Current plans suggest the racing will commence at 10:30am after the newly established 5-kilometre parkrun.

The community will have an opportunity to witness the region's best mower racers in action as they 'go flat out on something that shouldn't go flat out', says VICMOW representative and mower racer, Debra Tormey. 'The novelty of the sport is what makes it interesting.'

As well as getting to watch them whizz around a track, spectators will be able to interact with the mowers (and drivers) as they go on display between races.

VICMOW reps and racers will be available to detail the specs of their machines and answer any questions regarding the sport. VICMOW maintains their

Plants in my garden

By Mike Beamish Species:

Leptospermum 'Double Pink' Family: Myrtaceaeb

Distribution: This plant is a cultivar, probably from New Zealand stock and does not have a natural distribution. Description: A

medium-sized, compact shrub to 2m high and 1.5m broad. Leaves spread widely and are variable in shape. Flowers are prolific in spring and early summer, bright pink in colour with white frilly edges and are about 15mm in diameter. This cultivar is derived from L. scoparium (Manuka), which occurs from the far south of NSW to the Grampians in Victoria and is widespread in Tasmania and New Zealand. Most Australian plants are white-flowered, but pinks and reds occur in New Zealand, so



it is presumed that the parents of this cultivar are from New Zealand, the cultivation work was probably done in the USA and it is a stretch to call it an Aussie native!

Opinion: Whether it's a native or not, it's still a pretty plant when in full flower. Mine came from the raffle plants at APS LV and is planted on the northern nature strip. Currently it is about

a metre high. It did flower patchily for the first time last year, but this year has put on a much better show. Pity it only flowers for a few weeks, the rest of the year it is just another scratchy tea-tree.

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
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Churchill CFA New Australian Flag

Food options on the day will include homemade icecream, mini doughnuts, vegetarian, vegan and gluten free food, baked spuds, as well as plenty of BBQ style


The Boolarra Top Shop will be open for food and supplies and both pubs will be serving food, alcoholic drinks and coffees.

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Seeing is believing, yes?

That's often the point made about faith; in that faith is said to be belief without good evidence.

So here's something to think about, in regard to saying that 'seeing is believing'.

The science behind the eye shows that we do not actually believe what we see, as the eye sees things inverted

and the brain makes sense of that image.

In a broad sense, we do not believe what we see, and we do not walk by sight. In order to do so, our brain draws on other ways of discerning reality.

The science of that is, simply, that the image we see is turned upside down before it hits the retina and is then translated into neural impulses and transmitted along optic nerve fibres to our brain.

Our brain's clever processing then builds the image (two dimensional) into what we see (three dimensional) the right way

There 'rods' which process the monochrome images, and 'cones' which process the

All interesting.

But with saying that 'seeing is believing' we have an interesting parallel with



If we cannot believe what we see and our perceptions are not our primary source of what's true, and if what we see requires the help of another source in order to make sense of the image, then to see what is 'right side up' we human beings are actually walking by faith, not by sight.

Our senses are really meant to be secondary and complementary to faith.

So, without faith it is impossible to see correctly.

In a world that sees 'upside down', faith enables us to see 'right side up'.

Worth thinking about!

At midday on Sunday, February 21, Hazelwood Cemetery Trust will host Vietnam veteran members of the Gippsland Sub-Branch when they gather to pay their respects to fallen mates.

Similar gatherings, on the same day at the same time, will also take place at Traralgon and Yallourn Cemeteries as part of Victoria simultaneous state-wide gravesite commemorative services. At Hazelwood, a service will be held at the new ANZAC memorial.

Members of Gippsland Sub-Branch will join with other members of the Victorian Vietnam Veterans Branch, also assembling at the same time at 35 Victorian cemeteries in which 98 Australians who died during the Vietnam War are buried or commemorated.

The state-wide gravesite commemorations will mark the start of a year of activities by Victorian Vietnam veterans to mark the 50th anniversary of the Battle of Long Tan.

