Peter McShane, President of the Churchill Lions Club, was MC for the morning's



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Churchill town celebrates 50 Years



The township of Churchill was established fifty years ago this year, and arrangements are in hand to celebrate the historic milestone with a special event on Sunday March 15, the day on which the establishment and the naming of the town was officially proclaimed in 1965.

Planning for this event began last year when the Churchill District and Association Community (CDCA) established a small committee to develop and plan the celebration. It is envisaged that other events to mark the 50th year will be held by community and sporting organisations throughout the remainder of the year.

The event on Sunday March 15, will begin with an Ecumenical Church service arranged by the combined churches of the town, organisations which played an important social and community role in the early years of the town. This will be held in the Town Hall from 10.00am till 11.00am.

Everyone is welcome to attend.

The action will then move to the new town plaza adjacent to the town hall in Philip Parade, where a special plaque commemorating the proclamation of the town will be unveiled by two of Churchill's long time residents and community

A section of Philip Parade will be closed to allow for children's activities and stall holders.

Churchill Lions will provide a BBQ lunch, drinks and other food stalls will be available.

The event has been supported with funding from Latrobe City.

Peter Ellerington of the 50th Anniversary Committee said that it was hoped that the Churchill community would attend in big numbers and he encouraged locals to invite former residents back for the celebration.

"This is a very significant

occasion in the history of Churchill and we want to make the event a very enjoyable and memorable day," Mr Ellerington said.

The **CDCA** commissioned special anniversary 50th logo for the celebrations, and wishing organisations to arrange special events throughout the year encouraged to contact Margaret Guthrie of the Association to obtain approval to use the logo in

Churchill Rainfall for January 2015


Churchill started off the New Year with quite a bang in January, with some good tropical induced thunder, lightning and drenching downpours of rain. Churchill's total for the month was 88 mil. We were fortunate to get some good rain over the Australia Day weekend.

For those readers interested in the Churchill rainfall total for 2014 the following details may be of interest.

Rainfall details December 2014 were 55 mil making the years total for 2014 a below average 645

Although Churchill was about 100 mil short of its yearly average, consistent rain did fall each month keeping our paddocks, lawns and gardens nice and green.

Vale Millie Coleman

Millie Coleman was born in 1922 in Leongatha, the youngest of three children to Grayson and Gertrude Dodd of Dumbalk.

Millie had a wonderful happy childhood on a dairy farm helping with daily chores. In December, one of her chores was to relay the cricket scores from the house to the cowshed. She told of fond memories rolling in a car tyre. Being small in stature she could roll herself up and fit inside the tyre. What fun!

One thing Millie was absolutely certain of was that she would not marry a dairy

However, soon after the war, she met a young man by the name of Mark Coleman at the local dances. The rest they say is history. Millie and Mark were married on February 22, 1947 in Leongatha.

They moved in with Mark's parents at their homestead "Fairview" at Yinnar, where they lived for a couple of years before their own home "Nameloc" (Coleman backwards) in Nuttall's Road was completed.

Millie quickly became involved in the Yinnar community, joining the Yinnar Dramatic Society in the late 1940s and playing women's basketball. Daughter Leanne and son Garry joined the family during this time. She was also an active member of the Yinnar CWA until 1957 when Bronwyn was born. Bronwyn's birth

and severe disabilities led to Millie giving up much of her community activities.

In the late 70s, Millie was able to re-join the CWA becoming involved in many Song and Costume competitions. Millie also created many items of craftwork for CWA When competitions. diagnosed with macular degeneration causing her slow deterioration into blindness, Millie still managed to keep crocheting, even having a blanket on the go when she died.

Millie was a great supporter of Mother's Clubs and Football and Netball Clubs, working in the canteen of both on a regular basis. The Yinnar Hall committee and Yinnar Centenary committee in 1974 also saw Millie's involvement.

In 1980 Millie and Mark moved from the farm into Yinnar where they lived for twenty years. They loved those years of active retirement.

In 2000, they moved into a unit in Morwell for the next phase of their lives. Unfortunately, the last ten years of Millie's life were continually with spent deteriorating eyesight and being on her own after Mark passed away.

Millie herself passed away on December 23, 2014, only five days after moving into Mitchell House for the final phase of her life.



Throughout her Millie had her loves and her hates. Hate is such a strongly negative word but there were a few things she hated.

She hated being a bother to anyone, being late for anything, losing her eye-sight, and her name Emily.

