Care of Your Smoke detector

A sleeping person cannot smell smoke and therefore cannot detect a fire. It is essential to have smoke detectors to warn people early, and help save

Smoke detectors should be checked regularly (once a week) by using a broom handle to press the button and make sure it beeps. Dust the detector with a vacuum cleaner brush. Change the batteries at least once a year.

"The Coalition Government is delivering on its commitment to make Victoria safer with 16 new front line police to be allocated to the Latrobe Valley by June 30," Nationals Member for Morwell Russell Northe said today.

Mr Northe said Morwell was included in the 46 Police Service Areas (PSAs) across the state identified by Victoria Police as needing additional resources to tackle violent crime and anti-social behaviour.

Mr Northe said he was fiercely committed to improving law and order in the Latrobe Valley which is why he had campaigned strongly for more police on local streets.

"Community safety is a huge

Mr Northe said the allocation model formed part of Victoria Police's Building Operational Capacity and Capability project, which would deploy the 1,700 new recruits effectively during the next four years.

"The project will be reviewed and tested every year to make sure resources are being allocated effectively and accurately reflect the demand for police services across the state," he said.


With the current closure of the Princes Highway in Morwell, there may be longer than usual delays, which can lead to impatient driving behaviour.

"Draft" - Municipal Early Years Plan 2011-2015



The Council at its last meeting considered and resolved to release for public consultation the draft Municipal Early Years Plan (MEYP)

A Municipal Early Years Plan (MEYP) is a local area plan designed to provide a strategic direction for the development and coordination of early years programs, activities and other local community development processes that impact on children 0 – 8 years and their families in a municipality.

The MEYP uses an action planning approach that engages the local community to achieve a set of agreed, positive early years outcomes for the municipality.

Latrobe City Council adopted its first MEYP 2004-2008 in June 2004. The review of the MEYP 2004-2008 has been delayed as a result of a state-wide review of the framework for development of MEYP's.

This review has been identified as a Key Strategic Activity in the 2010/11 budget and an action in the Council Plan 2010 – 2014 and is

planned to be presented to Council for consideration by 30 June 2011.

The Latrobe City draft MEYP 2011-2015 has been developed in the context of a policy and funding environment that is investing in children while in their early years.

An outcome of this investment in Latrobe City is the growth of programs provided by a range of agencies and alliances that are introducing new services and programs.

The Plan identifies five goals:

- 1. Children in Latrobe City have optimum health and wellbeing outcomes.
- 2. High quality, accessible services are available for children aged 0-8 and their families.
- 3. Community infrastructure both natural and built provides families with opportunities to support the growth and development of their children.
- 4. Children's learning and development is enhanced through quality early learning programs.
- 5. Parents and communities have the capacity to care for children and promote their development.

The MEYP will be monitored during the period of implementation by the Latrobe City Best Start Partnership.

The partners have been important in the development and delivery of the plan and currently play a significant role in the development of early years services within the municipality.

To ensure community input regarding the implementation and progress of the MEYP, representation will be sought with a focus on parents with young children.

The draft Latrobe City Municipal Early Years Plan (MEYP) 2011 - 2015 has now been released for public consultation for an eight week period in accordance with Council's

Community Engagement Plan 2010 – 2014.

A copy of the MEYP will be forwarded to all stakeholders involved in the initial consultation who have agreed to take part in the review

Written submissions in relation to the draft Municipal Early Years Plan 2011 – 2015 will be received until 27 May, 2011.

Following the community consultation process a further Report will then be presented to Council at the Ordinary Council meeting to be held on 20 June, 2011 detailing all submissions received and presenting the Municipal Early Years Plan 2011 – 2015 for consideration.

"Draft" LIBRARY PLAN 2011 – 2017

Library users have the chance to comment on Latrobe City's draft Library Plan 2011 -2017 that has been released for public comment.

The Plan will guide the delivery of Latrobe City's libraries over the next six years and continues to focus on the six key program areas of service delivery; partnerships; facilities; marketing and communications; resources; and information technology.