The Gippsland Sub-Branch President Mr Geoff Hopkins said "This is the first time that simultaneous statewide commemorations of this type have ever been attempted. We wanted to visit all the gravesites across the state where our mates are buried to honour their service and sacrifice and to show that they are not forgotten. Most of them died very young; they never had the chance to marry, to have a family, to enjoy their

Hazelwood Cemetery grandchildren and to grow old as we have, so we will assemble at their resting places, conduct a simple service and then carry their spirit with us throughout

"We will be conducting three services, one for Adrian Rich at the Hazelwood Cemetery, a service for three, Allan Lloyd, Wayne Blanck, and Robert Grist at the Traralgon Cemetery. There will be a service held at Yallourn Cemetery for Joseph Manicola. Next of kin have been advised of the commemorations and invited to attend, and I invite members of the public, especially the young, to join us and take part in what will be a unique and moving commemorative event"

Mr Hopkins advised that "the state branch has called for buglers to play at all the cemeteries and the response has been excellent. We are particularly pleased that a number of talented high school students have volunteered to participate"

Adrian Rich, from Morwell, was a member of the 6th Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment (6 RAR). On the afternoon of February 17, 1967, a Viet Cong ambush in Phuoc Tuy Province triggered five hours of vicious engagement between 6 RAR and two companies of Viet Cong from D445 Battalion.

Trapped and unable to advance or withdraw, the Australians fought bravely, warding off counter attacks



before both sides eventually fell back. It was a major battle after Long Tan, about six months before.

Women's health tests will continue to be covered by Medicare

The Australian
Government has moved to
assure Gippsland women
there are no changes to
Medicare benefits for physical
pap smear examinations
performed by a GP or
specialist.

There will also be no reduction in the dollar-value of the Medicare rebate a patient receives to undertake associated pathology tests.

News reports recently led some people to claim there would be a cut to the Medicare rebate received for these important health tests.

One report falsely claimed a pap smear could cost up to \$30.

Federal Member for Gippsland Darren Chester, said several people had contacted him directly to raise concerns and it was important the public was aware there would be no change to the payments provided to patients.

"The Medicare rebate for these important procedures has not been changed," Mr Chester said. "The confusion has

arisen following a decision to reduce bulk-billing incentive payments that are paid directly to pathology corporations – not patients – which are separate to the Medicare rebate.

If a corporation is claiming that the cost of their tests will increase, they are not taking into account the value of the Medicare rebate a patient receives from the Government to help cover this very cost."

The pathology bulk billing incentive was worth between \$1.40 and \$3.40 at a total cost of \$500 million over

five years, however the Health Minister Sussan Ley has stated bulk-billing rates did not increase beyond natural growth between 2008/09 and 2014/15.

Diagnostic imaging services for concession card holders and children under 16 years old will still attract the bulk-billing incentive. The MRI incentive paid to providers for bulk billing concessional patients and children will be reduced from 100 per cent of the Medicare fee to 95 per cent to line up with the current arrangements for other diagnostic imaging services.

Mr Chester said ensuring the health system remained sustainable was crucial so the government could invest in new medicines.

Restrictions lifted at Hazelwood Pondage

Following recent rainfall the water level at the Hazelwood Pondage has increased sufficiently to allow Latrobe City Council, the waterway manager for the Hazelwood Pondage, in conjunction with Transport Safety Victoria, to lift the current five knot speed.

Restrictions which were

introduced to ensure the safety of all users were removed as of 1pm Friday February 5, 2016. This means that the five knot speed restriction on the entire waterway will be lifted, with the northern boat ramp open to public access.

The water levels will continue to be monitored over the coming weeks. If

further rainfall is not received the 5 knot restrictions may unfortunately need to reintroduced. Latrobe City Council thanks the community and users for their understanding and adherence to the usage restrictions over past months. 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

Jim also receives our thanks as he has willingly moved the mulch and sprayed the path edges, weeds in the mulched garden beds and the odd blackberry which insists on growing.


To end the year the committee decided to have

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

When to harvest popular summer edibles

For picking purposes you can divide fruit and vegetables into three groups.

They are those picked when:

- 1. Young before they are
- 2. Fully ripe or just before totally ripe.

3. Fully ripe.

Group 1:

Asian greens - cut off whole plant at ground level when 15-18cm tall.