To balance the ledger, she loved many things. She loved to be useful with dancing and music (especially in her early

She had been known to play the drums occasionally in her siblings' dance band. She spent time serving the community and being involved in the church and church guild.

She travelled overseas, the last time at the age of 82, just after Mark died. Her gardens created beautiful spaces around all her homes. Friends and neighbours always said how lucky she had been to have such wonderful people so close by. Her family's heritage often told her family tales of their forebears. Most of all she lived for her present family of the Vickers, Colemans, Thompsons and Higgins, to whom she demonstrated love and compassion to children, grandchildren and great grandchildren, even getting down on the floor to play.


She treasured every moment with her family, and was always engrossed by details of their daily lives. She loved a good chat about goings on. Her love was unconditional and that love was returned unconditionally.

At her funeral, her son Garry finished his eulogy with these words to sum up his Mum this way-

"Millie gave beyond reason, cared beyond hope, loved without limit, reached, stretched and dreamed in spite of fears.

Her life has illuminated darkened paths; her words have lifted broken spirits and her life has touched the lives of many."

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Fire Restrictions Still In Force

Latrobe City residents are urged to observe the fire danger period currently in force until May 1, 2015.

Local CFA brigades have been called out to a disturbing number of fires lit by people who believed the restrictions were no longer applicable.

Churchill CFA captain Steven Barling, says that some people are unsure about whether fire restrictions are still in force as we have had

good rainfall and mild, cool conditions recently.

However, he stressed that it is still an offence to light fires during the fire danger

Steven said that although the deliberately lit fires were often started by people trying to do the right thing to prepare their properties for the season, burning off was not allowed and that CFA had a zerotolerance approach to fires lit during the fire danger period.

Preventing bushfires is



everyone's responsibility, not just the responsibility of the CFA or Victoria Police.

will be carried out on private land within the northern car park. Latrobe City Council has been coordinating works with the private landowners to try to minimise negative impacts on traders and customers.

Balfour Place -**Reconstruction Works**

The next significant project in the Churchill Town Centre will be the reconstruction of Balfour Place over coming months. This work is being undertaken because the road surface of Balfour Place is failing.

At the same time, the opportunity will be taken to incorporate footpaths and improve the safety of the roadway entry to the Churchill Hotel.

In addition reconstruction of the Balfour Place pavement, a new footpath will be constructed on the southern side of Balfour Place, and the roundabout will be shifted slightly towards the south. The entry to the hotel will be designed more as a T-intersection than its current sweeping curve.

Two of the pine trees that have grown from seed next to Balfour Place will be removed, while ensuring that the heritage-protected pine trees near the John Flynn monument are retained.





LOCK IT OR LOSE IT

Latrobe police are asking the community to take precautions to deter the opportunistic thief from stealing items from their vehicles.

During October 60 per cent of the thefts from motor vehicles in the Latrobe Police Service Area were committed in residential driveways, front yards or outside residential addresses.

Of more concern is the fact that 34 per cent of the thefts were committed on vehicles which were not locked.

Another trend that police are seeing is the rise in tradesmen's tools being stolen

from the rear of utes, either at worksites or in driveways.

Victoria Police Community Liaison Officer, Leading Senior Constable Brett Godden said "Handbags, wallets and phones being left in unlocked vehicles provides a temptation to the unscrupulous thief and we are asking the community to take the simple step of locking their vehicle." Some of the steps you can take to prevent being a victim of theft from motor vehicle are:


Philip Parade will be closed to traffic until 3pm to enable safe conduct of activities for pedestrians in this area.

Community garden news

This is just a quick message of community garden news to give you the chance for celebration, involvement and feedback.

Sheina, Bronwyn and myself attended a Rotary meeting and gave a presentation about our community garden and sensory garden feature, with the goal of obtaining some funding.

wonderful news The is that they have donated \$300 towards the project and have members who are very interested in seeing the project get off the ground. This is wonderful support so we thank Rotary (and Brenda) very much and have to pat ourselves on the back for spending over ten hours developing the Powerpoint presentation, which was received very positively by the Rotary members.

Since our successful working bee we have received five worm farms and worms

(now behind the Hub shed). Four are set up with worms inside. The fifth one was set up by the Pooh Corner childcare kids recently.

The children filled the two wheelbarrows with water and soaked/pulled apart the coconut fibre that goes in the bottom of the worm farm. They then bucketed the fibre into the worm farm and placed the worms inside.