The national and international trends, along with the results of an extensive community engagement process, were taken into account when developing the plan.

Consultants, 'LibrariesAlive!', engaged with library users and other key stakeholders over a three month period last year.

Capturing the feedback for the development of the draft plan included discussions with Councillors, Friends of the Libraries, library staff and other council officers as well as focus groups and surveys.

A total of 383 surveys were completed, including 108 responses from people who do not currently use any library facilities.

Through all of the consultation channels

used, more than 400 people were engaged in the development of the draft Plan.

It has been considered important that as

much feedback as possible be captured to ensure the draft plan places Latrobe City in the best position to take advantage of a welldeveloped Library Plan.

The extensive consultation has been in

accordance with Council's Community Engagement Plan 2010 – 2014 and it has provided a great opportunity for the community to provide input into the draft plan.

The previous Library Plan 2006 – 2011 has delivered many enhancements to outreach services and highlighted the importance of libraries as community resources.

High points of the previous plan included the opening of the new library as part of the Churchill and District Community Hub; several successful and prominent exhibitions including two Latrobe Valley Ukrainian photography exhibitions, the State Library of Victoria's Travelling Treasures Program and the two year state-wide Independent Type travelling exhibition.

Council is keen to receive feedback from the wider community now, so that the new Library Plan can be shaped to offer an even wider array of services to library patrons.

Autumn vegie patch and flower garden

Hello again gardening folk.

We have a very busy time in the garden from now on. If we are not preparing for planting our Autumn vegie patch and flower garden, we are looking after already established plantings. Some may be still harvesting summer crops such as melons, tomatoes, beans, lettuce etc. Also keep a close look out for caterpillar moths, grubs and eggs or any other pests.

Have you planted your sweet peas yet? If not, you still have time to do so. Remember they like a good dressing of lime (chicken manure). It is also time to cut back and tidy up all types of geraniums.

All my potted bulbs have been brought out of hibernation and have been topped up with fresh potting mix if needed, or re-potted if necessary, lightly fertilised and placed around the garden in sunny spots to start their new season.

I have a large pot of yellow autumn crocus in bud. Talking bulbs! It is also time to chill tulip, daffodil and hyacinth bulbs for about six weeks, in the crisper compartment of your refrigerator. When planting bulbs, dig in a bucket or so of compost, or old manure, or even sugar cane mulch. Plant bulbs approximately twice as deep as they are thin, with of course flat (or

round end down) down except ranunculus, which before being planted, look a bit like a pulled double tooth. The roots, like legs, are planted downwards.

I am going for all dwarf vegetables this year. I am about to plant dwarf green 🎾 peas, broad beans, and the smaller varieties of cauliflower, and broccoli, and as always, sugar loaf cabbage. We love them the best. You can pick as early as you like, and they are so sweet.

Tomatoes were slow this year, owing to the cool summer, but now ripening at a rate of knots. The downside of this is the ground devoted to tomatoes this summer is slow to be prepared for this winter's rotated crop. Oh well we will just put it down to what we usually say "Hasn't it been a funny year!" We even have a mollis azalea in flower.



You can be kept busy lightly pruning most shrubs during autumn.

Vegetable seeds to plant now – broad beans, peas, cabbage, broccoli, carrot, English spinach, spring onion, onion, lettuce, leek and kale.

Flower seeds to plant now- alyssum, celosia, cineraria, cleome, cyclamen, gypsophila, hollyhock, Iceland poppy, marigold, pansy, primula, salvia, stocks, sweet pea, viola.

That's all for now. All being well will talk to you again next month. G r e a gardening. Enjoy Knowledge is knowing that a tomato is a fruit. Wisdom is not putting it in a fruit salad.

