Funding for Jeeralang North Hall



The Jeeralang North Hall, damaged in the February bushfires, is to receive \$760,000 for its refurbishment. The announcement made by Peter Batchelor, Minister for Community Development, at the Hall on Friday 11 December means that the Jeeralang North Hall Committee can now start work to repair the damage. The Minister also announced further grant of \$21 million for Community Recovery Committees across the State.

Joining local residents and the Hall Committee was Christine Nixon, Chair of the Bushfire Reconstruction and Recovery Authority, (VBRRA).

"The contribution of philanthropic and corporate donors has been instrumental to bushfire recovery," she said. "This is a really fabulous community. I have enjoyed working with them. They have been clear about the direction they wanted to go. They are great partners. It

is wonderful that we have been able to get a mix of funding from VBRRA, McDonald's, Rotary Tasmania, and the Insurance money. We hope to get the project under way as soon as possible. We will keep working with the community."

Cr Kellie O'Callaghan, Latrobe City Council's newly appointed Mayor, echoed Ms Nixon, noting the importance of ongoing collaboration between Local, State and Federal Governments, VBRRA and other agencies involved in the recovery effort. She said that Latrobe Council is looking forward to continuing working with VBRRA and other agencies so projects like this are started as quickly as possible. She acknowledged the importance of the hall to many people for a variety of reasons







Carbon Pollution Reduction Scheme -Potential Latrobe City Impacts

Consultation on Walker Parade Parkland

CDCA has received a request from Latrobe City Council to provide a formal response to a proposal by the 'Plan Our Park Action Committee' regarding the development of what is currently public open space in Walker Parade.

This request, along with POPAC's submission to Council and other relevant documents, were considered at our November meeting.

CDCA's role is to ensure that all community views and opinions have the opportunity to be put forward, prior to decisions being taken by Council. We also have a role to play in the development of long-term goals and strategic directions for Churchill's future growth, whilst considering associated town planning issues.

Currently, this undeveloped parcel of land in Walker Parade is quite well utilised for casual recreation purposes and as a walking track for primary school children and local shoppers. There appears to be some community support for the proposal to develop this space further as a public park or recreation reserve.

The land is owned by the Department of Human Services, which raises the issue of management and infrastructure development. Whilst DHS has indicated it has no plans for this land, management, or even ownership, needs to be passed on to the Council or a community organisation which can then be responsible for future costs associated with development and maintenance.

However, the land is not identified in Latrobe City's "Parks & Recreation Reserves Strategy" policy document, and would need to be included in a revised document (which is due to be considered in 2010) for Council to consider developing it as public parkland

Another issue is the identified need for further residential development, particularly medium density housing suitable for the elderly, single people and the like, in close proximity to the Churchill town centre. Under the strategic plan for Churchill, the Walker Parade area has been identified as being eminently suitable for the construction of townhouses or units to meet this need.

The Churchill "Town Centre Plan", adopted by Council earlier this year, is still to be fully implemented, but contains provision for a public reserve adjacent to the existing Town Hall. This is likely to take the form of a 'Civic space', complete with Anzac memorial (the construction of which is being auspiced by CDCA) and flagpoles.

Another 'passive' recreational space on the other side of Monash Way (Walker Parade), complete with gardens and facilities, may provide 'green' balance to the town centre plan, but may

be difficult to source funding for, given the number of existing parks, recreational facilities, walking tracks and open space within Churchill. Some limited residential development within this vicinity may provide an opportunity to also develop a new public park.

It should be noted that Council, under its adopted "Southern Towns Recreation Policy" has decided to consider Gaskin Park as a future 'Recreation Precinct' and is committed to spending funds there to develop facilities, including, we hope, the provision of a Lawn Bowls facility for Churchill.

In order to consider all ideas and opinions, and to gauge community support for the parkland proposal, residential development and/or any other suggestions, CDCA believes that the best way forward is to conduct a community consultation forum early in 2010.