We therefore need to begin collecting food waste from businesses in Churchill to feed our little waste-munching buddies (community garden members can also save their own fruit/veg waste for our worms if they wish). Deadheading **–**

Remove dead flowers before they put their energy into producing seeds.

This keeps plants looking tidy, extends the life of annuals and prolongs the flowering of shrubs especially

Basil, mint, oregano, and thyme are a few of the herbs that would be more productive if deadheaded regularly.

Pruning -

Pruning should be done as soon as flowers have finished and new shoots are developing on stems. Cut just above these shoots (about 1cm). Spring flowering trees and shrubs can be pruned now to encourage new growth where flower buds will

form next spring. Any leggy growth should be cut back to form a plant or tree with more flowering branches in spring. Cut out damaged and diseased branches and branches rubbing together which causes damage. Common spring flowering shrubs that should be pruned for more spring flowers are diosma, grevillea and members of the hebe, bottlebrush and protea species. Kangaroo paw should have spent flowering stems cut right off.

Fertilising your garden after pruning will encourage strong healthy new growth.

Happy gardening from all the members of the Churchill Community Garden who are in the planning stages of establishing a sensory and vegetable/herb garden at the rear of the Neighbourhood House Churchill. John's Jottings

John has continued with his historical collecting and this month his snippet is from an article: BILLYS CREEK (A brief history of Billys Creek compiled by Hilmar Batza – September 2003)

This track was named after a hall that had been built for Scouts and Rovers to use during the seventies.

In 1969, Morrie McGlashen, a civil engineer with the SEC, purchased 256 acres for less than \$2000 from a Mr Cameron who owned 400 acres (two titles) that included the area of the current Lodge Track, Clematis Track and the Zigzag Walk. The other title of land was bought by Harry Surman. Prior to Mr Cameron, the previous land owners included Koon, Colonial Mutual Life and Bryant.

Mr Mc Glashen was heavily involved in the scouting movement in Melbourne and wanted to build a 'Lodge' for the Reservoir 1st Scouts and Rovers to stay in when they came to the area. The whole area was over-run with blackberries. It took some three to four years to clear the land with tractors. Things sped up when Mr McGlashen was able to buy a bulldozer. Access to the land was initially from Bill Robert's place off Jumbuk Road.

The Reservoir Troop, who camped in tents at the weekend, dug a track down the hillside. Eventually a bulldozer was hired to finish the track. A bridge was built across 'Side Creek' and a track carved into the hillside to get to where the Lodge was going to be built. Later the army widened the track and took it through to Morans Road."

January Activity Report

At this month's activity we had Beryl, Matt, Ken, Peter, John, Darren, Helen, Gareth and Ranger Craig. The group met in the car park and caught up on the news from the New Year. Gareth was along for his first activity along with his wife, Helen who was back again. It is great to have some of the regular users of the Park along to help with the activities, and to learn more about the Park. If others are regular users, you are also very welcome to come along and help out in the activities.

The group split into two work groups, with Matt and John making repairs to some boxes, while the rest travelled along Billy's Creek to survey the remaining nesting boxes. Matt and John made repairs to four boxes, with three needing to be remounted onto their trees while the other needed a plate fixed to the front. Matt and John checked over the display board near the first Billys Creek crossing and conceded that a little maintenance and painting will improve the display.

The survey group surveyed the boxes not surveyed last month. There was again a healthy number of animals found in the boxes. In one of the boxes the sugar gliders were very active coming out of the box as we approached. The two sugar gliders watched us from further up the dead tree. The photo above is of one of these sugar gliders watching from the box. When you're next walking through the Park look at the nesting boxes and see who could be watching you.

One box had moving leaf litter inside. No animal could be seen, so we estimated that at least one Agile Antechinus was



The surveyed number of animals is slightly higher than in the last few surveys.

The totals from the last two surveys were: Dec 2014 - Sugar Glider 37, Agile Antechinus 6. Jan 2015 - Sugar Glider 14, Agile Antechinus 1.

Totals - Sugar Glider 51, Agile Antechinus 7.

The group regrouped and located the trees (previously located, GPS'd and marked by Ken and Matt) where six new boxes were to be positioned. John had done a magnificent job in making six new nesting boxes over the last month. After the lunch break the group returned to make repairs to another box and to check again on the Agile Antechinus (which had moved elsewhere).