- To make icing, place icing sugar and egg white in a bowl and stir well to combine.
 - (Makes approx 22 gingerbread men)

Gingerbread Men

Ingredients:

125 gms unsalted butter, softened

½ cup brown sugar

2/3 cup golden syrup

2 ½ cups plain flour, sifted

2 teaspoons ground ginger

1 teaspoon bicarbonate of soda

1 cup icing sugar, sifted

1 egg white.

Method:

Pre-heat oven to 190 C 1.

2. Place butter and sugar in the bowl of an electric mixer and beat for 10-20 mins, or until light and creamy,

- Add golden syrup, flour, ginger and 3. bicarbonate of soda, beat until smooth dough forms.
 - 4. Refrigerate for 30 mins.
- 5. Roll out the dough between sheets of non-stick baking paper to 4mm thick.
- Use big and small gingerbread man cookie cutters to cut out shapes from the dough.
- 7. Place on baking trays lined with non-stick baking paper and bake for 8-10 mins until golden.
 - Cool on trays.

Pipe icing along the edges of each biscuit.

They were three nursing sisters who served in World War 1.

Saturday Breakfast

The monthly Saturday Breakfast was held on the 26 March. Our visiting speaker was Rob de Souza-Daw, a local historian who was speaking on "The Three Sisters from Hazelwood." This topic proved to be very popular as over 20 people attended, some coming from as far away as Melbourne.

Rob de Souza-Daw's talk was about three nursing sisters from Hazelwood who served in World War 1. The first one he spoke of was Sister Agnes She was born in Nadenbousch. Hazelwood in 1882 and she attended Hazelwood Ridge State School. In 1908 she commenced nursing training at the Warragul and District Hospital, completing this in 1911. At the age of 33 years she joined the A.I.F. as a Staff Nurse and was paid at the rate of 7s 10d a day. In 1917 she was sent by ship to Bombay, to work at the Cumballa War Hospital. Over the following 3 years, she served in various areas until 1919, when she returned to Port Melbourne, and then on to Morwell by train. Later that year, she was discharged from the Army Nursing Service. Three years later she was admitted to Mount Ida House, Hawthorn as a melancholic. Two years later, in 1924, she died, aged 42 years.

The second nurse was Sister Annie Thompson. She was born in Traralgon in 1884 and attended Hazelwood North State School. Annie Thompson had a sad childhood, as her father died in 1890 and her mother in 1891. She commenced her nursing training in 1906, completing it in 1909.

At 31 years, she enlisted in the A.I.F. as a Staff Nurse. She left Melbourne in 1917 and travelled by ship to Bombay, where she worked at the Alexandra War Hospital.

Over the next 3 years she worked at various hospitals, finally leaving from Calcutta in 1919 and travelling to Melbourne.

Later that year, she left the Army Nursing Service. She went on to work at the Darwin Hospital then Maldon.

It was there she met George Cruddas, whom she married in 1925. She died in 1955 at Heidelberg Repatriation Hospital.

Sister Bessie Waldon was born in 1883 in Moondarra. In 1890 the Waldon



family moved to Fremantle. Her mother died in 1902. In 1908 Annie enrolled as a nurse at the Warragul Hospital, completing her training in 1911. In 1913 she did a course in midwifery and gynaecology at the Women's Hospital in Carlton. In 1916, at the age of 27 years, she joined the A.I.F. and later that year, was sent by ship to Plymouth, then on to France. A week later she was working at the Rouen Hospital in France, where she first saw wounded soldiers and those suffering from gas gangrene.

Over the next 3 years she worked at various hospitals, finally returning to Port Melbourne and then on to Morwell. In 1920 she was discharged from the Army nursing Service. In 1921 she married Arthur Hardie at Highfields. In 1944 fire destroyed Highfields. In 1966 she died at Heidelberg.

It was fascinating to hear of the adventurous lives of these nurses. Rob De Souza-Daw is to be commended for the work he put in researching their lives and the precise dates of the mile-stones in their lives.

The next Saturday Breakfast will be held on the 30 April at 7.45am at the Co-Operating Churches, Williams Avenue.