Squash, cucumber and zucchini - don't let them grow too big.

Loose leaf lettuce – pick outer leaves when eight or more leaves are on the plant or grow to full size and then cut off at ground level.

Group 2:

Beans – baby or midsize

Capsicums – sweeter at full size. Beetroot – baby beets at

six weeks or full size at 12 Carrots – take 4-6 months

to full size. Baby carrots can be pulled earlier. Potatoes - Wwen foliage dies off dig them up. New potatoes can be dug up earlier.

Group 3: Pumpkins when stem becomes woody. Tomatoes - ripe when

fully coloured. Nearly ripe ones will ripen in a cupboard.

Corn – cob silks go dry and brown.

Mitchell is a young man who lives by culture rules of his school (Be respectful – Be positive, Be understanding, Be your best) not only at school but as his life style. Mitchell assists anyone who needs help, no matter where or why the help is needed.

At home he looks after the interests of every one first before considering his own needs. He believes that everyone has a right to a fair go. If he believes that if someone is struggling no matter why, he will offer what support he can to the person involved or attempt to resolve the persons' needs by providing them with the needs to help themselves.

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A functional concept design and the development of a sound business case are two key actions currently being undertaken in the development of a new Latrobe Performing Arts Centre.

Latrobe City Council's Mayor, Councillor Michael Rossiter, said that securing funding for the project was the main aim.

"Our newly-formed Project Reference Group is working closely with representatives of community, including the Get It Built group, and an expert consulting team comprising Williams Boag Pty Ltd Architects, arts management consultant Greg Randall and theatre production consultant Richard Stuart, to develop the project as a viable funding proposition.

The business case and concept design will be prepared by early March, in advance of funding submissions to State and Federal governments. three-way State, Federal and Local government funding contribution is envisaged," Councillor Rossiter said.

"The business case will build on the existing case for an arts centre in the region.

It focuses on how the facility can deliver significant economic and employment benefits to the region, as well as providing enhanced cultural experiences for the wider Latrobe community.

The concept design will demonstrate the functionality

of the facility, the uses of the various spaces and how they might relate to one another. It's an exciting part of the process but is not a detailed design.

That phase comes after funding commitments have been secured.

When we are at that detailed design point, we will seek broader input to ensure the facility is one that suits the needs and desires of the community.

This may not be until later in 2016," Councillor Rossiter said.







I have always had an interest in photography and used to photograph using film cameras of the trips and adventures that I had done. These days with the improvements in digital photography, the ability to easily extend photography techniques and blend with artistic traits can bring a whole new dimension to photos. I enjoy the process of planning, capturing and editing photographs. I have experimented with photographing birds and made it a challenge to continually capture new species and improve the photographic result through honing technique. Sharp photos of bird's feather and eye details are my main aim.

I have been extensively photographing Gippsland landscapes and water ways. Places of interest to me are the South Gippsland coastline, Gippsland Lakes, Thorpdale, Sale and the wetlands, Wilsons Promontory, local rivers and waterfalls. I have also been experimenting with sunsets, sunrises, stars and Southern Aurora.

Photographic techniques that I have been experimenting with include, HDR (High Dynamic

Jury Duty – part 1

deliberating on a verdict, you may be required to stay later than 4.15pm and maybe even overnight. The judge will tell you the specifics of these arrangements.

If you do not attend court when summoned to be a juror, you may need to appear before a judge yourself to explain your absence. Additionally you may be fined. Being too busy or forgetting the dates are not acceptable excuses.

You must inform your employer that you have been summoned for jury service. You will be given the estimated length of the trial should you be selected as a juror; tell this to your employer too.

If any changes are made to the length of the trial, tell your employer immediately. Employers must release you for jury service. If your employer asks you to apply to be excused from jury duty, and you believe this to be reasonable, you can apply to be excused.

An employer who discriminates against an employee due to jury service is liable to severe penalties. Employers should not expect you to work late at night whilst you are on jury service. You may work after hours if you wish, however jury service is tiring and any work you do must not interfere with your ability to serve as a juror.