We will be writing to Latrobe City Council to advise that CDCA believes further community discussion between residents and stakeholders is required before a final decision is reached. Representatives from both Council and DHS need to be part of these discussions and will be invited to participate in a community forum on this matter.

At our first meeting for 2010, to be held at 7pm on Wednesday 27 January in the Churchill Community Hub, one of the main agenda items will be the planning of said community forum. All interested residents are

invited to attend our meeting to put their suggestions forward.

We received food vouchers from the Salvos. I didn't want a hand out, because I had worked all my life. But everyone wanted to help so I

A day or two after the fires, a CFA person came by and gave a neighbour an emergency kit. We didn't get one, and when she found out, she shared hers with us.

Two weeks after the fires I went to the Salvos. I had never needed to ask for help before and I arrived at Crosses Road feeling very lost. I had gone to get some clothes, as friends had given us a set or drawers. Just inside the door a lady came up and gave me a big cuddle and left something in my hand. When I looked it was \$70. It still sends shivers up and down my spine when I think of it.

I didn't know her, or anything about her, and I didn't get the chance to thank her much as she left.

We have also received a parcel recently from an interstate Rotary Club, containing things like an iron. We feel very appreciative.

We belong to the Piston Car Club, so we decided to organise a display at Traralgon, to raise money for GERF. Within three days we had a display of 100 cars and raised \$3,500.

Latrobe City Council organized lots of help. We have made lots of friends and closer friends. We are getting involved with the community.

I was new to the area, and now I feel a bit more cemented to the area because of the Community Recovery Committee's work.

We experienced concern from friends and family overseas, and locally.

Community spirit has been regenerated. We feel closer.

We have initiated a Community Fireguard Group and that has been very informative. We feel much more prepared now.

Final Saturday Breakfast for 2009

The Breakfast was held on the 28 November and was well attended. Professor Helen Bartlett, Pro Vice-Chancellor of the Gippsland Campus of Monash University, was the guest speaker and she gave a very interesting talk about the campus and her job, which she obviously enjoys.

She spoke enthusiastically about what the campus has to offer being part of a major research university with international campuses, and which has strong links with and the support of the local community and industry. Being a smaller campus the students enjoy a high level of individual support and strong student satisfaction is evident.

Other important aspects of the campus were having the Gippsland Education Precinct on the grounds and the Industry Placement Program, which enables students to get industrial experience as part of their courses.

Of the 2,100 on-campus students, there are 230 international students from 30 countries with the largest group coming from China. There are 2,300 off-campus students and eight faculties are represented at Gippsland giving students access to 100 courses and to fund the operations at Gippsland. \$60 million is required annually.

In 2008, 61% of the on-campus students came from the Gippsland region with the others coming from Melbourne, overseas, other parts of Victoria and interstate. A considerable number of students are helped financially by scholarships offered by local councils and indus-

A number of new courses are planned for 2010 including a Bachelor of Medical Science. Research at the campus includes rural health and ageing, environment, emergency/disaster management, geotechnical and hydrogeological engineering and social inclusion.

Professor Bartlett also spoke about her involvement and the campus involvement during the Delburn and Churchill-Jeeralang bushfires. This included giving accommodation to evacuees from Boolarra and Yinnar and for 210 firefighters plus providing 500 meals three times per day from 5am to midnight across two shifts. The campus was also used as the staging post for three weeks during the fires.

Since then the campus staff have had an increased role in disaster prevention and emergency management activities, including a cross-campus program of disaster related research such as fire, flood, drought and climate change.

Professor Bartlett concluded by inviting people to visit the campus, to encourage students to finish year 12 and attend university and to promote the local university, which has one of the widest range of courses available in regional Australia.



Making Victoria FireReady:



Experts predict that Victoria is facing fire conditions this summer every bit as bad as last fire season, and possibly even worse. No matter where you live, there are things you must to do to prepare and make sure you're FireReady. This is even more important if you live in a bushfire prone area.