Community Safety

Newly appointed Sergeant to Churchill Police station, Sgt Mel Hamshere, will be guest speaker at our April meeting. This meeting will be held in the function room at Churchill Hotel at 7pm on Wednesday 20th April.

The topic of the night will be "How Police are working with the local community to make Churchill a safer place". All district residents are invited to come along and meet our local Police Sergeant. An opportunity will be provided for questions.

Also attending will be our local Neighbourhood Watch/Safer Communities Co-ordinator, Peter Gray, who will present the local crime report & be available to answer questions on home, car & personal security.

There has been a number of anti-social incidents in Churchill over recent months and CDCA is helping to address this problem. We have written to our local State Member of Parliament, Russell Northe, reminding him of his pre-election commitment to a 24 hour police station for Churchill. In the interim, we requested the police station be open to match hotel opening hours.

We have also written to Latrobe City Council, requesting the establishment of a Council facilitated 'Churchill Community Safety Consultative Group', comprising residents & representatives of local stakeholder organisations. We believe such a group would be well placed to co-ordinate the efforts of local groups to improve community safety, whilst identifying further strategies that could be implemented in Churchill.

A number of local organisations are taking steps to address safety concerns. Additional security cameras have been installed at the shopping centre. Monash University has also increased security around the campus, including residences. The hotel has installed some 60 cameras in, & around, the building.

The hotel car park is well lit, and Philip Pde, the Hub & the Town Hall will all be well lit at night when works are completed in that area. Security guards have also been employed to patrol the shopping centre.

Monash Student Union is trialling a 'Good Neighbours' social program, to introduce local residents to post-graduate students & their families who live in our town.

The University has an 'International Student Friendship Program' whereby international students are paired with a local resident to meet, chat about living in Australia & experience some of our culture & family life.

Representatives from Latrobe City Council &

Monash University have met with users of the skate park to address some of the issues that have been reported in that vicinity. All too often, it is not the skaters 'proper' that are the cause of problems, but rather the 'hangers-on', who use the area as a meeting place. The same happens at other 'venues' too – the town centre, car-parks, local shops, playgrounds, schools & sporting clubs have seen acts of anti-social or prohibited behaviour over recent months.

There have been a number of reports of under-age drinking in public. Most concerning is the security camera evidence of adults purchasing alcohol for teenagers. There are heavy fines for buying alcohol (& cigarettes) for under-age youth.

Many of the offenders involved in criminal & antisocial behaviour in Churchill have been identified and are facing prosecution. Sadly, at least for some, a criminal conviction may affect future employment & travel prospects.

All residents are encouraged to report incidents to police. Sometimes the police struggle to respond in a timely fashion, as they must prioritise matters & respond to the more serious first. Local police may be detained at road accidents or other life-threatening situations and so it may be some time before other incidents are dealt with.

However, it is essential that the police receive information regarding anti-social & criminal activity. This assists police to identify patterns, patrol areas at times of 'high risk', monitor suspects (as well as known offenders), solve crime & prosecute offenders.

Community safety relies on the effectiveness of partnerships between police, residents & other local agencies.

Prior to our April meeting on the 20th, some CDCA Committee members will be dining at 6pm in the Churchill Hotel. An invitation is extended to all residents to join us, find out more about CDCA & express your views about local matters.

Anyone wishing to attend should contact either Bruce Stephenson on 5122 1335 or Ron Bunn on 5122 1493 so that sufficient seating can be provided & the kitchen advised of likely numbers.

CDCA meets monthly and all local residents are welcome to attend as observers. An opportunity is usually provided at our meetings (time permitting) for all attendees to raise local issues of concern as items of general business.



Hazelwood/Jeeralang Community (Recovery) Committee Reconstruct, Regrow, Renew Outing

The Hazelwood/Jeeralang Community Committee wanted to find a different way to remember the two year anniversary of the Black Saturday fires, by taking a bus trip to the fire affected areas and see what has been achieved in the time since the fires.