In general, your employer is required to pay you the difference between the amount you receive in jury fees and the amount would you have received had you not been serving

as a juror. Most courts have a jury "pool room" where you will wait until you are considered

for a role as juror.

If the court does not have such a room, you will be told where to wait.

You are allowed to bring items with which to entertain yourself while you wait such as a laptop.

You will not be reimbursed for any travel or parking costs related to your jury service. In Melbourne for instance,

the Supreme and County courts are on bus and tram routes, and most regional courts have designated car parks for the public.

Your summons will detail where to go and what to bring. Items you must bring along to your service include your summons and photo identification.

The Churchill United Soccer Club is on a quest to return its once vaunted junior division back to the top of the Gippsland Soccer League participation numbers table by 2020.

Like most sports clubs the Rams have gone through peaks and troughs over its 46 year history, and 2015 junior numbers bottomed out at just over 40 players from a peak of 150 in 2010.

"Sometimes you need to bottom out to force a refocus and regeneration and that's certainly where we've been with a steady decline in numbers over the last five years" said new Vice President and Junior Steering Group Chair, Stephen Breheny.

"We have some very good and experienced people in place to take the club forward along with some very robust organisation structures and value statements to guide us."

Breheny believes the decline can be put down to losing some excellent organisers at the club whose kids have moved through the system and away from the game.

"You can become complacent as a club that the good times will just continue to roll without driving it, but the fact is if there's no structure, volunteers and people willing to help may not feel empowered to do their bit. With our new structure we

are aiming to get everyone to do a little bit here and there which will result in a well oiled machine."

The club has set a target to get junior numbers back to the 150 mark by 2020. The immediate aim is to rebuild in the younger brigade from kids turning four in 2016 through to twelve year olds.

To assist in the rebuild, the club has engaged some long term sponsors for a special junior focused effort to reduce registration costs from \$130 in 2015 to \$99 in 2016, plus every player will also get a junior rams division T-shirt.

"Without great local businesses like the Gippsland Motor Group, Cheney Plumbing Services and Gippsland Trade Printers we simply couldn't afford to break through the price barriers we have, and improve our offering by fifty odd

dollars per child in 2015.

The club was also very happy to gain the services of Kim and Michael Pyke as Junior Coordinator and club Treasurer respectively.

"Kim was the Junior Coordinator with Newborough club Monash for eight years and helped lift their number over that time significantly, and her husband Michael also had a stint as Treasurer at the Wolves so we are rapt to have them on board. Kim's son Matt is also the Rams club Secretary so it's a real family affair with them.

The club embarked on a significant call to action information campaign in January to ensure everyone in the Churchill and District knows about the improvements made at the Rams.

Churchill parkrun commenced with a successful launch on Saturday January 23, with 162 people completing the course.

It is a 5 km free timed run/walk/community event run by volunteers each Saturday. It starts with a run briefing at 7:45 am, before getting underway at 8 am.

People of all ages and various abilities are welcome.

An important part of parkrun is to make friends and meet people while getting fitter and taking on new personal challenges. We will be going to the local cafes in Churchill afterward for a catch up for coffee and breakfast. They are very supportive and providing vouchers to be awarded to volunteer of the month.

The event has been strongly supported by parkrun Australia and Latrobe City Council, which provided \$5,000 in funding through the Healthy Together Latrobe initiative.

Latrobe City Council also undertook maintenance works to ensure the course is appropriate and safe for users.

The event is also supported by the Churchill Hub Committee which has provided access to the building each Saturday morning for toilet access and bar code scanning.

There is a committee of about ten people who worked together for over six months to get the run off the ground, assisted by parkrun Australia Territory Director, Tony O'Connell. Churchill parkrun is number 151 in Australia, and one of six parkruns now operating in Gippsland, with others being planned for Bairnsdale and Moe.

The Churchill parkrun course is attractive and picturesque, being an out and back and repeat course along Eel Hole Creek and starting and finishing at the Hub, on compacted sand with four small bridges attached. This gives an opportunity for people to cross paths and encourage one another. People need to register on the parkrun Australia website and print off a bar code to bring along with them so they can get their personal time

recorded and emailed to them.

This enables them to monitor their progress and set goals if they wish.