The work is being undertaken by a local Morwell business highly skilled in underground trenching. Installation of this new water pipe requires specialised machinery as the terrain does present some challenges.

Work to re-connect the mains water supply is being made possible after a successful funding application was made to the Cemeteries and Crematoria Regulation Unit – which is part of the Victorian Department of Human Services.

The accompanying photograph shows the new water pipe worming its way towards the cemetery.

Trust has also been fortunate to receive two new bench style seats. These were donated and both will soon be in position near the gazebo.

His style of music entertained us all over many years, which included rock, pop, country, gospel and


His death at age 42, was a great loss to the music industry.

Power(ful) Memories of Hazelwood Power

The continuing story: Kevin Turpin

Kevin Turpin Churchill, was an apprentice boilermaker at the time he ventured onto the Hazelwood site works. It was 1965 when he started work for Tuba Steel Constructions. There were none of the amenities of today recalls Kevin. Here are Kevin's memories.

"I started work as an apprentice boilermaker with the company called Tuba-Steel which mainly subcontracted to Babcock and Wilcox, based in a small workshop in Madden Street, Morwell.

The Di Fabrizio Brothers had a small fabrication shop next door before in later years, moving to the vacant Gas and Fuel workshops in Tramway

The first job I can remember with Tuba-Steel was melting down lead ingots at our Madden Street workshops to fill the keel of a steel Sydney to Hobart racing yacht, built by company owner Ernie Eggers. I earned \$5 an hour.

I can remember my first recollections of Hazelwood Power Station. Ernie Eggers owned a 300 SL sports Mercedes car. I threw my welding mask toolbox, etc into his car's boot and away we went. The road to Hazelwood Power Station followed the Mirboo North rail line and I recall speeds of 100 mph. Was I glad when we stopped at the job.

Upon driving through the security gate, I was amazed at the magnitude of the site; so many people working on such a diversity of jobs.

Some worked on earthworks, sculpting out the cable tunnels to house many kilometres of cable supporting racks beneath the power station; others laying concrete slabs at basement level and other levels up to the boiler structure; some working on the construction of a chimney stack so high in the sky; others working on the construction of the support and auxiliary steelwork for the boiler, (at that time two boilers were complete). This was boiler number 3 and turbine house extensions. So much going

hindsight it was In amazing that this monstrous building was being put together like a giant jig-saw puzzle, with hardly any cherry pickers or travel towers; only air winches, a crane mounted at roof level, bosun chairs, scaffolding, ladders

The construction workers themselves were a mixing pot of German, Italian, Greek, Maltese, English and many others. Not necessarily skilled labour but willing to have a go in their new country.

I feel the term 'wog' was more a term of endearment than disrespect.

I learnt many new words (like hammer, chisel etc in Italian, Greek and so on) as well as others, some I could repeat at home, and others well.

We had an on-site workshop, crib shack and office on a hill about 400 metres from the actual construction site, to which we would travel at 'smoko' and lunchtime on the back of an old VW cut down ute,

about 12 of us, standing up and hanging onto a rail. That wouldn't happen today. I have fond memories of playing 500 in crib shack. There were billy boys who made the coffee for you and brought orders for lunch and even placed bets on for you.

Tragically, some work mates lost their lives on site due to bad decisions by themselves or others. It was gut wrenching when the site alarm would sound to summon the rescue crew.

Asbestos use on site was rife. We would be welding skin casing on the side of the boiler wall and other tradesmen were lagging pipes with the stuff above you. It would rain down.

I knew a few over the years have passed away because of exposure from its' use. Noone using it on site knew how dangerous a material it was, and still is.

Beam walking was a term used by riggers, trades assistants and tradesmen in most cases to get from one job to another, because there were no walkways installed yet. It was something I couldn't get used to, walking on the top of a beam maybe 100 feet above the ground with no handrail, carrying tools, welding leads

I saw a guy once who lost his teeth, not by being hit by anything, but by leaning over the handrail about 80 feet up, yelling out to his trade's assistant on the basement, and out came his false teeth.

When I was getting married, they put a cowbell weighing 15 kg on me. I had to go and find a grinder to take it off. Other larks included chaining prospective grooms to a pole or handrails.

Hazelwood Power Station was an eye-opener for a young 17 year old, but it taught me a lot in my trade, and about people.