This initiative took the form of a bus trip on Saturday 19th March, themed as "Reconstruct, Regrow, Renew" which was co-ordinated by committee representatives and supported by Latrobe City Council.

The trip set off from the southern car park at the Churchill Shopping Centre, with thirty

adults and five children including guest speaker Ken Harris. First call was Jeeralang North Hall to see what progress has been made on the reconstruction work. New windows have been installed and other building works progressing well.

Along the route, comments were heard about how lush and green the areas look. There has been prolific growth in all areas visited. People who had not been to Koornalla or Callignee recently had their eyes opened at the extent of the fire's passage.

There are lots of new buildings going up.

People in this area appeared to have got on with their re-building, dealing positively with the situation.

Koornalla was the next stop, where the historical monument was observed at the bus turning circle.

From there the bus took them to Balook area where they lunched at the Lyrebird café and listened to a talk about flora and fauna of the area given by Ken Harris.

Then it was on to Callignee where the bus trippers found it good to catch up and talk with others who had been fire affected. "The Callignee Community Hall is a fantastic complex," said Robyn. "We had a tour of the fire station, playgroup room, hall with its catering kitchen, meeting rooms and cricket club pavilion." After the tour afternoon tea was served. One local lady provided a wonderful treat including delicious cup cakes decorated with strawberries.

Along the way trivia questions, word searches, and colouring sheets for the children, kept all participants alert

They considered themselves fortunate in the current Assistant, Linda Logue who became a close and valued colleague throughout 1985 but then left to have a baby in 1986. Fortunately Margaret Klose, was available to relieve for the remainder of the year. Robyn and Libby interviewed and appointed Lynda De Vink in 1987 and enjoyed a close working & social relationship with her throughout 1988 and 1989. Lynda became pregnant and left in 1990 and Libby & Robyn appointed Mirjana Hrvojevic as their next wonderful

Robyn left at Christmas 1991 when her family moved to Western Australia.

Among the many happy memories of working at Walkley Park Kindergarten was the use Robyn made of her musical and dance ability and her experience in

These were used in theme nights, and social gatherings around the event. One example was dancing through the ages. The whole community was involved in helping to present the show. Mothers and fathers would make the costumes and props. Parents were roped in for parts. Robyn taught different dances from the ages to the kids and they loved it. Children danced, played instruments or helped in ways according to their talents and interests.

The room was decorated according to the theme, with many displays, and pictorial representations.

Many photos were taken of the various events as a record and to give to the children as a keepsake.

Visionary fundraising events were held, like the dress parade with the children being the models. A show of entertainment was built around the night. People like Paul Devlin were roped in to play guitar. As many links and partnerships with the community as possible were sought out, including with Lumen Christi folks, where they were parents in the group, like Judy and Barry Woods, utilizing their talents.

Robyn believes their strength was that they involved the wider community of Churchill, linking very comprehensively, especially with the schools.

Libby's passion was involving the children in learning about the environment, and being aware of how to protect it.

During the time they were at Walkley Park the ladies changed all the paints to powder ones and the glues to non-toxic. This was a cost factor at the time, but was also essential for a child who was chemically intolerant.

Robyn says that she and Libby felt quite driven and dedicated in their roles. They also had the wonderful support of their husbands, and they portrayed great role models. This was especially noticed at working bees where lots of men turned

The Kindergarten Committees were fantastic and very supportive. Members came from both groups. Libby and Robyn were given lots of autonomy, respect and trust. They put that down to the fact that they worked hard to build a cohesive community. Their aim was to always do things in the best interest of the children and families, through their

dedication and capacity building. During their time, they were able to

develop the playground. One initiative was buying new matting which was made of recycled tyres. This was put down under the covered area on wet days so the children had a chance to play outside despite the rain. Lots of work was put into developing

the garden and the playground, with installation of shade cloth, a pergola, veggie patch and digging patch, and a special garden of natives for a smelling garden.