If you live in regional bushfire prone areas:

- Prepare your property. Good preparation will give your home a greater chance of surviving a bushfire, even if you do plan to leave early.
- Assess whether your house has sufficient defendable space by using the CFA Household Bushfire Self-Assessment tool, found at www.cfa.vic.gov.au
- 3. Develop a written fire plan and then practice it. If you have pets, other animals or stock, they need to be part of your plan. Larger properties should prepare a livestock fire plan [www.dpi.vic.gov.au].
- Prepare a relocation kit with essential items packed in sturdy containers or bags.
- Fire Danger Ratings have changed.
 Factor this information into your fire plan and be aware of the ratings on a daily basis during the season.
- **6.** Find out what's happening in your community. Attend a Fire Ready Community meeting. Join or form a CFA Community Fire Guard group in your local area.

- 7. If you are on holidays or travelling in Victoria this season, plan ahead, check the weather forecasts and be alert to any fire warnings – tune into your local ABC radio station.
- 8. Rural landholders, primary producers, tourism operators and other businesses should consider the insurance required to protect them if fire damages or destroys property and affects assets and income. Consider consulting a specialist rural insurance or business insurance broker.
- 9. If you own property in one of more than 50 areas identified as most at risk, get involved with your local CFA. Know what your area's Township Protection Plan is and how this impacts on you.
- 10. Look and listen for information. Tune into your emergency broadcasters ABC radio, local radio and Sky News TV. Visit www.cfa.vic.gov.au or telephone the Victorian Bushfire Information line 1800 240 667. Keep in touch with what's happening in your community.





Thelma Davies has been the President of the Alay Kapwa (We Care) Association Inc. for the last four years.

She received her award, presented at Government House, for outstanding voluntary contribution to the Filipino and multicultural community of Gippsland.

Thelma also received an award that given to all members of the Alay Kapwa Association Inc.

The Alay Kapwa was established in 1991. It is a Filipino-Australian non-profit organization run by volunteers. As well as providing a support network to all its members, the Association promotes and shares the Filipino culture with the wider community through various community initiatives and activities.

They are also a member of the Gippsland Ethnic Groups Council.

Thelma has encouraged her group to try to be inclusive with other cultural groups.

These activities include fund-raising. After the bushfires, a dinner ball cum disco dance was held raising a lot of money. Half was given to GERF, the other half to the Churchill Fire Brigade.

Their major fundraiser is their annual Coronation Night, which is run to Search for the First Lady of Alay Kapwa.

The group supplies three candidates.

Each one is required to sell 150 tickets or more. The one who raises the most amount of money is crowned. Each year approximately \$6,000 is raised, which is used exclusively to support members through bereavement or helps with sickness benefits for members.

The Alay Kapwa group works hard to keep the support network functioning especially during bereavement.

Flowers are sent to the spouse and family, as well as members taking food. \$600 of their own funds is immediately given for financial support.

Sharing of the Filipino culture includes their cultural dancing group dancing at nursing homes, etc.

They also are asked to schools to raise multicultural awareness, so students can learn about the Philippines and ask ques-

Hazelwood House invited Thelma to speak. She dressed in her national costume and spoke and answered lots of questions about the weather, food, trades people etc. Some of the residents noticed similarities with their own cultures.

CURRIED MEAT BALLS WITH YOGHURT DIP

Meat balls

500 gm lamb or beef mince

1 small or 34 medium onion, finely chopped

1½ tspn each of ginger & garlic paste (or grated)

1 tspn tumeric powder

3/4 tspn chilli powder (optional(

1 tspn each coriander & cumin powder

2½ tspn tandoori chicken powder (optional)

1¼ tspn salt or to taste

½ tspn garam masala

1 slice bread, soaked in warm water & water squeezed

1/4 cup fresh coriander leaves finely chopped

Mix all ingredients together in a bowl, cover and refrigerate for an hour (or longer if you wish). Preheat oven to 350 degrees (180 C)

Make about 24 balls from the mince mixture. Put balls in lightly sprayed oven proof tray and cook for about 30 - 35 mins until cooked. Every 10 mins turn over the balls or shake the tray gently so that balls turn over. Once cooked, remove tray from oven or meat balls will become dry inside. Serve with yoghurt.

