



The VCE Leadership Awards were presented in the Queen's Hall at Parliament House.

Kurnai University Campus School Captain Hayden Stephens, was one of the eight out of twenty-four short-listed nominees. The eight finalists were invited to attend

the event and to present themselves to the audience.

Hayden was a finalist because of his school and community engagement.

As a school captain, Hayden helped to create a positive environment at Kurnai College. He was an active member of the schools Positive Behaviours Support group that aims to improve the school environment by encouraging respect and empowering others. The group developed a school policy around positive behaviour that Hayden actively implemented among his peers.

Hayden is an active member of the Morwell Fire Brigade. He was honoured with the 2014 Firefighter of the Year award for his work with the Morwell Mine Fire, and over 100 other fires which he has attended in the twelve months since he joined the brigade. Hayden believes that respect and collaboration are key components to successful fire fighting.

Hayden was also Deputy Mayor at Latrobe City Youth Council. He is a passionate voice for young people in his local community. He instigated discussions with the Latrobe City councillors about creating community spaces dedicated to young people and their needs. He

has represented the Youth Council interstate as well.

Each nominee was given three questions relevant to their fields to which they had to respond.

The school staff, who attended with Hayden, said they were most impressed at the depth of Hayden's thinking and feeling on topics. They were honoured to accompany Hayden to this occasion, and to have him as part of their school community and to see how well he represented his school.

In answer to his three questions Hayden replied that "We have been swamped by multinational companies and it is important to maintain rural communities, especially rural produce". He continued, "There is no 'I' in team. Do not be afraid to ask for an opinion or for help".

This process is sponsored by Lenovo and the Herald–Sun. Each participant received a Lenovo laptop, a year's subscription to the Herald-Sun and a plaque.

Human Powered Vehicle

Three teams from Kurnai College competed in the RACV Energy Breakthrough at Maryborough in late November. This required the teams to race against the other competitors, but to pass an RACV safety test for road rules, scrutineering (displaying knowledge of the vehicle) and presenting a display and presentation before three judges, describing their journey of getting a vehicle to the event.

This included finding sponsors, developing the technical specifications, effects of greenhouse gas emissions on the environment and a brief description of the aims of their chosen charity to support in the process.

The VCAL Hands on Learning students have been focusing on energy and innovation throughout the year. They chose the White Ribbon Foundation as their chosen charity, naming their vehicle "Dark Secret"- the slogan of the foundation, and a seriously ill fellow student. White Ribbon Foundation works to stop violence against women.

Through fund raising by selling white ribbons and wristbands, they raised \$240 for the foundation. They also had to fund-raise to pay for their trip to the event. This they did by car washing and detailing, and having a Mexican Baked Spud Day.

The students secured sponsorship from GATT Panels which painted the vehicle, and monetary donations from Hazelwood Rotary, Aus Geothermal and AGL.

The vehicle was built by G-Trikes and assembled by the VCAL metal class students.

To compete, the students had to organise themselves into a roster to do the 432 laps of 1.34 kms non-stop over 24 hours. Ninety-six teams competed. Kurnai VCAL team came 129th in their category and 61st overall out of 96 teams.

Teacher Brett Gay, said he was so proud of the way the students conducted themselves, organising the roster to eat, sleep and ride over the 24 hours. He said they showed determination to represent their college well. They looked after each other, holding a team meeting to decide who would do what and when. They were their own pit crew as well, doing the maintenance on the vehicle. Brett says their teamwork was commendable.

He added further that the students achieved a sense of pride and accomplishment for finishing such a gruelling event.

The objective of designing and constructing a machine encourages a team effort and provides rich curriculum material. The RACV Energy Breakthrough is an exciting program designed to provide opportunities for students, teachers, parents and local industry to work together to design and construct a vehicle, a machine or innovation in technology that will represent an 'energy breakthrough'.

The Energy Breakthrough began in 1991, when the Country Education Project began seeking new ways to engage young people in regional Victoria with a wider range of challenges.

The program encourages participants to examine and use the latest technology while considering its impact on the environment and the way people live locally and globally.

School groups work throughout the year to design, build and test vehicles and machines within detailed specifications. It requires a team effort; an across-the-curriculum approach. These groups then bring their vehicles and machines to Maryborough in November, for a huge celebration in which they can demonstrate and trial them in action.

#### Plants in my Garden

Species: Eremophila maculata 'Aurea'

Family: Myoporaceae

Derivation: *Eremophila:* From the Greek, *eremos*, meaning solitary or desert, and *-philus*, meaning loving, thus desert-loving in reference to where the majority of species grow.

*maculata*: From the Latin *macula*, meaning a spot of colour, and used in the botanical sense as meaning 'with coloured spots'.

*aurea:* From the Latin *aureus*, meaning golden, obviously referring to the colour of the flowers.

Common Name: Spotted Emu-bush, Spotted or Native Fuchsia.

Distribution: Widely distributed throughout the arid areas of QLD, NSW, Victoria, South Australia, Western Australia and the Northern Territory, usually occurring on heavy clay-loams which can be subject to periodic inundation.

Description: A small to medium rounded shrub to 2.5m high and 3m wide. Flowers are tubular to 2.5cm long and appear in the leaf axils on S-shaped stalks. Colour is variable, ranging from cream, yellow, orange, pink, red to purple, often strongly spotted internally, but only weakly spotted if at all externally. The fruits are green, roughly globular capsules to 2cm long.

Organisers were very pleased with the interest shown by many from the local community who visited the display throughout the weekend, and showed interest in how the scroll saws worked. There were also visitors for the day from Melbourne. All were very impressed with the number of scroll saws on display and the number of exhibits.

There were sixteen scrollers demonstrating their craft with the scroll saw throughout the weekend, and all were only too pleased to chat and share their interest and knowledge with the many visitors. Many and varied techniques were being used and demonstrated, which showed the versatility of the scroll saw and its many uses. Included was the cutting of

timber, ply, corian, perspex, thin metal (pennies) and recycling LP records into decorative items.


December 1, and payment is by donation.



This year she has been studying Year 12 subjects at Kurnai Collage GEP campus located at Federation University, while completing her second year of a four year apprenticeship Victoria. Racing At Kurnai, Caitlin studied business management, coaching, maths and English. Through Racing Victoria she has completed Certificate 3 and continuing with Certificate 4 in Fitness to be a personal trainer. She is also completing Certificates 2 and 3 in Racing (Jockey). While down at Racing Victoria she has nutrition, race theory and selfmanagement classes with staff from Racing Victoria. Caitlin has passed her VCAL at Kurnai and is looking

forward to the Awards Night where she will receive a special award for her effort, which has given Caitlin some more time to work full time with horses. Her Racing Victoria studies are also almost finished for the year but she will be back at it in January for the next two years. Caitlin decided to be a jockey after a few years of taking riding lessons with Catherine Martindale at Hazelwood

She began when she was seven and at about age ten, Catherine said to her that one day she would be her first Apprentice Jockey. Since then she has worked to bring this about. Catherine is Caitlin's master racehorse trainer. This means that four times a week Caitlin is at the Moe racetrack at 4.30am - 8.30am training Catherine's racehorses. Caitlin says she has the best support at work at Hazelwood Lodge, Moe Race Course, from her family and partner as well as from Kurnai, which accepted and allowed Caitlin to turn up late on occasions. Caitlin was very diligent in making sure she did all her school work. "I have a job I love doing." enthused Caitlin. "It is not like a normal job. I love going to work."