Inside, they looked at resources and made sure that they had covered all the aspects of what they wanted to teach. This included diversifying the range of books, puzzles, and picture collections. The latter came first from old calendars and the like, through to commercial picture sets. Collections of 'junk' were used creatively and included bits of wood, rocks, cardboard boxes, gumnuts, shells, leaves, bark, twigs and sand.

One particular activity remembered was a large natural materials mural of the beach and bush to which the children could add as they wanted.

Excursions were multi-faceted, with going out, and bringing in people to talk. One example is when a Dad who worked at the SEC came in showing and talking about his safety equipment. Then there would be follow up talks about safety. The Home Corner would become a work place where the children could play out what they had learnt.

Other excursions focused on seasonal changes with visits to the parks, picnics, Family Social events, a visit from the CFA truck, concerts at the schools where they would be invited to attend, visiting shows, the shopping centre, and many

All during the year, and especially on excursions, photos would be taken of each child's participation. These were compiled, along with specially kept paperwork, and a hand and foot print, into a bound Memory Book which was given to each family at the end of the year.

Towards the end of her time at Walkley Park, Robyn says the political climate of Kindergarten teaching changed. Local government was undertaking cost rationalization with changes to pay, working conditions and operational aspects of the kindergarten being put in place. Robyn feels that for her, there was a sense of disempowerment and frustration as the best interests of the children and the community became secondary to the business side of things.

LIBBY ROBERTSON 1985-1993

Libby was happy to put together these memories for this history.

This wonderful preschool finished operating as such at the end of 1993. The Committee had worked so hard to make sure it still held a significant place in the lives of families in Churchill. Brenda Burney, Heather Notting, Heather Farley and, Helen Sutton are some of the people who worked towards this aim.

From 1994 the building proceeded to be used as a Children's Centre offering a variety of services, such as After School dDrama classes, tutoring and 3 year old groups and play groups.

I had originally taught 3 Year old Kinder at Walkley Park back in 1978. This was a two day a week position for me, a session during the week and one on Saturday morning. Pat Williams was the full time teacher at Walkley Park then, probably working 8 sessions a week. I had Margaret Klose as my Assistant. Pat had Carmen Cook. I only did this for a year as I wanted to be home with my little son Jamie who was turning 2.

My next time as Preschool teacher at Walkley Park was in 1985, as teacher of four year olds. Morwell Shire employed Robyn Lister and myself as teachers there in a very innovative idea! Job sharing! We suggested it to the council as we had little children and weren't ready for full time work. The council put us there on trial to see if it worked out. We were responsible for one group each and it worked out very well.

This was the start of a wonderful teaching experience there. Robyn and I worked very co-operatively together, innovating ways relevant to job sharing. We worked independent programs, following the interests of our individual group. However, having each other to discuss things with was very supportive. We enjoyed working with the families and Committee together. One of our 'traditions' we set up was to involve the children and families in an annual Dance Night. Our families of these times will certainly remember the fun we all had.

Walkley Park had a tremendous group of families supporting it. Robyn and I enjoyed these years very much. Over the years we taught a few children in each family so there was a lovely continuity of management and friendships at Walkley

Robyn and I shared assistants - there was Linda Vogue, Lynda DeVink, Mirjana Hrojevic and Michelle Cooper.

Robyn left Christmas 1991 and I continued in the position of full time teacher there. I enjoyed another 2 years teaching there with the wonderful families. Sadly the preschool was doomed to close at the end of 1993. It was a very sad time. Closing the door on such a wonderful preschool was a huge jolt to the families and staff. However the very innovative Walkley Park Committee created a way to keep it going as a Children's Centre for a number of years.

During the nine years I was involved with Walkley Park we experienced and shared many highlights with the families. I have listed some of my memories of the sort of program and social highlights over the years there.