I learnt to think outside of the square. If a guy works hard and achieves he should be proud; proud too of his family and bringing them up. Unless you took pride in your job you were a pretty ordinary tradesman."

Max Williamson

Williamson Max of Morwell, was a civil engineer and an SEC (State Electricity Commission) section leader manager. It was his responsibility to oversee the builders and trades maintenance work at Morwell, and then into the new Hazelwood Power Station

Unit 1 of the station came on line in 1964. In 1971 construction of the station finished and all units were

up and running. It was time


for an official opening. It was going to be a mighty occasion with thousands of dignitaries of every ilk being invited.


As a section head, Max received an invitation to the opening and the luncheon. An official program was produced with the names of those giving speeches. A souvenir booklet was produced. The Gippslander train was to leave from Flinders Street station


to Morwell station, with all the SEC Commissioners on board. They were to be taken by bus from the station to Hazelwood. There would be a bus tour of the features of the area after the opening.

Henry Bolte was the Premier at the time, and it is thought he had upset the unions, and provoked some unrest, causing rumblings of a stand up demonstration on the day. As security at Hazelwood was a low priority in those days, it was therefore considered too dangerous, and so the opening was cancelled. However, all the invited guests enjoyed the lunch and the opportunity of seeing the plant first hand.

Hazelwood Power Station remains unopened and the souvenir booklet has become a rare collector's item.

Cyril began his working life by becoming an electrical fitter in the switchyard at Yallourn. As an apprentice he did some of the wiring for C Station, then the switchyard, before going into operations at A, B, C and D stations. This was followed by time at Yallourn Briquette Works. Next, it was back to C Station as an electrical plant operator in the power station area. Then into the Test laboratory, which nearly drove him crazy. The job at Hazelwood came up so he jumped at the chance.

Cyril worked for the SEC for 39 years. His job was in transmission with Hazelwood Station Control Centre - the electrical distribution side as a shift operator in the main switchyard. He had a trainee with him.

When Unit A machines came on line they went through transmission personnel. Cyril looked after distribution from the switchyard through the outgoing lines to local and Melbourne areas. It was a very responsible job.

Transmission was annexed to the station.

"It was a good place to work," said Cyril. "There was great camaraderie, as I got on well with the Unit Attendants. It was nice to have a talk with

them and they in turn were so helpful. I was accepted as part of the overall operation. I liked to get around and meet people."

Cyril got to know what everyone did and how things operated so that if an emergency or a fault arose, he was able to work together with those involved to solve the problem. This created a relationship where people were confident to report.

The explosion in No 3 generator was remembered as a terrible accident caused by hydrogen in the tunnel into the generator, which was hydrogen cooled.

Several years before Cyril took a redundancy package, Cyril joined the Social Club. He was invited to stay on and take over the retirees group, most of which he had worked with for a third of his working life. Cyril's wife Enid was elected onto the committee and Cyril says it is great to do things together.

Many lost contact with their working friends when they left, and this was harsh for some and they often died off. To maintain contact was a good thing. They have monthly meetings, discussions, trips to the pokies, and day trips in between. An annual BBQ is held. They

write to Hazelwood Power and receive cheques to run it. Several of the members have died these last few years. "We mourn the loss of these friends and their wives," said

Special times were when they organised the 30th anniversary and were asked to help as tour drivers for the 40th anniversary.

1969 "Back in first became involved at Hazelwood Power Station. I had applied for a Unit Attendant's position, after eliminations and an IQ test, I made it, with 10 other applicants, into the nine month intensive training

Having for the first time entered the control room, I thought, I would never get to know all of the controls, lights, alarms and their various functions, for as long as I lived.

However, once into the swing of the course and the high standard of teaching, it all gradually began to take shape. We graduated in June 1970, and were placed in various Stages (1-4) to continue on-the-job training and gain experience with seasoned operators. At that stage, Unit 8 was just being commissioned, although I did not see much of that as I was stationed in Stage 1. March 11, 1971 saw the

official opening of the \$230 million Hazelwood Station. From that time Hazelwood was generating up to 60% of the State's power, and was the largest power station in Australia. In those earlier days, Hazelwood supported some 1200 employees, and had a very good safety record. Maintenance of the plant was undertaken with a rigid permit procedure, and as such accidents were kept to an absolute minimum. The Station had an excellent social club, with several functions throughout the year, and culminating with the Christmas picnic for members' children with most presents costing more than the annual membership!