With a \$1,500 LCC recovery grant, we were able to use \$300- of this to bring Betty Mc Laughlin to Boolarra and Yinnar to lead two separate two and a half hour Vocal Nosh sessions in August, with the support of the Boolarra Yinnar Co-Operating Church Council and its members. The publicity and enthusiasm generated from these two small events, then built its own momentum.

The Rhythm, Rhyme and Roses Concert organised by Judy McKenzie back in February also fed into the success of our

The SITA event genuinely built on the incredible resilience and resourcefulness of the communities in which we all live and the connections that were made immediately after the bushfire. For our numerous small and larger events garnered the strands to weave the threads of our SITA Concert

The pamper days, also ensured our creativity was flowing and the street parties run by Sue and Tracey and others created the prelude to our event. The Toongabbie Sing on the 12 of December was co-ordinated by Gay Michau, who so beautifully led two choirs, the Yallourn Madrigals and the Coal Valley Male Chorus in our SITA Concert

Our thanks to Liyin Weckman and Vonnie Boreham in stepping into Lyndalls shoes so beautifully, to lead Gippsappella, to Heather James, Betty, Liyin, Kate and Wendy for their Big Sing facilitation and encouragement; to St Vincents de Paul and the Anglican Diocese Sale, IGA and Helen's Yinnar Country Milk Bar and Café for the delicious food, the extraordinary teamwork of the Arc Team in the kitchen and to Ariane and Wills for recording.

Well done everyone - it was great to see so many smiles and hear so many voices!

Vale Bill Mele

6 September 1922 - 29 October 2009


Miliano (Bill) Mele was born in Italy on 6 September 1922. He came to Australia with his family and settled in the Jeeralang area in the early 1930s. his parents bought a dairy farm at Jeeralang North some years later.

Bill attended the Jeeralang North State School when it opened in 1933, and did his secondary schooling at the Yallourn High School. He went to teachers college and taught at a number of one teacher schools including Jumbuk, Jeeralang West and Jeeralang North where classes were held in the supper room of the hall. He also served some years as a relieving teacher and retired in 1959.

He was a member, and secretary, of the District Progress Association during the 1950s to 70s. He was elected unopposed to the Shire of Traralgon Council in 1977 and served three terms as Shire President.

Bill was a member of the Hazelwood North Primary School Council / Parent Association 1970 - 72. He was a progressive dairy farmer and attended farm education / farm walks in Gippsland and Latrobe Valley. With his brother, Ross, he ran the dairy farm and a successful hay contracting business.

Bill gave 67 years of service to the Jeeralang North and District community. He officially joined the Jeeralang North Hall Committee in 1949, but had been an active worker from 1942. When the Jeeralang North Hall was built in 1952 to replace the school destroyed by bushfire in 1944, Bill was the Foreman and coordinated workers and volunteers. He was elected President in 1952 and, except for a three-year period from 1992 to



1995, held that position.

Bill was MC (Master of Ceremonies) at the monthly old time dances until 1993, after which at the supper break he continued to thank the people for their attendance and announced coming events.

Bill's love and support for his family and church was central to his life. His friendship, generosity and sincerity made Bill a valued member of the community and a role model for many.



Yinnar CWA: From 1945 - 1949

Food parcels were regularly sent to Britain.

The October/November meeting roll calls were "embarrassing moments" and "What I like to do in my leisure time". Competition was the "prettiest apron made from a sugar bag.

1946 the ladies agreed at the first meeting to continue the Spare Penny Tin and the Good Fairy Box. The Spare Penny Tin accepted donations of pennies towards the Rest Room Fund.

