bays, a propagating area and some espalier fruit trees. Hazelwood cemetery

A community facility now vastly improved

Over recent years, the Hazelwood Cemetery Trust has consistently implemented measures to improve the cemetery's environment and precinct making it cleaner and more orderly for everyone.

According to Hazelwood Cemetery Trust Chairperson, Leo Billington, as a general use community facility, the cemetery has been an integral part of central Gippsland's history since 1879. "Visitors now constantly remark about how clean the cemetery environs are looking.

There are plenty of wheelie bins which are all used to their full capacity.

New rubbish bin enclosures have proven to be

"Wheelie bins are housed in these enclosures preventing used and discarded items such as artificial flowers and wrapping paper from being blown around during inclement weather," Mr Billington said.

"Continuing with this task, the Trust regularly disposes of broken items - ceramic and glass containers, toys - and well worn, unwanted plastic and silk flowers and wreaths.

Unfortunately windy days provide a significant challenge distributing light-weight items across a large area creating an untidy vista.

Fresh flowers placed in containers provided by the Cemetery Trust may remain. The general public is very understanding and for this, the Trust extends its

The new gazebo is proving popular as a place to sit, rest and reflect.

Roses, planted last season around the structure, are in full bloom and complement an array of standard roses donated to the cemetery," Mr Billington explained.

"A solar panel to power a water pump for tap water throughout the cemetery has been useful during the last 12 months with no mains water connected.

Our mains water supply suffered significant damage in September 2013, and mains water has not been supplying the cemetery since then.

However, recently, the Trust was successful in obtaining a financial grant which will enable a new water pipe to be connected.

The Hazelwood Cemetery Trust is very excited to be able to replace the 1.5 kms galvanized pipe with high-tech poly pipe so necessary to provide mains pressure water once again.

The past year without mains water has been a period of angst for many, but the general public can be assured the work will be completed as soon as

The old galvanized pipe installed in 1983 by the then Morwell Shire Council has now disintegrated. Unfortunately this pipe is beyond repair; it was suitable 31 years ago but not now.

Meanwhile, visitors will notice a clean-up commencing in the adjacent southern area which will one day house a new extended memorial section," Mr

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