The canteen at the station was an excellent moneyspinner for the social club, which maximised the benefits to members with minimum outlay. There were largely four groups at the station, Management, Administration, Maintenance, and Operations.

Operations, of which I was a part, was responsible for running the boilers, turbines, generators and associated auxiliary plant. We all operated on a shift basis, that being six afternoons, six days and six nights all of eight hours duration.

Every 12-15 months each of us went onto a relief roster for three months, filling in for those on leave or sick. Overall, each shift became a little family, working together as a team, and where many outside activities, such as golf, cricket, soccer and footy, added to the camaraderie.

1978 became the blackest era at Hazelwood, after an explosion in Unit 3's generator claimed the lives of three personnel. Blame laying and finger pointing did not help the situation, and did not help the families of those involved. Stricter permit procedures followed and made the station just that much safer.

I could go on about many of the personal things that went on in the station, mostly humorous, some more serious, but I think some things are best left just where they happened.

In 1979 I did another nine month course to become an Assistant Unit Controller, and in 1983, made the rank of Unit Controller. In the late 1980's, 12 hour shifts were trialled, i.e. two days and two nights and a five day break. Oddly, it did not suit everybody, but

the majority adjusted to it and I personally felt it gave us a better quality of life. Still in the late 1980's, restructuring began, the bean counters moved in and decided to cull a few workers and then a few more, and then still more, with Voluntary Departure Packages (each one the last, mind you). More and more personnel decided to take up the offer.

As the plant was being run into a poor state and we were trying to maintain generation, sometimes against very trying conditions, some of us more seasoned staff decided to take up the package offer, and in 1992, I decided it was time.


I loved the place and workmates, and to this day still miss it, but at the time, enough was enough."


Ken Highton responded to our appeal for old photos and some of his have been included in this section of our history.

Named after George Hibbert (1757-1837,) a distinguished English patron of botany and a nurseryman at Clapham,

dentata: From the Latin 'dentatus', meaning toothed or having a toothed margin, referring to the leaves of this

Common Name: Training Guinea Flower

Distribution: Widespread along the east coast of Australia, from south-east Queensland through NSW into eastern Victoria, in open forest areas and rainforest margins, quite often in moist situations.

Description: A trailing plant or light climber, prostrate without support, but scrambling a couple of metres through surrounding vegetation if it gets a chance. The leaves are up to 10cm long and 3cm wide.

They are usually dark green, but can be reddish bronze when young or during the colder months. The flowers

Plants in my Garden occur mainly in spring and early summer, but can flower sporadically at any time of year. They are up to 4cm across, bright yellow, usually with five notched petals

and numerous

stamens in the centre.

Opinion: Of the more than 150 species of Hibbertia, only two are climbers; Hibbertia dentata and H. scandens, the Climbing Guinea flower. H. dentata is not as vigorous as its cousin, hence the common name Trailing rather than Climbing. My original plant is in the bed surrounding the frog pond, but it has been

fluffy




breeding!

There are now more plants growing in the adjacent beds, so I guess this species likes the conditions in the area and is happy to self-seed itself around the place.

sought out the concerns of our


community, and then brought together information from police, local government, and other relevant agencies into a single summary source of support.



5 tips for staying cool during summer heatwaves

Gippsland residents are being reminded to take particular care of their health during the heat of the summer months.

"Despite a relatively cool start to summer, the end of February is expected to be particularly hot," said Dr James Byirakare, Medical Director at Latrobe Community Health Service.

"The heat is a deceptive threat. We view it as part of everyday life in Australia, but it can have a very real impact on our health. This is particularly true for people who are elderly and people who have a medical condition such as diabetes, kidney disease or mental illness," he said.

Dr Bvirakare said there were several easy steps that can be taken to reduce the health impact of

"The Department of Health has extensive advice on coping with the heat. We need to keep fluids up, avoid the hottest parts of the day, and look after our neighbours," he said.

Department of Health recommendations include:

1 Drink plenty of water, even if you don't feel

2 If you don't have air conditioning at home. keep yourself cool by using wet towels, putting your feet in cool water and taking cool (not cold) showers. Or spend as much time as possible in cool or air-conditioned buildings (for example, shopping centres, libraries, cinemas or community centres).

3 Stock up on food, water and medicines so you don't have to go out in the heat.

4 Eat smaller meals more often and cold meals such as salads.

5 Avoid strenuous activity like home improvements and gardening.