From 1944-46, a letter exchange with a

Canadian group brought much interest. This was followed by a period of letter exchange with Smalley England, which lasted in to the 2000's.

The competition was "article costing no more

than 1 shilling". The demonstration was smocking which was received with keen interest.

The members agreed to give their support for

the proposed new Memorial Hall.

The Hall Committee was requested to

improve the lavatory and kitchen facilities for the September Conference.

The ladies voted to support the Children's

Hospital Appeal.

The membership had risen to 54.

One member had an 80 year old petticoat to display. It being all handmade, it was greatly admired. Competition was a cushion made for the kitchen from old material.

The ladies offered to help with supper by baking cakes, for the Morwell Hospital Ball.

An International Relief Committee had the support of the ladies. The next meeting, some baby garments were given.

War Saving Certificates were purchased as they could be afforded, at each meeting, throughout the war years. Sheep skins were also purchased regularly to make slippers and other goods for those in the services. An appeal for fat and soap for Britain was supported with 24 large bars and 26 toilet cakes of soap.

The Yinnar CWA continued its support of a bed at Sale Hospital.

A dance was run in August that year.

There were 47 members. A United Nations appeal netted 223 garments collected and forwarded. The members also contributed to buying a blanket to send too.

October 1946, the Yinnar CWA celebrated its 7th Birthday. The membership was 46 and a half! The retiring President Mrs. Anne Lawless, thanked the members for their kindness and loyalty during her office. The number of CWA branches in Victoria numbered 400. Miss Clark, Group President said, "Fellowship of members is worth a lot and is a great help to success."

The ladies of the Yinnar CWA were great friends as well as members.

The Younger Set although small was very active and ran regular activities.

It was decided to have letters of sympathy instead of cards, and cards for new babies.

There was a stall to support the Queen of Yinnar Competition.

With the death of any member, relative of a member including babies, or community member, a minute's silence was observed.

At the December meeting for 1946, Mrs. Ostberg, Group President, paid a warm tribute to godfathers Mr. S. Williams, Mr. Lawless and Mr. Vinall, for their support.

Special visitors like Mrs. Ostberg were welcomed and a small posy was pinned on them.

A hostel at Lakes Entrance, similar to Somers House had been established. The ladies were in favour of supporting the hostel. They also moved to donate 2 pounds, 2 shillings for Fuel for Home Science Van. The Home Science Van was given by Patron Lady Dugan, for the returned soldiers and their families who were settling in the coun-

try. The "van was seen as the first steps to help them adjust to rural life." It was established "to give country women a chance to be involved in activities that were denied them." It provided information on "home making, meal planning, handicrafts, libraries, music and arts as well as practical demonstrations in the use of wood stoves, kerosene lamps, making butter, processing meat and keeping poultry." Feisty Phoenix page 78, 79.

The social part of the afternoon included a piano duet by Mrs. Nadenbousch and Mrs. Walker, a recitation, and a travel talk on Singapore and China.

Mrs. Ostberg presented a past member, Mrs. Courtney, with a gift from the members, and spoke very highly of her work in the past for the branch. Then they sang "A Jolly Good Fellow" to her.

At the end of nearly every set of minutes were recorded the proceeds for the door takings, market stall, afternoon tea, sale of produce, spare pennies collected, and donations made towards the Rest Room etc.

A Variety Show was proposed with the proceeds going towards the Rest Room fund.

During the War years, and after, the ladies worked extremely hard. They were fiercely patriotic and very compassionate, generous, givers. At every meeting it can be seen that some work had proceeded, and donations to this and that were made. The President and Secretary were never idle.

ORIGINS OF THE DIFFERENT FUNDS OF THE ASSOCIATION

Contingency Fund. This is held for future needs when the Association may need monies. Residue from annual efforts after administration costs have been paid.