- Continuity of families meant commitment and caring. Parents and our own hubbies and children participated in setting up a wonderful landscaped playground. We established herb gardens, seating, large sandpit and garden areas.
- Fundraising was well supported; there was a huge sense of Community involvement. A result was that the centre was extremely well equipped, had excellent facilities and pleasant surroundings. It facilitated an outdoor covered area to be built so we could use this area in our programmed activities.
- Social Events included car trials, wine tastings, fashion parades and Dance Nights. These Family Dances became a tradition. Parents joined in these themed 'performances' with their children. It was great fun. We included the costume preparation and learning songs into the children's program. Brenda and Rod Burney headed up our Bush Night

programs and other years we had Fantasy Nights, Rock n' Roll Nights a few 'red faces' experiences.

- · Excursions for the children and family outings included going to Mossvale Park in Autumn, Morwell National Park, Farms, Parents homes, over to the Uni for Music, to mention a few.
- An innovative way to save some money was to create out own entertainment for the children. Parents shared their own skills and hobbies. Some of the mums put on plays for the children by acting the story characters themselves. We had breakfasts and luncheons for the children. Program days such as teddy picnics, puppet shows, Mini Olympic days, Father Nights, Grandparent days, Mother's Day, Easter and Christmas all helped to include the wonderful community of the preschool.

I'm sure the families of Churchill have warm memories of the time Walkley Park Preschool was running. I was very fortunate to have shared this experience

HEATHER NOTTING 1993-1994

Heather began her association with Walkley Park Pre-School when her daughter Kobi began kindergarten in 1993. Heather became the Treasurer of the committee and later continued as Treasurer of the Walkley Park Children's Centre.

Libby Robertson was the "awesome, fantastic teacher" at the time. Brenda Burney was the President of the committee and Helen Sutton was also a committee member.

At some stage through that year, as the numbers of pre-schoolers had dropped, the Council decided that two of the preschools in Churchill would close -Walkley and Watson. The Walkley Park committee voiced their opposition of the closure to the council. But decisions needed to be made. So Walkley Park voted in favour of closing, but recommended that Watson Park remain open because of its proximity to Churchill Primary School. That then meant that Andrews Park and Walkley closed while Watson and Glendonald remained open. Heather states that it was a hard decision, as each preschool committee wanted their own preschool to stay open.

With the decision made, Libby Robertson had to leave.

Brenda Burney, Helen Sutton and Heather Notting put their heads together in a brainstorming exercise, and came up with the idea of the Walkley Park Children's Centre. It would be a facility which would incorporate childcare and 3 year old kindergarten. People could hire it for birthdays. Other children's activities could be run there.


Phillip Meyer from Yinnar ran a very successful drama group, and for a short time a children's aerobics and drama course was held, as well as computer

Rotarians work for Hazelwood House

Members of Hazelwood Rotary recently held a working bee at Hazelwood House to restore the fountain which the club had installed many years previously but which required maintenance. Highlight of the day was the morning tea provided by the staff from Hazelwood House. President, Ken Peake said that the club was always pleased to do work at the House as it was a project that had been close to the club's heart from its inception.

Distribution of Food Waste Bin Kits

Rotarians were given the task by Gippsland Waste Group of distributing food waste bins, biodegradable bags and instructions to over 2,000 homes in Churchill last month. The project is a pilot program designed to reduce the amount of food waste which finds it way into land fill. Around 40% of household waste is food scraps and by providing a separate bin and biodegradable bags, householders can place scraps in the green organic waste bin and eventually they breakdown and become mulch.

It was a challenging task for Rotarians who were required to deliver the kits by foot and wore out plenty of shoe leather in the process.

Long standing member Ross Ollquist, said, "there was plenty of walking involved but we gained satisfaction from the knowledge that we were helping the environment with this project".

Men's Health Guest Speaker

Dr Chris Lampell, a GP from Moe, recently addressed the Club on the question of Men's health with a particular emphasis on bowel and prostate cancers.

He urged members to have regular bowel scans by obtaining the kits which are readily available and



through Rotary. He also urged men to be tested for prostate cancer periodically as it can be dealt with, if detected early enough.