Welfare Fund. In the great drought of 1933 there was a Government Fund for the relief of people living in the Mallee. When all requirements had been met there was a balance of 600 pounds which was handed over to the CWA by the Government to help Mallee women and children have a holiday at the seaside.

Emergency Relief. Gift of money sent for relief of people during the floods and bushfirescan only be used for such purposes.

Seaside Holiday Fund. In the drought 1932-33 it was asked that the tariff of Somers House be reduced to enable returned soldiers, wives and children and other country women to have a holiday at the seaside. This was refused- but the Conference members promised to pay one penny a year and so the fund was built. Many were helped and the fund stands today [1946] at 52 pounds, 7 shillings and 10 pence.

Endowment Fund. This consists of monies given by donations to the Association- also Life Memberships- also monies made from sale of Birthday Books and the Diaries. It was started with the Yarra Branch and all their Life Members. Only interest used.

Somers House. CWA's Seaside Home at Black Rock, offered now to the Government as a Convalescent Home for Service Women- to be handed to Red Cross for Duration.

Scholarship Fund. Being built to enable a daughter of a member to continue her studies at the University. All branches have promised to support this fund ANNUALLY to the best of their ability- only interest to be used.

STATE CONFERENCE

More than 1,200 members travel from all over Victoria for the Annual General Meeting and State Conference each June. They come, representing their branches and groups, to hear

reports of the previous year's work and results, to vote on submitted resolutions and to hear interesting, stimulating, thought-provoking speakers. Many lasting friendships are made and old acquaintances greeted during the three days.

State Conference also includes the final of the Stat e-wide Public Speaking Competition, and a grand concert with items selected from the Association's Song in Costume and Choral and Drama.

YEAR BY YEAR 1947

Many of the same activities continued- collecting clothing and fat for Britain, pennies collected for Rest Room fund, donating for Fuel for Home Science Van, catering for and running dances, holding the Easter Monday ball, stalls for hospital funds, clothing appeals by the Red Cross, egg and jam appeals. Delegates were elected for Group and State conferences.

International Day was held each April. It was an opportunity for the women to learn more about women from member countries of the Associated Country Women of the World. This year the ladies contributed towards the Distress in India Fund.

The competition was knit a yard of wool on match sticks.

Mystery parcels were introduced as another form of fund raising.

The CWA Cookery Book was very popular

and many were ordered and sold.

An all day demonstration of hair setting and

hair care was arranged.

Used postage stamps were collected.

In June, in honour of Princess Elizabeth's 21st birthday, a tree was to be planted in the Yinnar school yard.

The Younger Set had a pledge of assistance from the main branch members in the running of a ball in aid of Food for Britain. This realized 36 pounds and 9 shillings which paid for food parcels for Britain through the Lord Mayor's Appeal. A dance was also held for this purpose.

An appeal for woollies (woolen garments, mostly cardigans and jumpers) received promised support. A Street Fair was held in conjunction with the RSL. One of the competitions was the ugly man, to be decided by the RSL. A sharing of the profits was made, netting 16 pounds, 3 shillings and 3 pence each.

Their birthday celebration that year was held on a Wednesday as that would allow the Moe and Morwell visitors to travel by train.[Trains then ran on the Yinnar/Boolarra branch line.] It also coincided with the Home Science Van's visit. The annual meeting reported the branch "had not drawn on the balance of last year, but had added to it by almost 20 pounds". [Minute Book-Annual Meeting 13/11/47.] That was as well as all the many donations made over the year!

The Younger Set's report was received, and their work warmly spoken about. There was also regret that the Younger Set was to disband. Badges were pinned on the new office bearers as was the custom, and a word of encouragement was given to all.

Donations to the Annual Effort, Flying Doctor, CWA Scholarship, Seaman's Fund and Somers House were passed for payment.

1948

A dance was held in aid of the Bairnsdale Benevolent Home, which saw a cheque for 25 pounds, 7 shillings sent.

At the first meeting for the year, a report showed that the Younger Set's six girls had, in six years raised a total sum of 700 pounds.