Disaster Aid Australia

Another interesting speaker to address the club last month was Peter Faulkner of Disaster Aid Australia, the Rotary based organization that provides emergency housing equipment for people who suffer natural disasters all around the world.



Have Your Say on the Draft Library Plan 2011 - 2017

Library users will have their chance to comment on Latrobe City's draft Library Plan 2011 - 2017 that that has been released for public comment.

The Plan will guide the delivery of Latrobe City's libraries over the next six years and continues to focus on the six key program areas of service delivery; partnerships; facilities; marketing and communications; resources; and information technology.

Latrobe City mayor, Councillor Darrell White, said that national and international trends, along with the results of an extensive community engagement process, were taken into account when developing the plan.

"Our consultants 'LibrariesAlive!' engaged with library users and other key stakeholders over a three month period last year.

Capturing the feedback for the development of the draft plan included discussions with Councillors, Friends of the Libraries, library staff and other council officers as well as focus groups and surveys.

"We were very pleased with the response. A total of 383 surveys were completed, including 108 responses from people who do not currently use any library facilities. Through all of the consultation channels used, more than 400 people were engaged in the development of the draft Plan.

"However, we also want members of the public to be able to voice their opinions too. It is important that we capture as much feedback as possible to ensure the draft plan places Latrobe City in the best position to take advantage of a well-developed Library Plan.

"The extensive consultation was in accordance with Council's Community Engagement Plan 2010 – 2014 and provided a great opportunity for the community to provide input into the plan, now we want the community to let us know if we've got what they told us right," Cr White said.

Cr White added that the previous Library Plan 2006 -2011 had delivered many enhancements to outreach services and highlighted the importance of libraries as community resources.

"High points of the previous plan included the opening of the new library as part of the Churchill Community Hub; several successful and prominent exhibitions including two Latrobe Valley Ukrainian photography exhibitions, the State Library of Victoria's Travelling Treasures Program and the two year statewide Independent Type travelling exhibition.

"We look forward to receiving feedback from the wider community now, so that we can shape the new Library Plan to offer an even wider array of services to library patrons," Cr White concluded.

Dead Platypus Toll Continues To Rise

The Department of Sustainability and Environment (DSE) is warning rogue anglers to stop illegally using opera house nets after another platypus was found dead in the Bunyip River this month.

The dead platypus, a female, was found trapped in one of three opera house nets tied to a log in the river near Labertouche in West Gippsland.

DSE Senior Wildlife Investigator Mike Sverns said this latest death was devastating for the local platypus population because the female platypus may have had young left in the burrow.

"The young will starve to death because of the lazy fishing practices of a rogue angler and the platypus deaths in this river are beginning to take its toll," Mr Sverns said. "DSE officers will be investigating this incident.

"In Victoria, opera house nets may only be used in private waters such as farm dams.

People can still catch yabbies or freshwater crayfish with hoop nets, which are far safer for platypuses."

DSE wildlife officers have been collecting data since mid last year.

Since then 11 opera house nets have been reported resulting in the deaths of five platypuses.

"This is a disturbing number considering the platypus population is already a protected species," Mr Sverns

said.
"What is particularly concerning is many of the nets and platypus deaths go unreported

and therefore unnoticed.

"We want to deter lazy fishing practices and the illegal use of nets. Trapping protected native


wildlife such as a platypus is a serious offence and will result in prosecution."

Under the Fisheries Act 1995 offenders detected, possessing or using an opera house net in or close to inland waters can be issued with a penalty infringement notice or charged under summons to appear in court and face a maximum fine of \$11,300.

Vessels and vehicles may also be seized. Under the Wildlife Act 1975 the maximum penalty for killing a platypus is \$5,500 and/or six months imprisonment.

Members of the public are encouraged to report the illegal use of opera house nets by calling DSE on 136 186.





Earthquakes & Volcanoes

After the devastating earthquakes in New Zealand recently, Grade 5/6 have been examining earthquakes and volcanoes, focusing on how they form. 