Money was transferred into the Building Fund.

The usual fund raising for all the different appeals and funds continued at the same rate of involvement.

Accounts for payment included, Area Quota,

Delegates expenses, Gippsland Mail, and Hall Hire.

The Secretary was requested to write to HQ

for demonstrators in Floral Art, Interior Decorating and papier mache.

Mrs. Aucterlonie gave a demonstration of

patching trousers.

Fat and rags continued to be collected through the year.

The very courteous and appreciative members continued to offer their votes of thanks to those who had performed duties and performed their tasks with diligence, give posies or small gifts in expressions of their thanks and take time to make special mention of acts of care and hospitality.

Posies continued to be given for birthdays.

The Secretary wrote to Foy and Gibson's for ends of material with which to make quilts.

In August, it was agreed to support the United Nations Appeal for Children, by direct giving. Members not present were to receive a letter soliciting their support. This appeal netted 16 pounds, 8 shillings.

The proceeds from the dance held in September went to the Rest Room Fund.

Mrs. Nadenbousch gave the demonstration of papier mache. The competition was a floral hat, and the roll call was for helpful hints.

The egg collection totaled 60.5 dozen distributed to Sale and Morwell hospitals.

The Empire Fund had become the Thanksgiving Fund.

A "splendid financial report" was given at the Annual Meeting. The guest speaker, Group President, Mrs. Lang, thanked the ladies for their hard work and expressed regret at the illness of the King and the postponement of the royal tour. A new Oath of Allegiance was explained.

The following item was placed on the agenda to be raised at Group Conference in February 1949. "That the Education Department be asked not to employ any known Communists, and to dismiss any teacher known to be attempting to influence children to communistic ideas". The delegates to the conference had their expenses of 1 pound passed for payment.

Umina, a large residence in the Melbourne suburb of Lansell Rd. Toorak was purchased for members to use as a holiday destination if shopping or going to entertainment, or as accommodation if in Melbourne on CWA business such as conferences and exhibitions.

Umina was purchased in May. It has "an elegant entrance, large drawing and dining room, sixteen bedrooms, long verandah and shady garden". Feisty Phoenix Page 111. It was bought for 20,000 pounds, being considered well below market value.

This residence is proudly referred to as The Club, or CWA Headquarters. Each year the Club holds a Club Fair or Garden Party. Each branch was/is expected to contribute goods for sale, or money in lieu, for this fair.

1949

The generous support of appeals, and various funds continued as did the caring shown to members by each other, in good and ill situations. Market stalls were well served.

Competitions for the best sauces received 9 entries. Demonstrations of glove making and making a basket from lavender, and basketry were given.

The proceeds from the ball were divided between the Sale Hospital and the Rest Room




The life of Po and Tylung

Tylung would make things with her mum such as clothes and bags and other things. They didn't have much food or supplies. They made their money by selling these things and necklaces at markets.

Over in the refugee camp there were rough times when people would take men for war about 10 - 15 at a time. This would happen about once every 5 months. They knew though that one day war would come and they would have to leave but they dreaded that day. After a while the people came to their village. They were back to claim more people but luckily they did not get Po and

Tylung's dad. Then the next five months came round. It was that day when the war made it to their village. They were warned that the last refugee camp was raided, so the kids and women got to leave on a boat. Their dad had to leave and he put up a fight but there was no hope because they would just kill him. He was taken into the

The family left on a boat to India and it was hard. Po and Tylung and their mum were on a two year boat trip and only a few people survived. As soon as they got on the boat, in the first week, their mum was put to work. The kids had to take care of their baby brother. It was tough. They only got fed a little and they could do nothing once they arrived in India. They were told their mum had to stay on the boat to cook. They could do nothing about that because they might be killed. After two days in India, a family took them in and then they began their new life, forever wondering whatever happened to their parents.



Students were also very excited to receive a visit from Santa who turned up on his motorcycle.




Police Station Tour


